

Todds To Observe 63rd Anniversary



Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Todd are inviting relatives and friends to call Sunday afternoon from two until four, the occasion being the celebration of their 63rd wedding anniversary.

Miss Chattie L. Thomas and John Robert Todd were married September 22nd at the home of her parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Thomas, in Union County, Miss. Shortly thereafter they came to Texas to settle near Gorman, a sparsely settled town all but covered with shin-oak.

Todd followed farming for about 20 years during which time he was a partner with Ed Jones in the Farmers Feed Store and Wagon Yard. Business houses of the early 1900's were Eppler Merchandise, Townsend-Oldham General Store, Post Office and the First National Bank.

In the late 1920's he began a 30 year tenure with the Gorman law enforcement department as constable. He is proud of the fact that he never shot a seriously wounded. But then he said, "When I compare my equipment, a revolver, with that of my son, John Elmer, a deputy in Lubbock County at Slaton, who has shackles, handcuffs, even strait jackets, there could have been more than one reason for my caution."

Outlaws of the 1930's cased Gorman on several occasions. Most officers were not disposed to be present when desperadoes put in an appearance. In fact, telephone wires were hot with warnings from one town law to another. There was one month that the constable spent nights waiting with three loaded firearms by his side in the bank. And two bank holidays were declared by the late O. P. Newberry for protection of his employees.

The bank, however, was never robbed. Rumor had it that not even a gang leader would try a town where every merchant had a loaded deer rifle leaning against his door.

Growing flowers is the hobby of Mrs. Todd. Her hydrangeas, which bloom prolifically, she rooted from cutting taken from East Texas shrubs. And the table on Sunday will be laid with a cloth she crocheted.

BEEF SHORT COURSE SLATED AT GORMAN FOR OCTOBER 6-13

A beef short course for adult farmers will be held October 9th through the 13th at 7:30 p. m. under the sponsorship of the Gorman High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. R. P. Browder, superintendent, and Mr. E. C. Bramlett, teacher of vocational agriculture.



Mr. George Garretson, beef cattle specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Husbandry at Texas A&M College with headquarters at A&M College, will be the instructor in the course.

Mr. Garretson is a graduate of Texas A&M College, where much of his college work in technical agriculture was in the field of animal husbandry, range management, and agronomy. Mr. Garretson has had a wide and varied experience in training livestock and meats teams for state competition, as well as teaching vocational agriculture at Mason, Texas. He has experience as a commercial beef cattle producer and served as a beef grader for two years while in the Army. He has worked closely with registered breeders, commercial cattlemen, and vocational students in the field of beef cattle production. Mr. Garretson has had an extensive steer-feeding program under his supervision and has made an impressive record in the show ring.

"Many beef cattle short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Garretson and all have met with outstanding success," according to J. B. Payne, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Stephenville, Texas. Arrangements for the adult education short course in beef cattle and in other fields are made through Mr. Payne's office.

The short course at Gorman High is scheduled to begin Oct. 9 at 7:30 p. m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of the short course will be held Oct. 10, 11, 12, and 13th at 7:30 p. m. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Garretson will be available to assist cattlemen with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to E. C. Bramlett.

Cattlemen interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Browder, or the teacher of vocational ag., Mr. Bramlett. An entry fee of \$2 will be charged. Beef cattle short course certificates are to be presented to each cattleman who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Garretson states that the field of beef cattle production must take a close look at efficiency of production in the future. With land prices, feed, and taxes rising, the producer is meeting more and more competition for the consumer's dollar at the meat counter. From the economic view of the beef cattle business, there is every indication that in comparing the producer of yesteryear and the producer of tomorrow, beef must be produced to sell cheaper in order to be a profit-making business. Mr. Garretson indicates that the beef cattle short course will deal with the methods of producing beef at a lower cost and the ways of producing the kind of beef that the housewife wants to buy. He also states that the course will include such important fields as the meat-type steer, selecting bulls and replacement heifers, proper range use, supplemental winter feeding, and will be altered to meet the wishes and interests of the farmers and ranchers enrolled.

"Short courses in beef cattle, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M College," stated Bob Craig, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M College, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This cooperative program," states Craig, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of beef cattle, insect control, farm management, farm electrification, farm welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, and dairy cattle.

PEANUT BOWL GAME SET FOR SEPTEMBER 30
