

Such certificate shall entitle such voter to vote at any general, special, or primary election held between the date of its issuance, and one year from the 31st day


Given in marriage by her father the bride wore a street-length dress of white brocade cotton. The fitted bodice featured a round neckline which dipped to a low v in the back.
