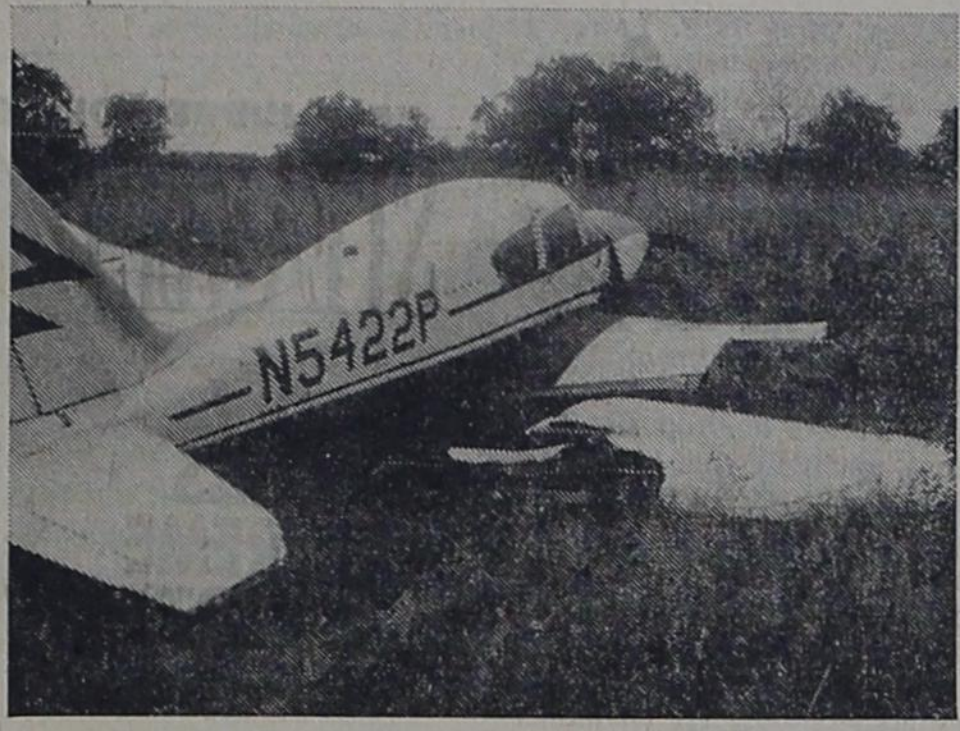

'SCREWORM LINE' MOVES TO LAMPASAS

AUSTIN — The screwworm inspection line was angled to include a point just south of Lampasas when Texas Animal Health Commission authorities and members of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Animal Disease Eradication Division confirmed screwworm cases in Burnet and Blanco counties.

Until this discovery, the inspection line only extended from Del Rio to Columbus then south to the Gulf Coast on Highway 7. The new dividing line takes in all counties north of Highway 90 above Columbus as well as counties west of a line drawn from Columbus to the northern boundary of Burnet County.

249 Worm Cases

Dr. John L. Wilbur, Jr. of the USDA said 249 confirmed screwworm infestations were reported from 29 counties last month, and 75 counties reported 176 non-screwworm infestations.

Production of sterile flies is being stepped up to meet the quota for "Operation Screwworm Eradication" which involves releasing buzzing combat troops from airplanes over south and central Texas at the rate of 200 sterile flies per square mile per day. These flies are also being dropped in the southeast section of Brazoria County.

Doubled Output

Rearing facilities at Kerrville are being doubled to attain a turnout of 20,000,000 flies per week by mid-April, and construction of another plant is progressing at Mission, where 75 million flies per week can be produced. A sterile fly distribution center is near operation in Laredo, and several others are planned.

Dr. Wilbur announced that the state of New Mexico has joined the battle against this brand of cattle infestation, and survey and sterile fly dispersal operations will begin there this month.
