Mixed Trend For

DALLAS - Southwest cash grain markets displayed a mixed price trend during the holidayshortened week, reports the Agricultural Marketing Service.

Wheat firmed, grain sorghums and barley held steady, but other grains finished on the weak side.

Wheat advanced 1 to 1c a bu. behind good demand and limited offerings. Receipts, however, were larger than the previous week and trading was the heaviest since harvest began. Farmers and country elevators continue to hold stocks and offerings were short of trade needs. No. 1 hard winter wheat closed at \$2.481 to \$2.601 a bu., domestic rate and \$2.321 to \$2.341, export track basis.

Yellow corn lost 2c, reflecting slightly expanded receipts and indifferent demand. No. 2 grade finished at \$1.40½ to \$1.42½ a bu. No. 2 white corn closed ½ to 1c lower at \$1.58 to \$1.60½ a bushel.

No. 2 yellow grain sorghums held steady at \$2.13 to \$2.18 per cwt., with both demand and offerings light. Most traders appear to be awaiting expansion of harvest before making further commitments.

No. 2 white oats closed at 87 to 89c a bu., down 1c for the week, with lack of offerings proving a barrier to trading.
