
## **Annual Chamber Banquet Slated For April 20th**

## Gorman Easter **Treasure Hunt**



## Tax Deferral Available For Over 65 **Residential Homestead Owners**

Section 33.06 of the Texas Property Tax Code requires the following information concerning the Deferral of Certain Property Taxes to be publicized. Property taxes on the residence homestead property of those persons sixty-

five (65) years of age or older may be deferred or abated if they satisfy the requirements of the Texas Property Tax Code. The property owner must (in most cases) occupy the residence on which

the tax is being levied or on which a suit has been filed for collection of the

To obtain a deferral, the individual must file with the Chief Appraiser of the Appraisal District in which the property is located; an affidavit stating that he or she is sixty-five (65) years of age or older and that he or she does own

and reside in the residence that the tax is being levied on. If a suit has already been filed by a tax unit, the individual must file with

the court in which the suit was filed the same type of affidavit. By filing the affidavit with the proper authority, the person filing the affidavit no longer owns or occupies the property as a residence homestead.

It is emphasized that the tax is only deferred; it is not cancelled. A tax lien remains on the property and interest in the amount of eight (8) percent per year will continue to accrue during the period that the collection of taxes is deferred.

For information concerning the tax deferral or abatement, contact the Eastland County Appraisal District. The office is located on the second floor of the Eastland County Courthouse, Eastland, Texas. The telephone number to call for assistance is 629-8597.

## Stenholm Speaks Out For Rural Health

Congressman Charles W. Stenholm expressed his disappointment with provisions in the President's Fiscal Year 2000 Budget proposal which could adversely affect our nation's rural health care delivery system. Along with representatives of the National Rural Health Association and a bipartisan, bicameral group of Members of Congress, Representative Stenholm detailed his serious concerns regarding the President's budget request.

Congressman Stenholm highlighted a number of provisions within the budget proposal which are of concern for rural areas: reductions in Medicare payments to rural health care providers, a freeze in Medicare inpatient hospital payment rates, inadequate funding for important rural health care programs such as the National Health Service Corps, and reductions in funding for health professions programs.

"I have heard from a number of hospitals, home health agencies, and other health care providers in the 17th District of Texas who have indicated that they payment reductions included in the Balanced Budget Act are proving to be problematic" said Stenholm. "Until we see the full impact of the 1997 payment reductions, it is premature to be proposing further cuts."

Emphasizing that the President's budget proposal is only the first step in a lengthy budget process, Congressman Stenholm pledged to work to enhelp students with math COLLEGE STATION - Charles Lamb shuffles his deck of playing cards and proceeds to show his audience of wide-eyed students and teachers some of his card tricks.

Lamb, professor of educational curriculum and instruction at Texas A&M University, can guess which card a student picked from the deck without ever seeing the card.

Although it looks like magic to the students, Lamb is not a magician nor does he claim to possess special powers. He is a mathematics educator who uses mathematical skills in performing card tricks to show students how math is used in the real world.

"Kids believe that math takes place between 10:15 and 11 a.m. at school and has nothing to do with the real world," he says.

Ever since Lamb learned his first card trick from his grandmother many years ago, he has studied all types of card tricks and performed them for teachers and students. He began integrating the card tricks and math more than 20 years ago when he was looking for a way to motivate kids to learn mathematics, but have fun at the same time.

"I use the tricks to teach a variety of mathematical concepts for students ranging from kindergarten to high school and beyond," Lamb

He adds that he has even taught the tricks to students in special education programs.

"How you use the card tricks depends on the level of the students and what the teacher wants to do with it," he says. "All card tricks have mathematical concepts."

The Commissioners decided they would spend the reserves. They would submit budgets for their precincts knowing that they would spend that and thousands more in the next year. Only the commissioner of Precinct 3 always had money to pay for his equipment. The over budget ex-

pense would be paid out of the


County's reserves. It worked! Re-

serves are nearly gone.

Each year at budget time I advised the Commissioners that they could not spend more money than they took in. I advised them to keep the reserves in savings drawing interest, raise taxes only a very small amount, and live and work within their budgets. They listened very kindly and then did exactly what they had planned to do. (And NO...the raises some of us officials asked for was not a drop in the bucket to the thousands they have spent over the years. The raises would not have caused a tax increase or any spending of the reserves. They would have been worked through the individual official's budgets.)

The Judge thinks cuts in services and employees are on the horizon. There are some departments who have never overspent their budgets, in fact they have turned money back in to the General Fund at year's end. (Last year the Sheriff turned \$16,000 back into the General Fund.) These officials and their departments are careful with the taxpayer's money. Do not plan to cut services or employees from the County Clerk, the County Treasurer, Tax Office, the Sheriff, the J.P's and Constables. The cuts need to be made from the ones who knowingly, deliberately overspent their budgets year after year and have drained the reserves of the County. Let us be fair in whose belt is tightened. I will be watching and I will

Some indicators of gang membership may include pagers, bandanas, truancy, poor school performance, unexplained income, or frequent contact with the police. Children in gangs may wear clothing that is dominated by one color, or altered on one side of the body. Gang graffiti may also turn up on a child's shoes, notebooks, backpacks or jewelry. Just one of these warning signs may not mean anything, but if there is a consistent pattern, parents and teachers should be concerned.

If you are concerned about your child's possible gang involvement, talk to his or her teachers, school administrators and, most importantly, your child. In addition, the Juvenile Crime Intervention Division of the Office of the Attorney General offers a gang awareness training session to teach parents and educators to recognize and deal with gang activity.
