

## Peanut "Turn Row" Tour

1999 is sure not a repeat of 1998 as cooler temperatures and recent rains have really helped the peanut crop. Growers throughout the Cross Timbers are hopeful that 1999 will be the year for peanut production but it's still a long ways to fall and growers do not need to slack up now. Weed and disease control will both be hot topics for peanut growers as they move in July and both will be covered in the first Peanut "Turn Row" Tour set for Tuesday, July 20, 1999. Registrations is set for 9:00 am at Farley Farm Supply in DeLeon with the tour leaving by 9:30 am. Two Continuing Education: Credits will be offered to private, commercial and noncommercial applicators and the tour will end with a sponsored noon meal. To preregister please contact the Texas Agricultural Extension Service office in Comanche at 915/356-2539 or fax 915/356-3710.

Individuals with disabilities who require an auxiliary aid, service or accommodation in order to participate in this program are encouraged to contact the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Comanche County at 915/356-2539 to determine how reasonable accommodations can be made.

Two or maybe three stops of area peanut fields will be made on the Turn Row Tour. Weed control is always difficult in either dry weather or wet weather and this years rains can create a situation of excessive weed growth. Dr. Eric Prostko, Extension Agronomist, will discuss herbicides that can be used to help clean up problems as well as discuss how well new products are working so far.

Dr. Robert Lemon, Extension Agronomist, Texas A&M University, will address irrigation needs and variety performance so far in 1999. Dr. Chip Lee, Extension Plant Pathologist, will also be on hand to discuss disease control recommendations. This may be a bad disease year owing to the extra moisture and producers will need to keep on top of leafspot, rhizoctonia and southern blight.

Dear Jake,

How are you doing??

I understand there is a new children's home being built outside the city limits of Gorman. I also understand there is some controversy about this home. I know this controversy has upset a lot of the good and caring folks in and around Gorman (including Uncle J). You know, my Dad (L. A. Bennett), is probably turning over in his grave. It is very disturbing to me because I grew up around there and, of course you still live there. It is disturbing to know that the people I looked up to and think so much of, have become so self centered and down right hateful. The Gorman that I knew, would have been the ideal place to build a children's home. I my travels around the country and business dealings all over the world, I always knew and relied on the principles and family values I learned having grown up in the area. This is an opportunity that most communities do not get and most do not have the values to share. I have seen these children and have interacted with them. It is only very very special people that can give these children the love, guidance, and values they will need to succeed in becoming good citizens. Remember, what ever they learn from the people of Gorman and Eastland County, Texas, will determine the kind of people they become. There is an opportunity to help mold these children to come responsible citizens or not help and build prisons for later.

You and I can not imagine what these children have endured. I cannot begin to imagine what it is like to have no place to belong. No Dad, No Mom, and No Home. It is a scary thought for me at 47 years old. Just think what it is like being 7-12. You and I are old enough to be able to change our situations, the children are not. They are totally dependent on what we say they will do until they are old enough to do it themselves.

Whether this home or others like it succeed, will depend on the kind of people they interact with. I sincerely hope the people I knew, do not let this opportunity slip away.

### An Open Letter

To: The Citizens of Gorman

A lot has been said concerning the proposed opening of the Children's Ranch. Most of what I have heard has come from the side which opposes the ranch. The picture that has been painted for us is a tribe of unholy hoodlums. Predators who will invade this town and terrorize it. Adolescent nightmares who will make us prison-

ers of our own homes and businesses. The truth is, that there are mostly kids who have had difficulty and/or trauma at one point in their lives. Many have never had the opportunity of being raised in a productive environment. The behaviors that they exhibit are a response to their previous environ-

Gorman has a tremendous opportunity to do God's work. To share with these children the Christian lifestyle Gorman apparently has to offer.

Sadly, though, I don't think that 7/10/43 will be the case. I believe that enough people will give into fear ( or already have) instead of relying on their faith in God. I believe enough judgment will be passed, enough dirty look will be given, and enough animosity will be present, that should those children arrive they will feel, at best, less than welcome

What a monumental opportunity to burial serve the Lord, gone.

Sadly, also, since "Level 5 kids" aren't welcome in Gorman, then I don't feel welcome either. Not only do I treat these children as my own, but I am one of "those kids." Fifteen years ago, a young couple took on a house of eight unruly, aggressive, troubled boys and taught us not only how to socialize properly, but also taught us the way of the Lord. I, as some of you know, am a counselor now. Others of us have gone on to be framing contractors, welders, tug boat captains, and store

I can honestly say that I don't know of one of us that is in jail or in trouble with the law today. So you see, it really is probable for "us" to reform.

But, like I stated, I don't feel welcome. Me or my "Mexican" family, if I can use a description of a man, I spoke with outside the meeting.







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#### A&M helps recover last Caddo village

COLLEGE STATION - A Texas A&M University archaeologist has been called upon to help the Texas Historical Commission recover one of the state's last Caddo villages from beneath an East Texas pine forest.

"This site is reputed to be the last Caddo Indian village in Texas," said Alston Thoms of the Center Bank, Eastland, TX 76448. for Ecological Archaeology in Texas A&M College of Liberal Arts. "It's the place where the Caddo were living before they were forced out of Texas in the early 1800s."

After the Caddo left the area, Thoms said the land was used for agricultural crops and eventually a pine plantation.

"It's now a forest," he said. Thoms and a small group of graduate students visited the site near Jefferson to assist the Texas Historical Commission's effort to unearth artifacts that may provide insight into the Caddo way of life. Representatives of the Caddo Na-

tion also are participating in the

project.

"We were invited to participate because of the work we've already been doing over in Tyler at an old Civil-War prisoner of war camp, called Camp Ford," he said. "We've developed a lot of expertise in how sites are preserved in the sandy soils of East Texas and we'll be working with the historical commission to help them assess the preservation conditions for the remains.

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
