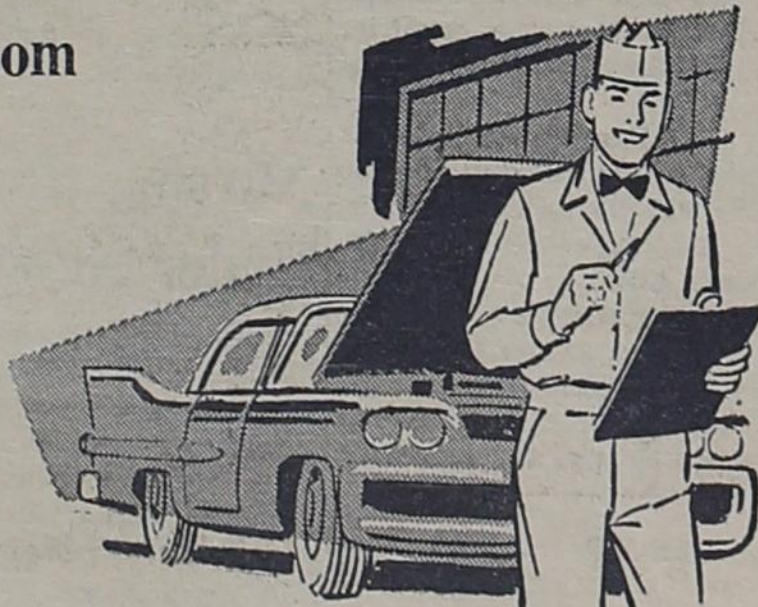

Atomic Testing**

increased the world's raidation level, but a survey of scientists made by the American Medical Association emphasizes that the possible effect to date on our health is insignificant. And that no time since the first U.S. device was exploded has the radiation caused man's bomb testing equalled the earth's natural radiation level, according to the Argonne National Laboratory . . . AIRBORNE MISSILE LAUNCHER is being studied by the Department of Defence. The proposed aircraft would stay on patrol for two days or more without fueling and provide a mobile, hard-to-hit launching pad comparable to our Polaris submarines.

RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT expenditure, by U.S. industry have rocketed from 1.8 billion dollars in 1945 to 13.5 billions this year and may top 25 billions by the end of this decade . . .

SMALL BAZOOKA charges, similar to the cone-shaped explosives used in military armor-piercing rockets, are used effectively for perforating oil well casings. They are lowered into narrow well shafts and fired sideways into rock formations to open passages for oil into the shafts. Jet velocities up to 25,000 feet per second are created, according to PGAC, Houston.

HARD-TO-SAY drug names were condemned at a recent conference of pharmaceutical, medical, and government representatives in New York. The medical men also sought to put a stop to the overworking of certain common fixtures such as "chlor," "phen," "methl," and "iso."

AN ELECTRONIC PURIFIER for swimming pools deposits ions in the water to kill germs and algae. It's safe for humans and eliminates need for chemical additives which sometimes irritates swimmers eyes . . . **SAFETY NET** for drivers and front seat auto passengers is said to be fired automatically by cartridges at the moment of collision or a panic stop. The Australian inventor claims the net pops into place with in ten milliseconds of the instant an automatic device triggers the cartridges.

**Time To Request
Conservation Help**

Farmers who are interested in establishing soil and water conservation practices on their farms under the 1962 Agricultural Conservation Program should file their requests as soon as possible, suggests William F. Bryant, Chairman, Comanche County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Requests to participate in the program must be filed at the County ASC office in Comanche and the conservation practice approved before work is begun.

Under the 1962 program, farmers may get help averaging about one-half the cost of carrying out such conservation practices as establishing and improving vegetative cover of grasses and legumes for soil protection, installing erosion control structures, and practices for the conservation or more efficient use of water.

The Agricultural Conservation Program is designed to encourage farmers to protect soil, water and woodland resources by sharing the costs of needed conservation measures.

"Without this assistance, most farmers simply couldn't afford to make this needed investment, particularly since the majority of these practices provide little or no immediate returns," Mr. Bryant explained.

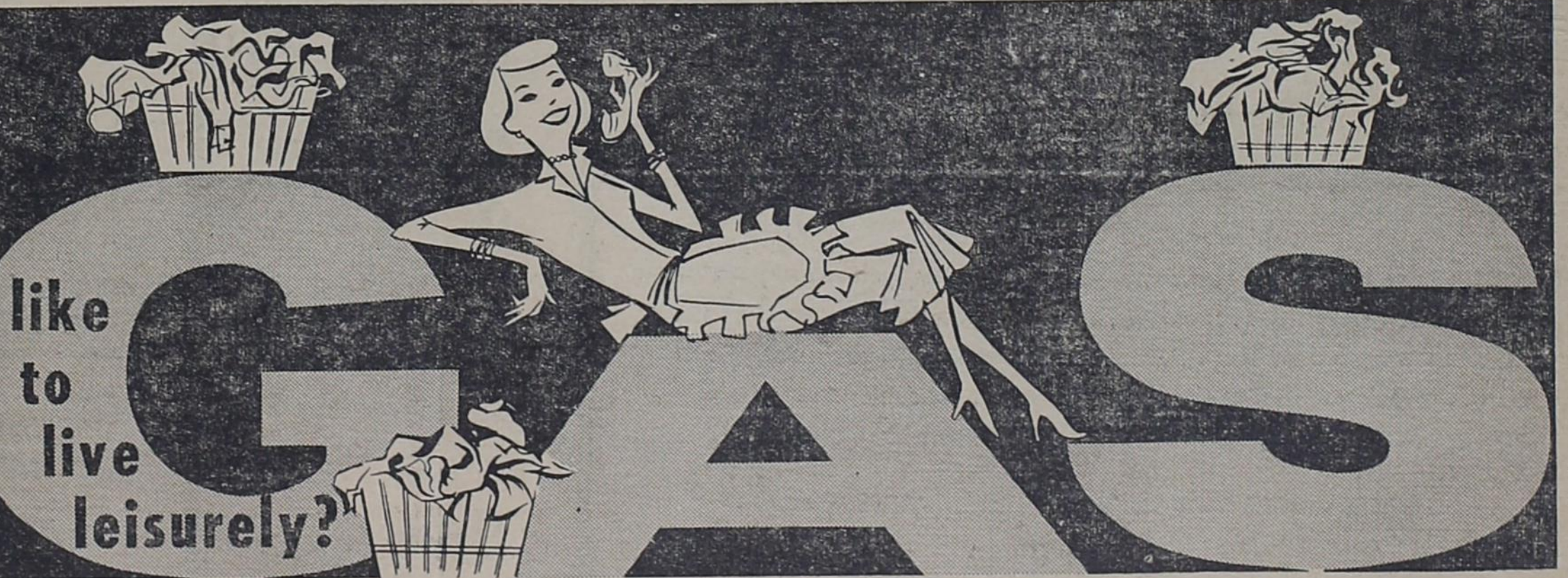

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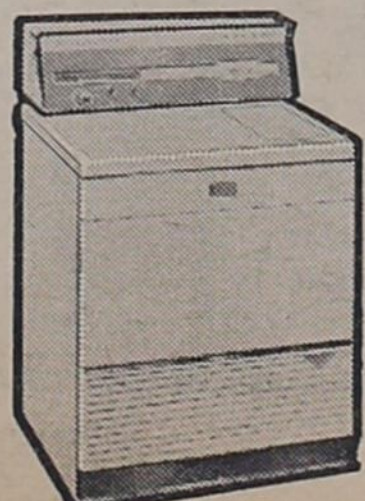

"Miss Texas" and Bonanza Stars To Appear At Ft. Worth Stock Show-Rodeo

FORT WORTH... The 1962 entertainment lineup for the world's original indoor rodeo, the Fort Worth Stock Show Rodeo, has been completed - - and it looks like a real bonanza for the fans, says President-Manager W.R. Watt.

TV's popular "Bonanza" show will furnish two top stars for the rodeo entertainment slate. Lorne Green as rancher Ben Cartwright and Texas-born Dan Blocker as huge Hoss will appear in person at all 20 performances of the Fort Worth Rodeo, January 26 through February 4.

Blocker and Greene have helped jump "Bonanza" to the top of the heap, replacing the Dinah Shore Show in Sunday night prime time. Though Hoss and Ben will furnish the humor, audiences will look elsewhere for its beauty.

They'll find it amply supplied in "Miss Texas," Fort Worth's Linda Loftis, who will ride in every rodeo and sing the National Anthem to open each performance and in "Miss Rodeo America of 1962," pretty Marie Mass of Pinon, Colo. Miss Mass also will ride in all 20 grand entries and will compete as one of the rodeo's 41 swift riding ranch girl barrel racers.

The spotlight will fall also on trick riding and roping Montie Montana, who holds a unique distinction. In the 1953 inaugural parade for President Eisenhower, Montana neatly slipped a loop over the President's head as Ike sat in the reviewing stand. The President responded with his famous smile, but the secret service has since made it plain that they prefer Montie's skill be confined to rodeo arenas.

The fabled ability and intelligence of Scotch Sheep Dogs will be displayed at every Fort Worth Rodeo performance, as Arthur Allen's canine troupers go through their paces with live sheep in the Will Rogers Memorial Coliseum arena.

It's to be an honest exhibition of what the working sheep dog can do, for the dogs are not merely show performers. They have earned their honors in many actual field trials.

President-Manager Watt point-

ed out that the main course of every Fort Worth Rodeo performance is furnished by the cowboys. In all, approximately 400 of the rugged individualists will be competing for about \$70,000 in saddle bronc riding, bearback bronc riding, steer wrestling bull riding and calf roping.

Still more icing on the cake will be the ranch girl barrel races, open cutting horse competition and place at all 20 performances in Fort Worth.

Action will start at 8 p.m. Friday Jan. 26 and there will be rodeo performances at 10 a.m., 2 and 8 p.m. the next day. Then, Sunday through the closing Sunday, Feb. 4 rodeo performances will start at 2 and 8 p.m. daily Ticket prices are \$3 and \$2.50 for all nights and Friday, Saturday, and Sunday afternoons, and 2.50 and \$2 for Monday through Thursday afternoons and Saturday morning.

Tickets for the Fort Worth Stock Show Rodeo, good for admission to the grounds also, may be ordered from the Fort Worth Stock Show, P.O. Box 150, Fort Worth. Exact performances desired should be specified.
