## Tax Deferral Available For Over 65 Residential Homestead Owners

 Section 33.06 of the Texas Property Tax Code requires the following in-formation concerning the Deferral of Certain Property Taxes to be publicized. Property taxes on the residence homestead property of those persons sixtyfive (65) years of age or older may be deferred
requirements of the Texas Property Tax Code. The property owner must (in most cases) occupy the residence on which the tax is being levied or on which a suit has been filed for collection of the To obtain a deferral, the individual must file with the Chief Appraiser or the Appraisal District in which the property is located; an affidavit stating that he or she is sixty-five (65) years of age or older and that h.
and reside in the residence that the tax is being levied on. and reside in the residence that the tax is being levied on.
If a suit has already been filed by a tax unit, the individual must file with Ihe court in which the suit was filed the same type of affidavit. By filing the affidavit with the proper authority, the person filing the affidavit no longer owns or occupies the property as a residence homestead. It is emphasized that the tax is only deferreditis not cancelled. A tax lie remains on the property and interest in the amount of eight (8) percent per year will co

## What Can We Do About Gangs?

The Juvenile Crime Intervention
division of the Office of the Attorney General travels throughout the state talking to parents, teachers and law
enforcement officials about the dangers of gangs in their communities. By offering these information any ans, we hope to not only preven gangs, but our youth from joining these organizations. The following are questions that staff members are commonly asked at these training sessions.
Q: I am worried about my kid getting involved in gangs. How
I tell? And what can I do? A. There are can I do
A. There are many indicators of gang activity, such as a change in type
of clothes, tattoos and changes in activities and attitudes. However, the best way to find out if your child is involved in a gang is by asking. gangs to find a sense of family or belonging. Having a strong, open relationship with your child can be one of the best ways to prevent gang


Some indicators of gang bandanas, truancy, poor school performance, unexplained income, or frequent contact with the police. Children in gangs may wear clothing that is dominated by one color, or altered on one side of the body. Gang
graffiti may also turn up on a child's graffiti may also turn up on a child's shoes, notebooks, backpacks or
jewelry. Just one of these warning signs may not mean anything, but if there is a consistent pattern, parents and teachers should be concerned. If you are concerned about your child's possible gang involvement, talk to his or her teachers, school administrators and, most importantly your child. In addition, the Juvenile Crime Intervention Division of the Iffice of the Attorney General offers a gang awareness training session to recognize and deal with gang activity, O: My kid wants to wear certain kinds of baggy pants and sport
