"BETTER EDUCATION?"

The people of Eastland County have come face to face with the question of "just how good is our school?" Much doubt has been placed in some minds as to whether the local schools are preparing our children adequately for college or for taking an adult's place in community life.

This article will reflect the position of Gorman High School in comparison with other schools.

I. - ACCREDITATION

Gorman High School is fully accredited with the Texas Education Agency. Also, Gorman High School is an active member of the Southern Association of High Schools, Colleges, and Universities. Only 18% of the secondary schools in the State of Texas are members of the Southern Association.

II. - FACULTY

Gorman School has sixteen teachers employed full-time. Of this sixteen teachers, nine have earned at least a "Masters Degree." This is a percentage of 56.25% and compares against a statewide percentage of 36.99%.

This same faculty also has an average teacher experience of 21.56 years per teacher.

III. - COURSE OFFERINGS

The latest "Research Bulletin" from the State Agency lists only eleven subject matter fields necessary for a good high school. At the present time Gorman High School offers seventeen subject matter fields in their curriculum.

IV. - GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

At the present time sixteen credits are required for graduation by both the State Agency and Gorman High School. However, Gorman High School has added to the basic graduation requirements in English and Math, adding one additional credit in each of the two subject matter fields.

V. - CURRENT STUDENT BODY AND FACULTY ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Gorman High School has participated in the National Defense Education Act for the past three

years. Through this program the teaching facilities in the fields of Science have increased tremendously. Also, included in this program is a "Teachers Training Institute". Mr. Nelson Rand, science teacher of Gorman High School, was one of the few teachers selected to participate in this program. Mr. Rand received 27 college hours of college credit in advanced study of science. This has greatly enriched the field of science in Gorman High School.

We are confident that Gorman High School has the strongest Department of Business in this area. We offer a course of study that will qualify any individual, who successfully completes this course, for job placement in this area. Most recent achievements of this department, which is under Mrs. Rowena Wilson's supervision, was the second and third place winners in Class B statewide competition for Typing and Shorthand students during the 1961 Spring Meet. The scores of the two students who were winners in these events will compare favorably with any in the State, regardless of school size.

This past year three girls from Gorman High School were recipient of the highest award afforded any Vocational Homemaking student in the State of Texas. We have two students under Mrs. Rainey's supervision at the present time who are completing the requirements for the State Homemaking Degree and should win that honor in 1962 or 1963.

There have been numerous awards won by the Vocational Agriculture Department the past several years. This department, under Mr. Bramlett's supervision, is a yearly contender for the "Accomplishment Award" by the Texas Electric Service Co.

Since 1956 Gorman High School has had nine boys win the Lone Star Farmer Degree. At two of the past three State FFA Conventions, Gorman has received plaques for Special Merit in Chapter FFA Work.

Other accomplishments could be listed at this time, but space will not permit.

VI. - GORMAN HIGH SCHOOL EX-STUDENTS

Any school can be measured by the quality, not quantity, of their graduates.

A survey has been made of the graduates who are now enrolled in colleges throughout this state. From a composite total of 114 grades for the fall semester, the following was noted: There were 24 A's or 21%; 49 B's or 43%; 31 C's or 26%; 6 D's or 6%; and 4 F's or 4%. This reflects that 64% of the more recent graduates are maintaining at least a "B" average in colleges at the present time. These figures include grades of almost every ex-student of Gorman High School in college at the present time.

From the year 1948 until 1955 Gorman High School graduated 153 students. Of this group 40 individuals earned at least one degree from a 4 year college. From this figure we can boast that one of every four high school graduates have become college graduates.

From the above listed facts, we feel that the continued existence of Gorman High School is justified. With the full co-operation of the home and school each and every student, now and in the future, can be adequately fitted to meet the problems of tomorrow.

The Volunteer Fire Department did a quick job in getting the fire extinguished, but considerable smoke and water damage was done.

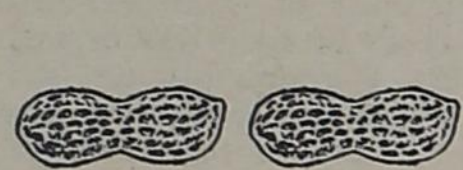
Mrs. Stephens was not at home and the house was locked and the firemen had to force entry into the house and also had to cut holes in the roof and ends of the building to reach the flames.

A person passing by reported the fire to Mrs. Era Maupin and she turned in the alarm.

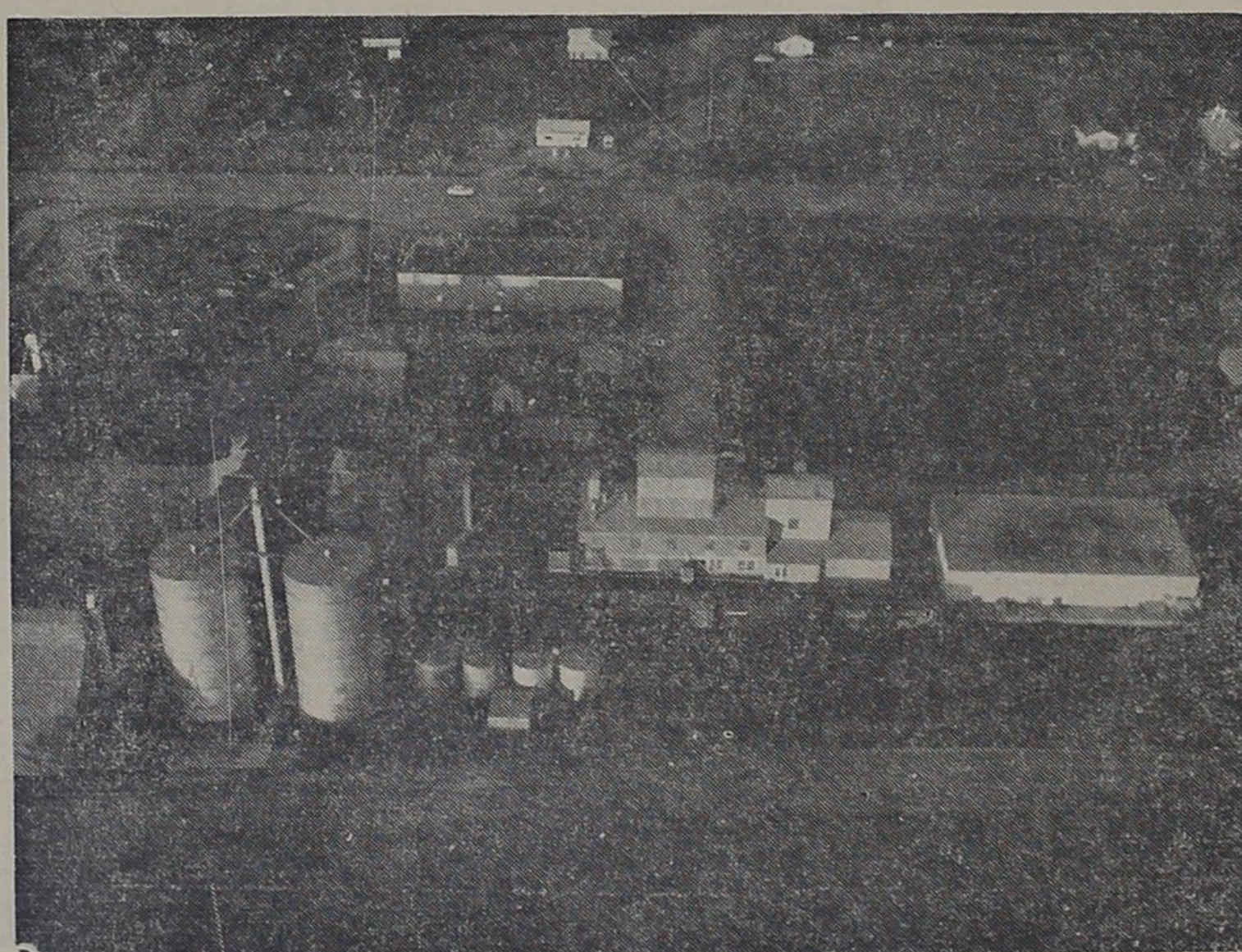
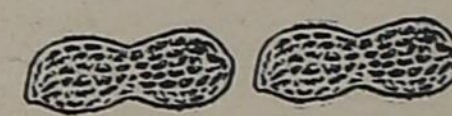

Very seldom do I go to task with proponents of some wild scheme or issue which concerns all our people, but in this school consolidation which is to be voted upon at an early date, I am compelled to say a few things since the "little pamphlet" put out last week in everyone's mail box makes what I consider a blackmail charge to all over 65 by warning them that if they did not vote for this consolidation proposition their taxes would be raised. Now just why did they single out the 65 year-olds if not for the purpose of swaying their vote. A dirty trick.

Again for years now the cry has been for small classes while this pamphlet speaks out for larger classes. How inconsistent can anyone be in order to carry their point.

And last but by no means least, they are claiming a saving of several thousand dollars by fewer busses. How far from the fact. There are expected to be approximately 1000 students in the Junior and Senior High Schools. How are these students to get to Olden or elsewhere. All parents are not in a position to furnish a Cadillac for their use so they must walk or thumb a ride with someone else and you all know that's ruled out. So figuring that each bus would carry 50 students, which is perhaps, a high average per bus; you see this would necessitate twenty busses and figuring each bus at \$5,000.00, you have \$100,000 for busses and until we have driverless busses there will have to be 20 bus drivers at an additional minimum cost of \$20,000 per term and these busses don't last forever, either.

So friends, don't fool yourself by thinking of saving anything. Once the program is begun there is no end.

To The Voters Of Precinct Two

As a candidate for Commissioner of Precinct No. 2, I would like to issue this formal statement to the people in this precinct.

I was born March 8, 1921, and reared in the Flatwood Community, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arch Justice, now of Eastland, Texas. My first nine years of schooling was in the Flatwood School. In 1939 I graduated from Carbon High School. Eastland County has been my home all of my life with the exception of 3 1/2 years spent in the Army Air Corps as an Airplane Mechanic during World War II. As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C., Secre-
tary of Agriculture Freeman, in
his over-all program for land use,
has suggested that land no longer
suitable for food production be
converted to some type of recrea-
tion. Some farms would be turned
into parks, some back to forest,
and others converted to a sort of
a "dude farm" for recreational
sports. It seems to be the counter-
part of urban renewal. Mr. Free-
man's program might be called
"Rural Renewal."

It seems to be the idea that the
government would buy up land
from farmers who want to quit
and resell it to those who want

to continue or to expand.

It is doubtful that such an idea
is going to be readily acceptable,
but of course, you never can tell.
Personally, I had never thought
of a farm having very much "re-
creation" about it. At least, I nev-
er experienced very much of it
growing up on one.

However, we had probably had
some of the best crawdad fishing
on Red Mud Creek that could be
found anywhere. There is not
much evidence that this continues
to be any great sport, but if it be-
comes popular, I know of a place
in Jones County to which people
could flock in great numbers.

All sorts of research and experi-
ments are taking place, but some
of them are tremendously expen-
sive. The trouble seems to be with
an experimental Government pro-
gram it becomes permanent when-
ever it is successful or not.

Now, if this new idea for the
use of land catches on, it is sup-
posed to either keep more people
on the land in the rural area, or
move those who operate unprofit-
ably to the towns and cities.

An experiment is going on to
determine how things and people
live together under crowded con-
ditions. One at the present time

has to do with rats. What effect
does metropolitan crowding have
on the behavior of city dwellers?
The National Institute of Health
reports on studies made with lab-
oratory rats crowded together in
living space.

According to the reports the
rats grew up in cramped quarters
and their normal behavior pat-
terns were readily changed. After
the rats had lived together under
crowded conditions, they seem-
ingly did not like solitude. Many
would not eat or drink except in
the company of many other rats.
Others seemed to withdraw and
would only eat or drink while
others were asleep.

The most serious effect seemed
to be on mother rats. Contrary
to their normal neatness and nest
building, they lost interest and the
ability to build orderly nests.
When the young came, the moth-
ers abandoned them early. Infant
mortality rates climbed. Probably
there was no way of telling whe-
ther the juveniles were delinquent
or not, but they probably were.

It should be added that, in this
test, no conclusions or parallel has
yet been drawn with human be-
havior.

Now, back to "Urban Renewal"

ment of Urban Affairs. Some of

what of a cleavage between the
city people and, good or bad, these
more recent happenings could be
the straw to seriously bend the
camel's back, if it does not break
it.





gons will be all ready to "roll" when the young guests arrive. Peanuts and kids and circuses are just naturally made for each other. And here's a happy thought: There's quick energy and plenty of proteins for growing young muscles in peanuts. So why not swing the whole party around them -- invitations, entertain ment eats, the works? Run those circus cakes right down the center of the dining room table. (Or lucky you,

if there's a game room, or the season's right for a lawn party!) Time to eat? Scoop big ice cream balls for clown "heads". Add pre-frosted, peanut-studded cone caps and peanut features in seconds. Now call in your squalling circus buffs. It's a Peanut Party. It's a Circus!

CIRCUS WAGON CAKES

Easy as stirring up a cake mix are these jaunty little circus wagons. The minutes you've saved with mixes leave time for decorating fun. For cakes make an impressive parade, but three or two will carry the theme. One 2-layer box of cake mix will make a pair of 2-layer wagons. (Those in our picture are 3-deckers.) Pick your youngster's favorite cake flavor -- white, yellow, spice or (most appropriate!) - peanut! Better stay away from chocolate. There'll be plenty for small tummies in the peanut and frostings.

Bake the batter from a full-size cake mix in two square 8-inch pans. Bake more batches if there'll be lots of guests.) Cool completely. Cut each layer in two, making four oblongs about 4x8 in size. Stack cake sections two (or three) deep, with creamy white frosting mix between layers and around the sides. For an icing little folks love, use orange juice instead of water as the liquid. Now top each wagon with creamy chocolate frosting mix, and while it's still soft press on lightly two diagonal lines of salted peanut halves, from corner to corner. Tuck the rest of the chocolate frosting into a pastry tube.

With dabs of frosting, stick two animal crackers on each side of the circus wagon, then one more at each end. With pastry tube, swing a thick scalloped line of frosting close to the top of each wagon, all way round. Add thin "bars" of frosting from top to bottom, right over the circus animals. Place a "nickel-size" peanut butter candy cup at each corner for wheels, securing them with hidden tooth-picks. Oblong paper snack plates from the dime store are just the size to hold one Circus Wagon Cake. All set? They are ready to roll!

PEANUT CRUNCH-CRUNCH is the happy result of grinding peanut brittle or peanut coconut brittle through the fine blade of your food chopper! Sprinkle it as a topper over ice cream or hot butter-scotch pudding. Fold it into whipped cream as a sweet fluff for toasted pound cake slices or a glamorous frosting for a split-level angel food cake. Or stir half a cup of the nutty crunch into drop cookie dough or blend it into spic-ey cake batter just before baking.

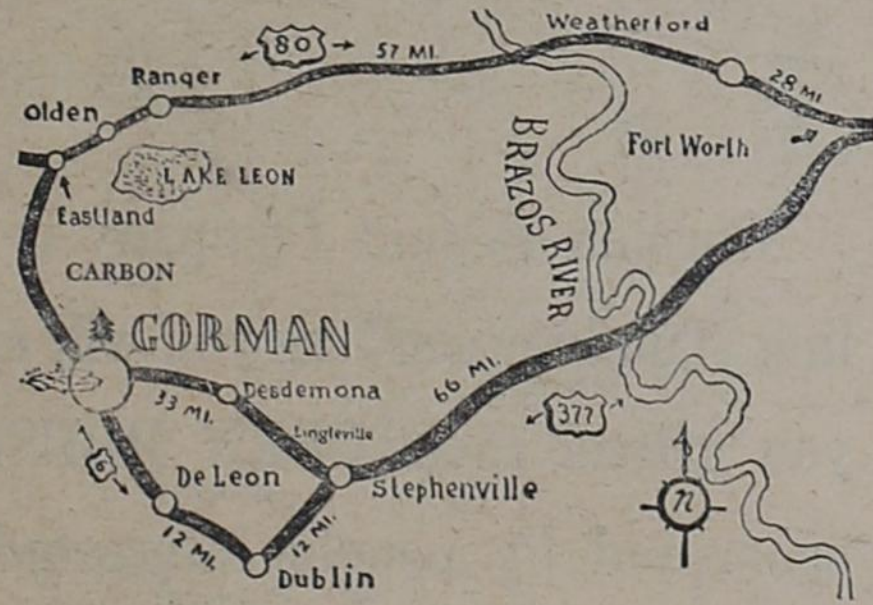

Daniel almost had trouble getting his campaign off the ground when a Department of Public Safety plane nipped its wing while lifting the governor off Austin ground for a Houston appearance. The party changed to a private plane, and proceeded to inspect the Carla-damaged San Jacinto Monument with representatives from the State Board of Control, Building Commission and State Archives.

Former Secretary of the Navy John Connally also suffered aerial setbacks in his search for support. Bad weather prevented him from landing for San Marcos and San Antonio speaking engagements. When the clouds cleared he carried his campaign to Laredo.

Sen. Jarrard Secrest, democratic candidate for lieutenant governor, followed Connally into Laredo to speak to PASSO supporters where champion traveler Tom Reavley joined him to get help for his attorney general's race.

Secrest announced the opening of his Austin office this week with a blaring banner on the avenue leading to the Capitol.

Will Wilson started crowding Daniel's position as patron of Texas teachers. Wilson stated that Texans need to take a "long, hard look at the curricula of our schools - - and then pay a little more attention to the advice of professional educators instead of well-meaning but ill-informed amateurs." He also suggested higher pay.

Another lieutenant governor contender, Sen. Crawford C. Martin, also started keeping shop in the capital city.

A Friday coffee party served as "house" warming for Waggoner Carr, former Speaker of the House, who's an attorney general hopeful.

Carr's office is just a block and a half from the Capitol grounds. Les Procter, another attorney general candidate, has his headquarters in a long silver trailer, across the street from the Capitol.

GOP HOPES TO BLANKET STATE - After State Democratic Executive Committee officials slung verbal arrows at the Republicans for not holding primary elections in every county and precinct, the GOPs embarked on a campaign to finance a primary in every county.

Paul Desrochers at Republican

State Headquarters said, "We're working like mad to get a primary in every county." Two obstacles stand in the way: Getting funds in about 235 counties where the party has county chairmen, and getting chairmen for the other 19 counties.

Some Republican candidates have a regional flavor - - like the 12 senatorial candidates who hope to represent 67 counties; or the 76 House of Representative hopefuls for 77 counties; and congressional candidates in all but seven districts. Republican party still wants general ballot representation for the winners among its two gubernatorial candidates, two candidates for lieutenant governor, and those seeking posts as congressman-at-large, commissioner of agriculture, general land office and on the railroad commission.

A step toward solicitations was made by GOP state chairman Tad R. Smith who appointed Dudley C. Sharp of Houston, former US Secretary of the Air Force, chairman of the Republicans' finance committee.

WATER STUDY REQUESTED - The Texas Water Commission asked Texas Research League to make a study of the commission's operations and the system of dividing the responsibility for Texas' water development among several state agencies.

The problem of water development and conservation in Texas is so great and controversial that the already-burdened League researchers estimate it will be 1963 before they can begin such a time consuming, comprehensive study.

Judge Otha F. Dent of the Water Commission expressed deep concern about meeting water requirements for 1980. Not only is it necessary to develop plans for constructing dams and reservoirs to fill the expected need, but the business of condemning land and building these projects involves as much as a decade.

One stage of the long-range development plan includes a \$65, 700,000 reservoir on the lower Navasota River. But supporters have run into the problem of excessive chloride content caused by oil field salt water waste disposal - - a problem repeated in many Texas streams.

Water Commission Engineer John Vandertulip will submit a report on the source of this pollution next week.

HIGHWAY SAFETY STUDIED

- - Top engineers and administrators from the state highway departments of Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana will gather this week to discuss uniform use of highway and street signs, signals and markings in an effort to increase driving safety.

Governor Daniel announced that traffic deaths over the past five years have averaged 230 below the 1956 toll. There were 2,611 traffic deaths in 1956, and the yearly average since then has been 2,381. Daniel credited the joint efforts of groups interested in traffic safety with the preservation of many lives.

'AIRCADE' DUE IN AUSTIN - U. S. Chamber of Commerce President Richard Wagner will head the team of national chamber officers, committeemen and staff specialists who will land

here March 8 on an "Aircade for Citizenship Action."

This will be the first Texas stop in the Aircade's sixth annual cross-country series of public discussions on legislative matters.

Former Gov. Allan Shivers is chairman of the Austin Aircade which will begin at the Municipal Auditorium at 9:25 a. m. and continue until 3:30 p. m. Delegations from all over the state are planning to wing in for the panel conference and \$7 luncheon.

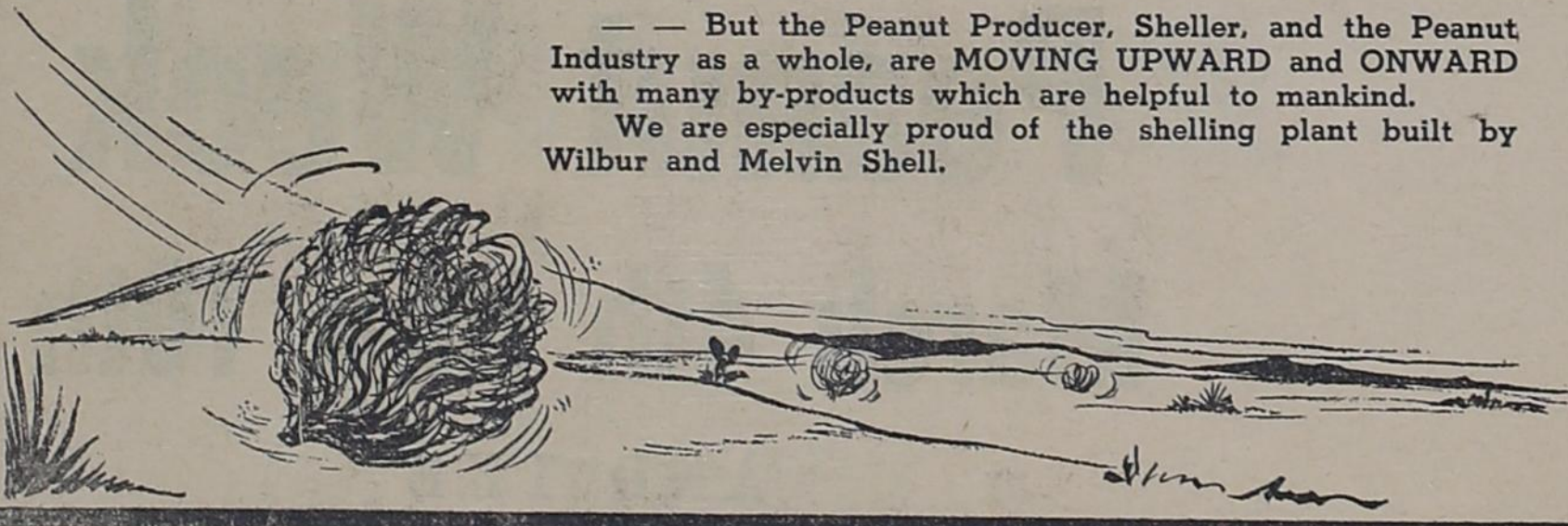

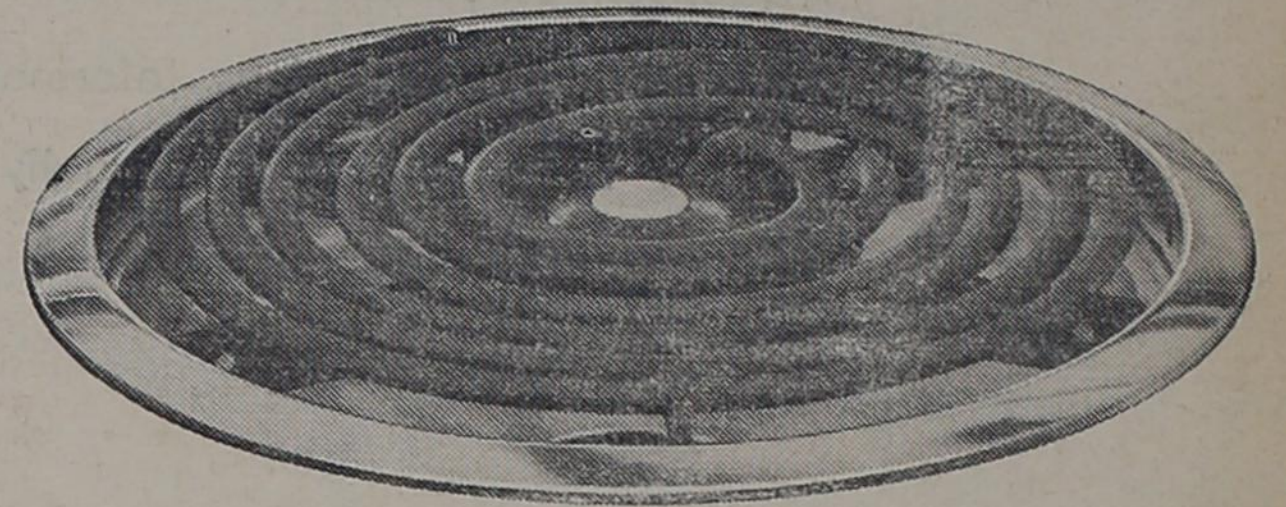

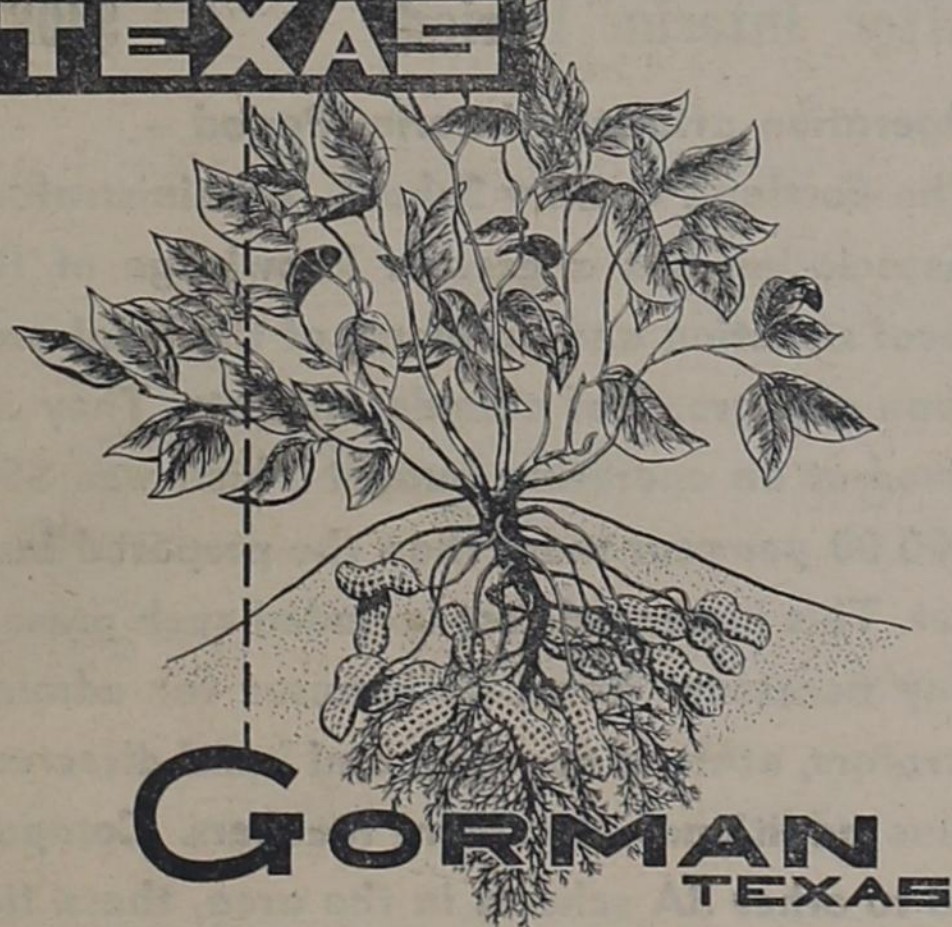

SCHOOL CONSOLIDATION --

Better Education? Lower Cost?

The proponents of school consolidation have stressed two points (1) better education and (2) lower cost. We concern ourselves here only with costs. The following facts and figures make the claim of lower costs under consolidation ridiculous. Information is being compiled locally which will tend to indicate their second claim of "better education" is equally misleading to taxpayers and school patrons. An article dealing with this will be found elsewhere in this issue. **So let's talk about costs --**

A careful study of the budget submitted by proponents of school consolidation reveals important discrepancies. We point out the following few which vitally affect the taxpayer and reveal that consolidation would not reduce taxes but would greatly increase them.

I. Decrease In Incentive Aid Resulting From Drop In Attendance \$116,316.00

By law (Senate Bill 80) our incentive aid payments could never be higher than at the time of consolidation, but if average daily attendance (ADA) dropped, incentive aid payments would decrease proportionately. If there were a 10% drop in ADA resulting from students in fringe areas transferring to other schools and from drop in population there would be a 10% drop in incentive aid. This would amount to one full year's payment or \$116,316.00 under this plan.

II. Interest On \$1,000,000 Construction Bond \$220,000.00

Even if it were possible to build a junior high school, senior high school, auditorium, cafeteria, gymnasium, football stadium, track, bus garages, vocational shop, sewage and water systems, and remodel existing facilities for \$1,000,000, (the new Brownwood high school not including additional facilities recently constructed for \$1,500,000) the interest on these bonds at a very favorable rate is \$220,000 for a ten year period. We should expect and demand better facilities than any of our six present systems if we should consolidate. Better facilities could easily be \$2,000,000.00 instead of \$1,000,000.00 and we have no assurance that a bond issue would pass, certainly one for \$2,000,000.00.

III. Deficit In The Operation Of The Six Schools During An Interim Period of 2 Years \$247,330.00

Interim Period - During time when \$116,316.00 in yearly salaries have been taken away from operating expenses and put into incentive aid, the schools are still six separate schools. The Eastland County School Administrators' Ass'n. studied this problem and concluded that there would be a deficit in operating expenses of \$123,665.00 per year, which amount can come only from increased local taxes. This organization and construction period could easily be two years.

IV. Deficit In Operation After Interim Period \$408,000.00

Operation after the Interim Period - The Eastland County School Administrators' Association has a greater knowledge of the local situation and problems of the local area than any group of outside analysts. They arrived at an operating budget which was \$51,000.00 per year more than the proposed budget. This increased cost included such present day necessary items as bonuses for administrators, athletic coaches, and band directors, plus additional classroom teachers. Compared to other 3A schools in the area, these figures are very conservative.

\$991,646.00

Even if all of the other estimates of the budget proposed by those favoring school consolidation are correct, these four items alone will require that local taxpayers raise \$991,646.00 more during the next 10 years than what they are now raising.

The ONLY SOURCE for this Money is LOCAL TAXES.

What About Transportation Problem In Proposed School Consolidation?

During the various discussions on Consolidation of Schools in Eastland County very little has been said about "Transportation" of students to and from the separate schools.

The Texas Education Agency has said that they will be most happy to send Agency men to Eastland County and these men will plot all bus routes in the consolidated district.

We do not feel that any group can come into our district, sit down at a drawing board with a road map and plan a successful operation. In the rural areas around Gorman our scholastic population is very scattered. One bus in particular is required to cover 72 miles each day and transports only 19 children to school. When weather conditions are bad in this particular area it sometime requires two hours to complete this route. How will a group of experts compensate for this type of problem.

It is the general feeling of most of the people who have spent much time in study of Consolidation that a successful transportation program cannot be carried out unless the rural roads are placed in much better conditions, and this can be done only through increased taxation for that purpose.

This operation, likewise, would require the best of busses. Small districts such as are maintained today can operate busses longer and more economically than could a large district because it would

not have the strict time schedule to meet that would be required in the consolidated district.

Since all students must be delivered to the proposed elementary school sites, then Junior High and High School students on to a central location, it is reasonable to believe that the time a student is required to ride a bus will be quite long. However, the people sponsoring the move for consolidation stated that the longest bus route would require only 45 minutes, one-way. We believe that it will be at least twice that time.

The Texas Education Agency has said that they will allocate some \$51,000.00 for the operation of the consolidated school district. Gorman School District, at the present time, earns at least one-fourth of the proposed amount, but we will have six schools in the new district. It is reasonable to assume that \$51,000 will not finance a good transportation system. If the State fund is not sufficient, then any additional funds needed must be raised from local sources.

Taking everything into consideration; 1. distance of routes, 2. time necessary for transporting to and from school, 3. additional funds, 4. bus driver salaries, 5. bus maintenance, and possibly, others it seems that pupil transportation is going to be one of the greatest problems which we will be confronted with should consolidation be carried out.

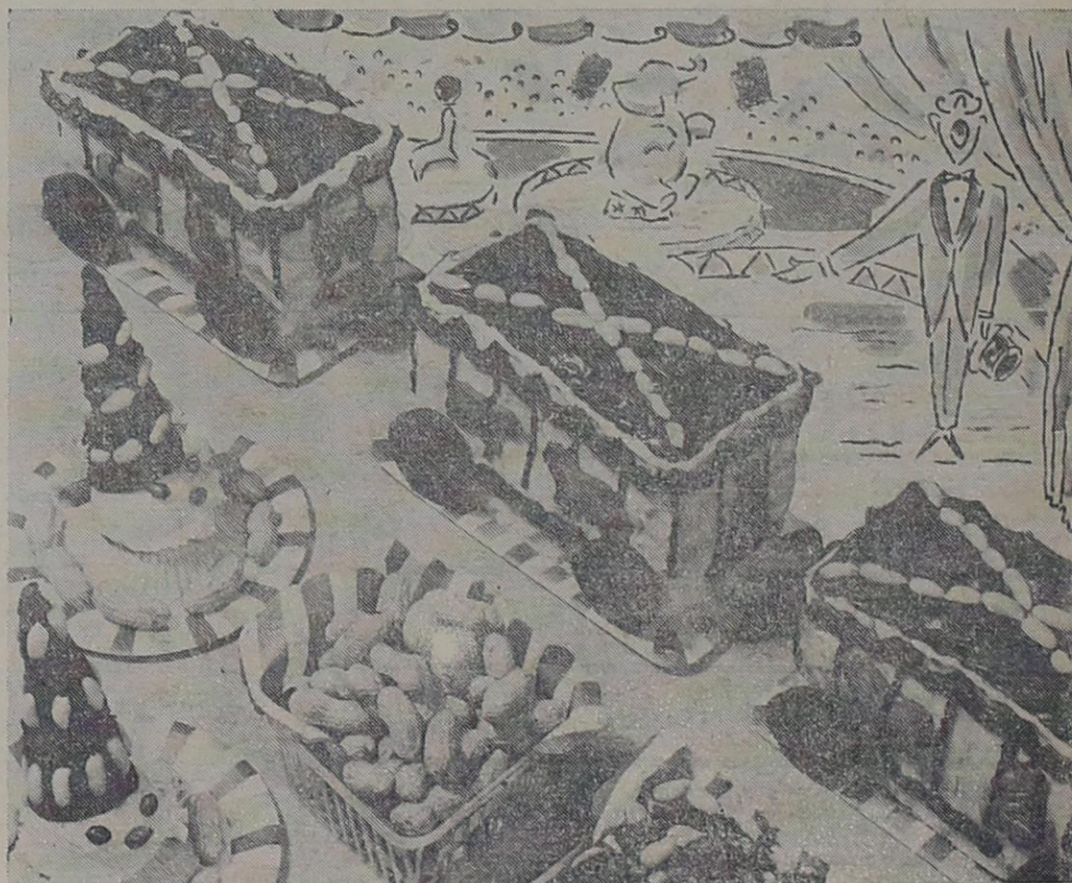

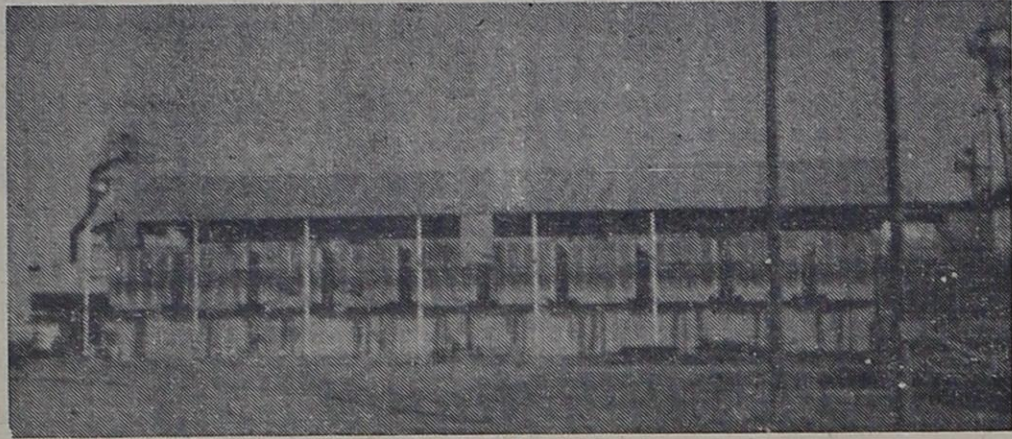
