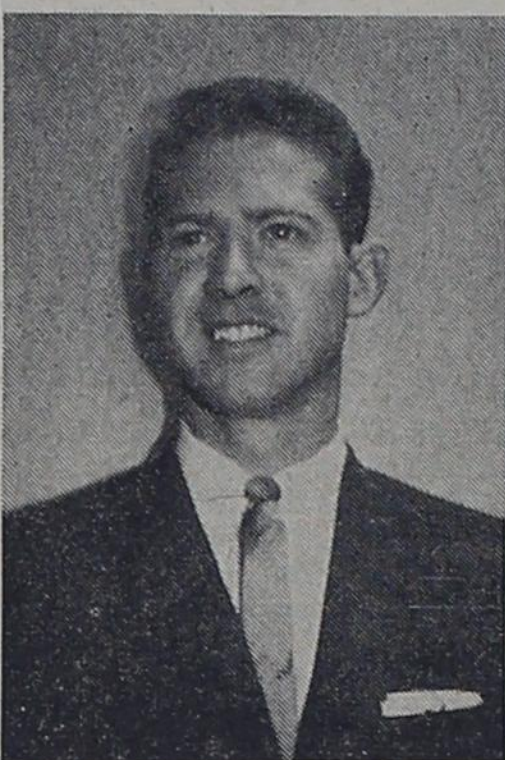

VOTERS DEFEAT CONSOLIDATION OF 6 DISTRICTS

According to Wendell Seibert, Eastland School Superintendent, who is President of the Eastland County School Administrators Association, there are four principal reasons why the 6-District Consolidation plan in Eastland County was not approved.

The proposal was defeated 3055 Against and 487 For.

The issue in question was the possible consolidation of high schools of Eastland, Ranger, Gorman, Desdemona and Carbon. Seibert lists the following factors as being responsible for the defeat of the issue: (1) Generally, voters were convinced after evaluation of existing systems that adequate educational opportunity is now available to students, (2) To have voted for consolidation would have immediately given rise to a multitude of unanswerable questions relative to organization, administration and construction costs, (3) Inaccuracy of cost estimates by consolidation proponents which would have resulted in much greater tax burdens on taxpayers in years to come, and, (4) Resentment of the majority toward the arbitrary manner in which the plan was drawn up and promoted in the county.

The balloting for the six districts involved was as follows:

The total vote showed that 86.2% were against consolidation.
