PETITION TO MAKE EASTLAND COUNTY BRUCELLOSIS-FREE SENT TO LIVESTOCK COMMISSION

According to Ross Wilson, President, Eastland County Livestock Raisers' Association, petitions containing names of livestock producers in Eastland County, properly certified by Mr. J. C. Allison, County Tax Assessor-Collector, as representing over 51% of the cattle population in the county and 75% of producers on the tax roll were submitted to the Livestock Sanitary Commission in Austin on Tuesday, July 10. This completes the first requirement in the procedure to make Eastland County a Brucellosis free area. Petitions have recently been available in all communities of the county for livestock producers to sign petitioning the Livestock Sanitary Commission of Texas to make the proper tests of cattle in the county and take other steps as required by law to certify Eastland County as a Type II Brucellosis Control Area.

Special credit is due Vocational Agriculture teachers in the various communities of the county, Mr. J. M. Cooper, County Agent, Mr. Ben McKinnis, Texas Electric Service Company, Mr. Glynn Gilliam, Secretary, Livestock Association, and to the various citizens in each community who worked with the Vocational Agriculture teachers in securing signatures of producers.

Following a waiting period to be specified by the Livestock Sanitary Commission, a hearing will be held in Austin wherein parties who object to the program will be given an opportunity to voice their objections.

At the present time livestock producers marketing cattle in the county are doing so at inconvenience and expense to themselves, the buyer and the livestock auction operator. Currently, all breeding animals which are over eight months old and which originate in the so-called "dirty" counties that go back to the farms from the auction ring have to be tested for Brucellosis. In addition to extra expense and delayed payments, loadings of cattle are also slowed down, all of which may be causing buyers to stay away from markets in counties which are unclear.

Wilson stated that officials of the Livestock Sanitary Commission have notified him that educational meetings of livestock producers will be held at various points in the county prior to beginning the testing program. Such meetings will enable state officials to explain in detail how the testing program will be carried out and how livestock producers can accelerate the procedure.

County livestock producers will be kept fully posted on developments from time to time.

The law and pertinent regulations pertaining thereto, according to Dr. R. G. Garrett, TAHC executive director, state that all cattle consigned or delivered to livestock markets in Texas shall be tested or vaccinated for brucellosis before leaving the market, except those cattle in one of the following categories:

1. Steers, sprayed heifers, calves less than eight months old and officially vaccinated animals under 30 months of age.
2. Cattle originating from certified brucellosis herds.
3. Cattle originating from non-quarantined herds within modified brucellosis areas.
4. Cattle consigned on an official health certificate or certificate of test showing a negative test to brucellosis within the past 30 days.
5. Cattle sold for immediate slaughter.
6. Cattle sold and delivered to approved feedlots.
7. Cattle moving from one state or federally approved market to another state or federally approved market, provided they are accompanied by a permit.

Status Must Be Determined

The brucellosis status of all cattle consigned to the market, the law says, must be determined as they enter, and they must be identified and penned accordingly.

If a consignor states his cattle have been recently tested but are not from a modified certified brucellosis county, he must produce a certificate of test not more than 30 days old. Vaccination ear tags will not be considered, since the tags could easily have been there more than 30 days.

Should a consignor state his cattle are from a modified certified brucellosis county, his license number and county will be checked and recorded. A "modified brucellosis county" is one where United States Department of Agriculture veterinarians have found that fewer than 5 per cent of the herds have fewer than 1 per cent

FARM PRICES SHOW 30% DIP

AUSTIN — Prices received by Texas farmers and ranchers on June 15 for all farm products showed a 3 point decrease from mid-May, according to the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The June 15 index was 260 percent of the January 1910-December 1914 base, compared with 263 last month and 249 a year ago.

All crops showed a decrease of 4 points from last month. This index at 244 compares with 248 last month but was 12 points above a year ago.

The livestock and livestock products index at 285 percent of the 1910-1914 base was practically the same as last month but was 7 points above last June.

Meat animals were only 1 point above last month but were 20 points, almost 6 percent, higher than a year ago. Beef cattle prices were 30c per cwt. above last month but lower prices were calves 20c, hogs 30c, and sheep 40c. Lamb prices were the same.

All prices in the poultry and egg index showed a decrease from last month. Broilers showed a slight decline from mid-May; turkeys were off 1c per pound and eggs were down slightly. The index, at 153, was 3 points below last month.

Wholesale milk price slumped to \$4.30 per cwt., compared with \$4.35 last month and \$4.80 last year. Mohair prices at 67c per pound compared with 69c last month and 91c last June. Wool showed a 1c per pound drop during the month.

Can Be Tested Before Sale

Should the consignor have cattle not exempt from testing and he wished to have them tested prior to a sale, this test will be run by a veterinarian, and the cost will be deducted from the consignor's check.

Should the consignor have cattle not exempt from testing and he does not wish to have them tested prior to the sale, then these cattle must be identified by the market as cattle of unknown status and penned accordingly. Should these cattle be sold for slaughter or an approved feedlot, they may be released without a test, but if they sell for any other purpose they must be tested prior to release from the market, and the expense will be borne by the purchaser.

Jerry Dupuy Goes To Dominican Rep.

Twenty-one Peace Corps Volunteers departed for the Dominican Republic July 11 to help that country's Ministry of Agriculture establish a Rural Development Service.

The group — 21 men with agricultural specialties, hailing from 14 different states — just completed two months of intensive training at the University of Puerto Rico. After spending home leave from July 1 to the 10th, they departed from Miami the morning of July 11, arriving in Santo Domingo that afternoon. The volunteers will receive two more weeks of training and orientation before getting their assignments.

This Peace Corps project will mainly be concentrated in the rich agricultural areas of the Cibao Valley and will stress the use of improved agricultural practices and techniques through extension methods. Along with 18 Dominicans, who trained with them in Puerto Rico, the Volunteers will assist the Ministry of Agriculture in organizing a Rural Development Service. This Service will undertake such things as: reforestation, agricultural cooperatives, rural youth organization, elementary agricultural education, etc.

TEXAS FEEDER PRICES CLIMB DURING JUNE

FORT WORTH — Improved moisture conditions contributed to higher stocker and feeder prices during June, and the supply of fat cattle in Texas feedlots declined from the number on feed the preceding month.

The latest monthly summary issued by the Cattle Feeders Division of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association points out that it is a normal procedure for some feedlots to greatly reduce their feeding volume during the summer months, but that much of the present decline can be attributed to the price relationship between feeder and slaughter cattle.

All classes of replacement cattle moved higher with light weight grass type cattle showing the most advance. Calves were \$1 to \$3 higher and feeder steers 500 pounds and up looked 50c to \$1.50 higher, according to Lloyd Bergsma, director of the TSCRA Cattle Feeders Division. During the first part of June prices were stronger on fat cattle, but the last two weeks of the month prices turned lower and a part of the earlier price increases were erased.

In the dressed beef trade, supplies of beef were not excessive, but the demand was only fair at best. Demand for the better grades of beef generally slacks off during the summer months as consumers increase consumption of cold cuts and other processed meats.

At Los Angeles, choice steer beef 500-600 pounds was quoted

\$1 lower at the month's close compared to the previous month. Heifer beef of the same weight and grade was also off \$1 per hundred. At New York, choice steer beef 600-700 pounds was 25c to 50c lower than last month's close. In the slaughter trade, both steers and heifers weighing 650 pounds and down were in strong demand in June. Bergsma said the supply of this weight cattle has been very limited and grass fat calves will probably fill a major share of this demand during the next 90 days.

Mixed Trend For Southwest Grains

DALLAS — Southwest cash grain markets displayed a mixed price trend during the holiday-shortened week, reports the Agricultural Marketing Service.

Wheat firmed, grain sorghums and barley held steady, but other grains finished on the weak side. Wheat advanced ½ to 1c a bu. behind good demand and limited offerings. Receipts, however, were larger than the previous week and trading was the heaviest since harvest began. Farmers and country elevators continue to hold stocks and offerings were short of trade needs. No. 1 hard winter wheat closed at \$2.48½ to \$2.60½ a bu., domestic rate and \$2.32½ to \$2.34½, export track basis.

Yellow corn lost 2c, reflecting slightly expanded receipts and indifferent demand. No. 2 grade finished at \$1.40½ to \$1.42½ a bu. No. 2 white corn closed ½ to 1c lower at \$1.58 to \$1.60½ a bushel.

No. 2 yellow grain sorghums held steady at \$2.13 to \$2.18 per cwt., with both demand and offerings light. Most traders appear to be awaiting expansion of harvest before making further commitments.

No. 2 white oats closed at 87 to 89c a bu., down ½c for the week, with lack of offerings proving a barrier to trading.
