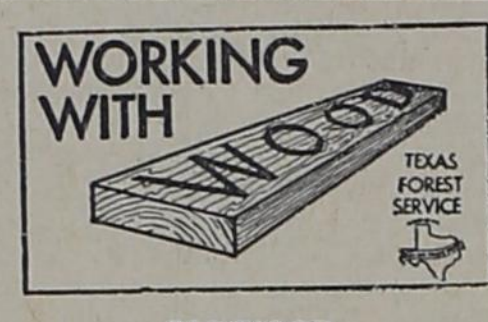

PLYWOOD
Modern technology has produced many new materials unheard of even 10 years ago. Plywood, however, with its hundreds of presnet day applications, was used in fabricating furniture as long as 1500 B. C.

In spite of its long years of usage, little is generally known about the fabrication of plywood or the advantages offered by its use. Veneer is a thin sheet of wood of uniform thickness. The sheets are peeled, sliced or sawn from logs. Veneer is seldom used as a single ply except for baskets, crates and specialty products requiring the use of thin sheets of wood such as ice cream spoons. Veneered construction permits a broader use of expensive woods and provides the only practical way to match wood grain and figure.

Plywood is made from an odd number of sheets of veneer bonded together with the grain directions of each piece at right angles to one another. This construction is used in order to improve on the properties of solid wood by increasing resistance to end splitting and warping, and to improve dimensional stability and strength uniformity along the width and length of the panel. The simplest type of assembly contains three plies of veneer with the grain of the middle layer, known as the core, placed at right angles to the grain of the two outer layers, called the face plies. When there are more than three plies, the sheets of veneer between the core and face plies are called cross bands.

Plywood construction allows the fabrication of curved and irregular surfaces impossible to achieve with solid wood. Plywood can also be fabricated with other materials to provide specific properties for specialized uses. Wood veneer can be effectively combined with cloth, asbestos, paper, metal and plastics.

Plywood is not a substitute for solid wood. It is commonly used in the manufacture of the best grades of furniture and all types of construction. Plywood is an engineered product of proven ability, equally effective for interior or exterior use.
