

## MIEARS, D. SMITH AND G. SMITH WIN IN CITY ELECTION TUESDAY

There are seven candidates listed on the Gorman Independent School Trustee ballot for the three places to be filled in the School Trustee Election set for Saturday, April 7th.

Candidates seeking first terms are E. G. Henderson, Joe Bob Browning, Arnold Butler, and Claude Fuller.

Incumbents seeking re-election are W. T. Shell, Wilburn Overstreet and Thurman Jay.

The polls will open at 8 a. m. Saturday in the High School building and will close at 7 p. m.

A large turnout of voters is expected as over 800 voted in the recent school consolidation election, and the same voters are eligible to vote in Saturday's election. This is a reminder, as some voters have been confused on their eligibility.

## Excelsior Sponsor Planning Meet For Diamond Jubilee

Representing the Excelsior Club at the Fire Hall on Wednesday afternoon, Mrs. M. H. Fairbetter, civic chairman, proposed that Gorman celebrate its Diamond Jubilee.

From a letter from the National Archives in Washington she gave the information that the town was established as Shin Oak in October, 1888, and that its name had been changed to Gorman in December, 1889.

The idea of a Jubilee Celebration came from Mrs. F. R. Haile.

On the motion of W. C. Browning and a second by Gabe Wright the group voted to set the date Gorman was established as October, 1888.

Those present, representing the town organizations, agreed to report the proposal to their respective groups for approval and cooperation in planning.

## SWINE SHORT COURSE SLATED FOR GORMAN ON APRIL 9-13

A swine short course for adult farmers will be held April 9th through April 13th under the sponsorship of the Gorman High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. Bob Browder, Superintendent, and Mr. E. C. Bramlett, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Mr. W. B. Thomas, swine specialist with the Vocational Agricultural Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Husbandry at Texas A&M College, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M.

Mr. Thomas holds a B. S. and M. S. Degree in Animal Husbandry from Texas A&M College. He has had several years of on-the-farm experience including four years as Head of the Livestock Department of Rio Farms. The

livestock included some 300 brood sows.

"Many swine short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Thomas and all have met with outstanding success," according to Mr. J. B. Payne, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Stephenville. Arrangements for the adult education short course in swine husbandry and in other fields are made through Mr. Payne's office.

The short course at Gorman is scheduled to begin April 9 at 7 p. m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series will be held April 10, 11, 12, and 13th. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Thomas will be available to assist students with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Mr. E. C. Bramlett.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Browder, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Bramlett. An entry fee of \$2.00 will be charged. Swine Husbandry Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each student who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Thomas states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interest of farmers enrolled, but that he expects to cover such subjects as selecting and breeding, feeding and feeding requirements, management, disease and parasites, housing and equipment, and marketing.

In the Commissioner balloting, Davis Smith polled 358 to defeat Ben R. Townley who received 150. Both men were seeking Commissioner Place 4 on the City Council.

George L. (Bud) Smith, who did not have an opponent for Commissioner Place 2, received 492 votes.

The mayor and each commissioner are elected for two year terms.

Holdover members on the City Council are Doyle Preston and G. C. Acrea.

Your County Judge acts as Juvenile Judge, in handling the neglected and delinquent children of our county. The County Attorney and I have done the very best we know how to make useful citizens out of these youngsters who have been neglected and who have fallen in the pitfalls of life. In dealing with these children we usually call in business men, school teachers and ministers of the various churches to help to advise and counsel with us in making our decisions. A number of these boys have reached the age of 17 and have entered the Armed Forces and are making good citizens. Some have engaged in various vocations of life and a very few of them have been sent to the Boys Training School at Gatesville.

We are very proud of the 4-H Club work that the Commissioners' Court sponsors in the county. There are now approximately 800 boys and girls enrolled in the various 4-H Clubs over the county. The 4-H's stand for the development of the head, heart, hands and health. The parents of the club boys and girls, the local leaders who give of their time, and the county extension agents are to be complimented and congratulated on their fine program of work. The problems arising relative to juvenile delinquency in the county are kept at a minimum

because of 4-H Club and other youth activities.

Your Commissioner's Court has never refused to help our aged people of our county or any family who was in dire need of help, medical help or hospital care since I became your County Judge.

When I became your County Judge, the Commissioner's Court appointed a County Veterans officer for each American Legion Post in the county, to assist the Disabled War Veterans, their widows and dependents in securing Federal Aid. Last year these Veterans Officers secured \$570,429.00 for these disabled war veterans and their dependents of Eastland County.

We have maintained sufficient money in our Road and Bridge funds to purchase Right-of-Ways on all Farm-to-Market Roads, and the County's part of Right-of-Ways on State Highways being built or improved in the county. Under our present plans, we will be able to keep an ample amount of money in the Road and Bridge funds to finance all Right-of-Way costs for several years in the future. We have done this without raising your taxes.

When I became County Judge and a member of the Commis-

ioners' Court, the county owed \$708,190.00, which included the Court House debt of \$150,000.00. We have paid off the Court House debt and have paid off the balance of the \$4½ million Road Bond debt. On April 1, 1962, we have cash on hand, \$287,865.20. The total indebtedness of the county is \$97,786.09. Only five counties of the 254 counties of this state have a lower tax rate than Eastland County. So, you can see that the financial condition of Eastland County is in the best shape than for many years.

If I happen to fail to see you during the campaign, I am now asking your help and support on May 5th.




