

SABIN ORAL IMMUNIZATION DAY AGAINST POLIO SLATED AUGUST 25 IN GORMAN FIRE HALL 1-7 PM

According to Arlton E. Smith, Chairman of the Sabin Polio Immunization Committee, oral vaccine will be administered to the people of Gorman and the surrounding communities from 1:00 to 7:00 p. m. Saturday, August 25. A charge of 25 cents will be made to those able to pay and the people that are unable to pay, no charge will be made.

The program is voluntary. All professional organizations connected with the vaccine state flatly that it has been proven safe through the most careful testing probably ever given a medical product.

To those who feel they would rather wait a while, we would like to point out that it's almost impossible to avoid coming in contact with the polio virus at sometime during an individual's life. Many persons simply don't contact the disease, even though virus enters their bodies. Others may have mild cases that are passed off as colds. For some, however, it means death or crippling for life.

The question before you is whether you want to take your chance with almost certain contact with the dangerous natural virus, or whether you prefer to take the harmless vaccine, and become immune.

All people, regardless of age, are asked to take this vaccine. The chance to know out polio is one which no community can afford to miss.

Dr. W. M. Brogdon, city health officer, will administer the dosages and urges every citizen in the surrounding area to receive the vaccine.

Application blank for the Sabin Oral Polio vaccine may be found elsewhere in this issue. It may be used for either the Gorman drive on Saturday, August 25, or the Eastland drive on Saturday, August 18th.

The other two dosages of the Sabin vaccine will be given at as soon as the dates are set, a later date and will be announced.

Ross Wilson Heads County Hereford Breeders Ass'n.

A Charter was recently granted by the state of Texas certifying the Incorporation of the Eastland County Hereford Breeders' Association. The Association, composed of some fifteen breeders of registered Hereford cattle in Eastland county, met in Gorman August 8 to elect officers and to adopt Association By-Laws.

Present were Ed Harrison, Ross Wilson, Robert Whit and Dean Kirk of Gorman; T. L. Wheat, R. L. Wheat, Wince Graham, Raymond Beck and Bill Hoffman, Eastland; E. F. Penn and David Pickrel, Ranger; and Hardy Tidwell, Desdemona. Also present and assisting in the meeting were J. M. Cooper, County Agricultural Agent, and Roger Blackmon, Assistant Agricultural Agent.

Ross Wilson, Gorman, was elected President of the Association. Ed Harrison, Gorman, was elected Vice-President and Glynn Gilliam of Eastland was elected Secretary-Treasurer. The Association was formed for the purpose of uniting the breeders of Hereford cattle to secure close cooperation between the breeders of the county in matters pertaining to promotion of the breed. It is also contemplated that this Association will work closely with the American Hereford Association, Texas Hereford Association and local FFA and 4-H groups. Membership in the Association will be of three classes: active, associate and sustaining. Active membership is confined to Hereford breeders residing in the county with cattle in or out of Eastland county and Hereford breeders residing out of the county but maintaining registered Hereford cattle in Eastland county.

A sale committee was appointed by the President, composed of Mr. David Pickrel, Chairman, Ranger, T. G. Caudle, Cisco, T. L. Wheat, Eastland, and Hardy Tidwell, Desdemona, to investigate the possibility of holding a sale of registered Hereford cattle either in December of this year or next March depending upon the number of cattle available at each time.

The Association members also discussed the possibility of conducting a Hereford field day this fall or of conducting a tour of the various ranches some time this year.

Do you have difficulty in knowing what to look for when selecting wash-wear cottons? I think many people do, so here are some tips which may help you with wash-wear selections.

If you are looking specifically for easy care, select a wash-wear dress that has a gathered skirt and few frills. This will make it easier to touch up the dress — and all wash-wear cottons require some ironing.

Also pick out a garment that has set-in sleeves rather than those of kimono design. The resin that makes the fabric wash-and-wearable also make it less resistant to tearing. Because of the weakened fabric, look for a style that fits easily and has only a few strain points.

The higher priced garments in wash-wear lines take less care, wrinkle less during wearing and look better after repeated launderings. But — because of the high resin finish which make these features possible — the fabric in these garments have low strength. These dresses could not be expected to wear as well as those of the less treated fabrics.

You know, we should learn to incorporate safety into everything we do. Here is a reminder of some safety rules I am sure we all know — yet we either ignore them or forget about them. Never puncture an aerosol can.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an Amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize for elected and appointive officers and employees, who serve in such capacity for twelve (12) or more years in any county or other political subdivision, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Program.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows: "(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this State shall have the right and the Legislature may enact appropriate regulatory laws to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for its elected and appointive officers and employees; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters voting in such election of the county or other political subdivision. No person shall qualify for benefits unless he shall have served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years, except for those persons otherwise qualified prior to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by the

county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county and State.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, of which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

Sec. 3. Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character.

Sec. 4. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and the Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas to add a new Section to be known as Section 1-A which permits the Legislature to delegate certain zoning powers to the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, immediately following Section 1, to be known as Section 1-A which shall read as follows: "Section 1-A. The Legislature may authorize the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof to regulate and restrict the speed, parking and travel of motor vehicles on beaches available to the public by virtue of public right and the littering of such beaches.

"Nothing in this amendment shall increase the rights of any riparian or littoral landowner with regard to beaches available to the public by virtue of public right or submerged lands.

"The Legislature may enact any laws not inconsistent with this Section which it may deem necessary to permit said counties to implement, enforce and administer the provisions contained herein."

"Should the Legislature enact legislation in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to delegate limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to delegate limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

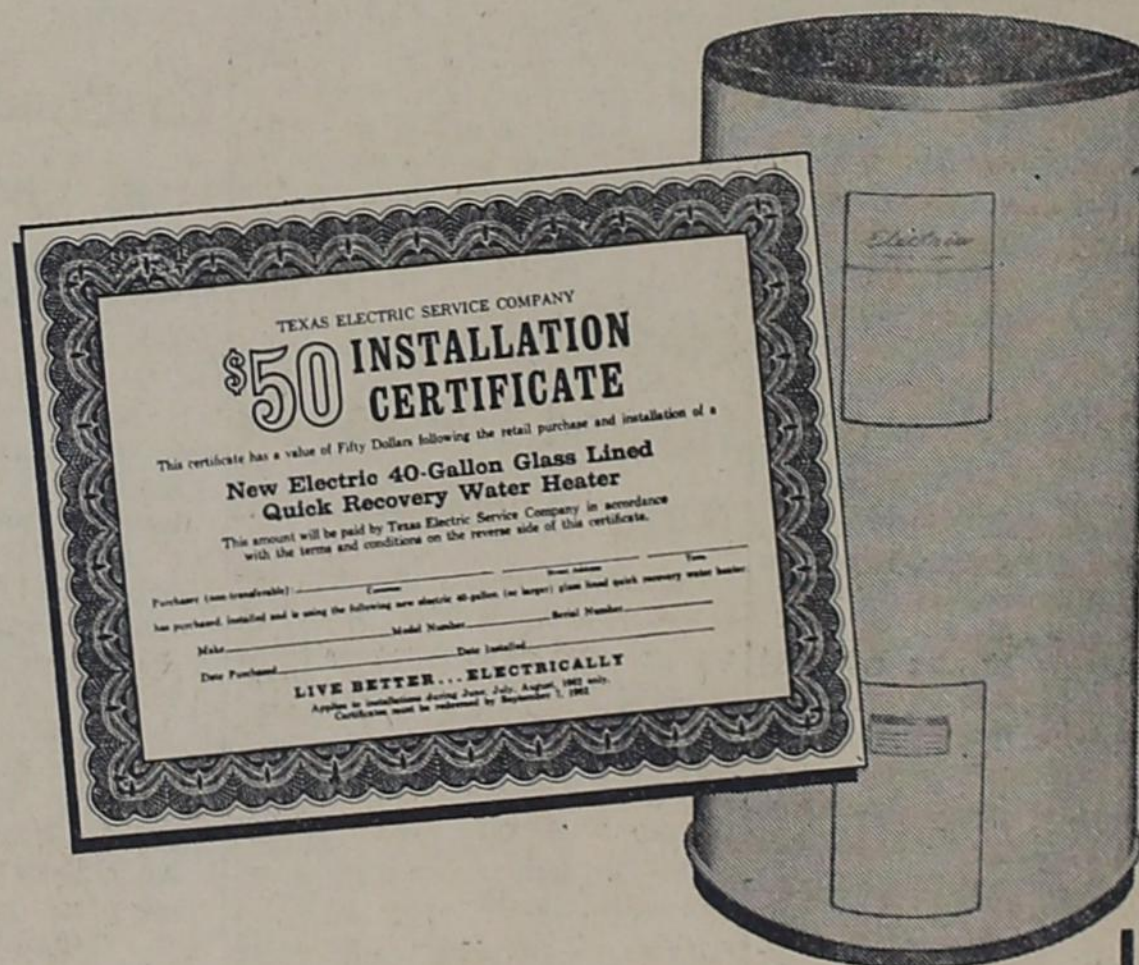

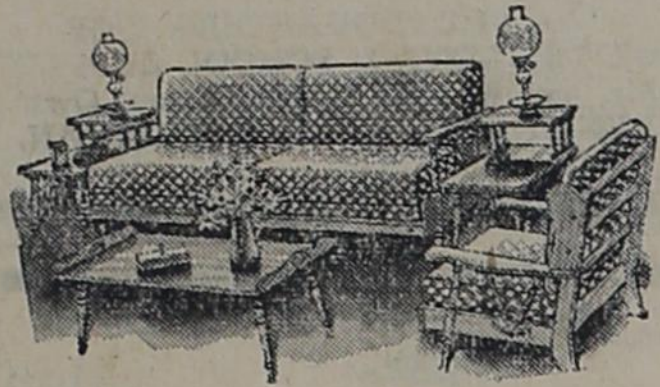

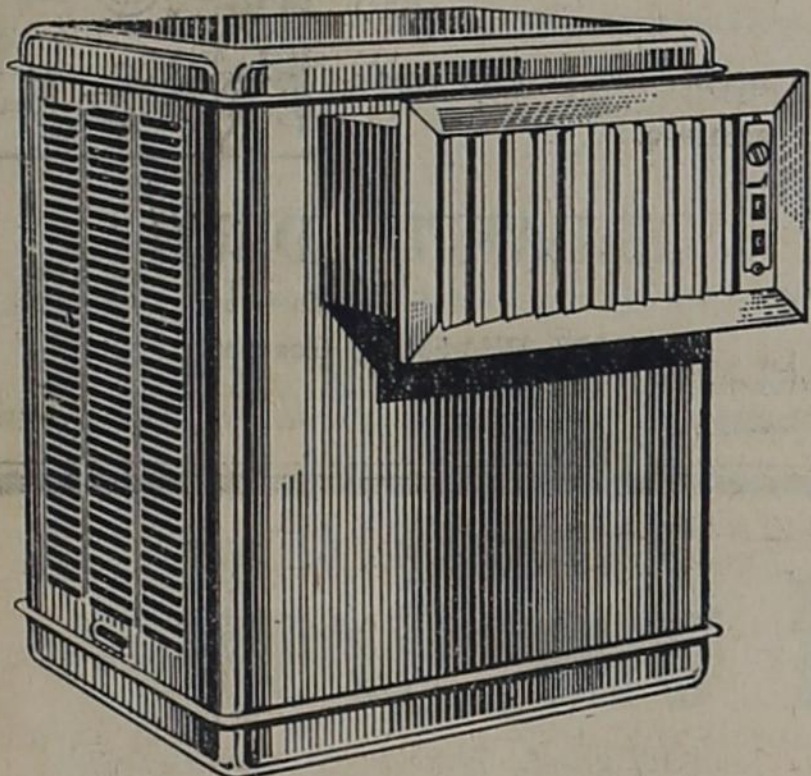

WASHINGTON, D. C. - IN A FEW DAYS THE House of Representatives will vote on whether or not the United States shall purchase bonds of the United Nations to the extent of \$100 million. Other nations of the world are to purchase the other \$100 million of the total issue of \$200 million.

THIS MEASURE WILL UNDOUBTEDLY encounter strong opposition, but the best estimate at the time is that it will be passed, similar to that already passed by the United States Senate.

SHOULD AS MANY AS 50 TO 60 Republicans vote for the measure, and this is the estimate by Republicans themselves, it is almost sure to be approved.

TO OPPOSE THE PURCHASE OF UNITED NATIONS BONDS by the United States is not necessarily opposition to the United Nations itself. It is generally recognized that there is a need for an international forum in which

the representatives of sovereign nations may sit down together to discuss international issues. Be this as it may, the United States should not continue to pay its disproportionate share of United Nations expenses. As long as we are willing to carry the burden, other nations will let us do it. We presently pay 32.02 per cent of the regular assessments of the United Nations for its normal operations, and more than 47 per cent of the "peace keeping" operations in the Middle East and in the Congo.

IN ADDITION TO PAYING MORE THAN our share, our policy seems to be one of placating, of timidity, and of compromise. It should not be our aim to buy influence in the United Nations, any more than it should not be our policy to attempt to buy friendships around the world by foreign aid. Responsibility can not be measured in dollars and cents, but no responsibility and few dollars and cents from some nations is hardly conducive to the success of the Organization.

IN THE UNITED NATIONS AND OUTSIDE our diplomats continue to discuss disarmament and the Berlin issue. The Soviets have now rejected certain concessions on disarmament made by our Government, which should be a warning that only her proposals will be acceptable. Our State Department has publicly stated that the issues on Berlin are not negotiable. Yet we continue to negotiate.

AN EXPERIENCED DIPLOMAT HAS PREDICTED that between now and the end of the year, a peace treaty will be concluded by the Russians with East Germany.

HE PREDICTS THAT FOLLOWING THIS AGREEMENT the Russians will withdraw their troops from East Germany, but just a few miles across the border. East German soldiers will then replace Russian soldiers, and after a time they will begin to harass the Western powers in Berlin and on the access roads to that City from West Germany.

WE WILL PROTEST TO THE RUSSIANS and they will say we must deal with East Germany.

WILL WE USE FORCE? NO, this diplomat says, we will not for fear of triggering World War III.

They visited in Fort Worth with Ann Norris and made stops in Hot Springs, Eureka Springs and Paris, Ark. They went over the Magazine Mountain and thru Missouri, Iowa and Illinois and Indiana. During their visit with the Webbs they all enjoyed a trip to Chicago and went through the Museum of Science and Industry seeing many interesting sights.

They left Kokomo, Indiana on July 31 returning home thru Kentucky, Tennessee, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana and East Texas, arriving back in Carbon on August 3rd.

AFTER THE ARGUMENT GOES ON and the situation reaches a threat to world peace, the matter will be referred to the United Nations, where majority of the Members may vote against the position of the United States. Their vote will not be based on any love for the Russians or East Germany, but simply because of our timid attitude, they will have less to lose than if they opposed the Soviets.

THIS IS WHAT DISTURBS THE WEST GERMAN and similar issues disturb our allies.

CONSTANTINE BROWN, WRITING FROM ROME, suggests that the President, our Secretary of State and their advisers should read TRADER HORN, the story of an old trader in the African Ivory Coast. Besides giving a vivid picture of African life, Trader Horn also gives good advice applicable to the present day situation.

"AYE, RIVERS," MUSES TRADER HORN. "You have got to learn from the noble savage the law of the rivers. Make friends on one bank of the river and do it well and good. Then there is safe navigation."

NEITHER IN POLITICS NOR IN REAL LIFE can a man make friends on both sides of the banks of the river."

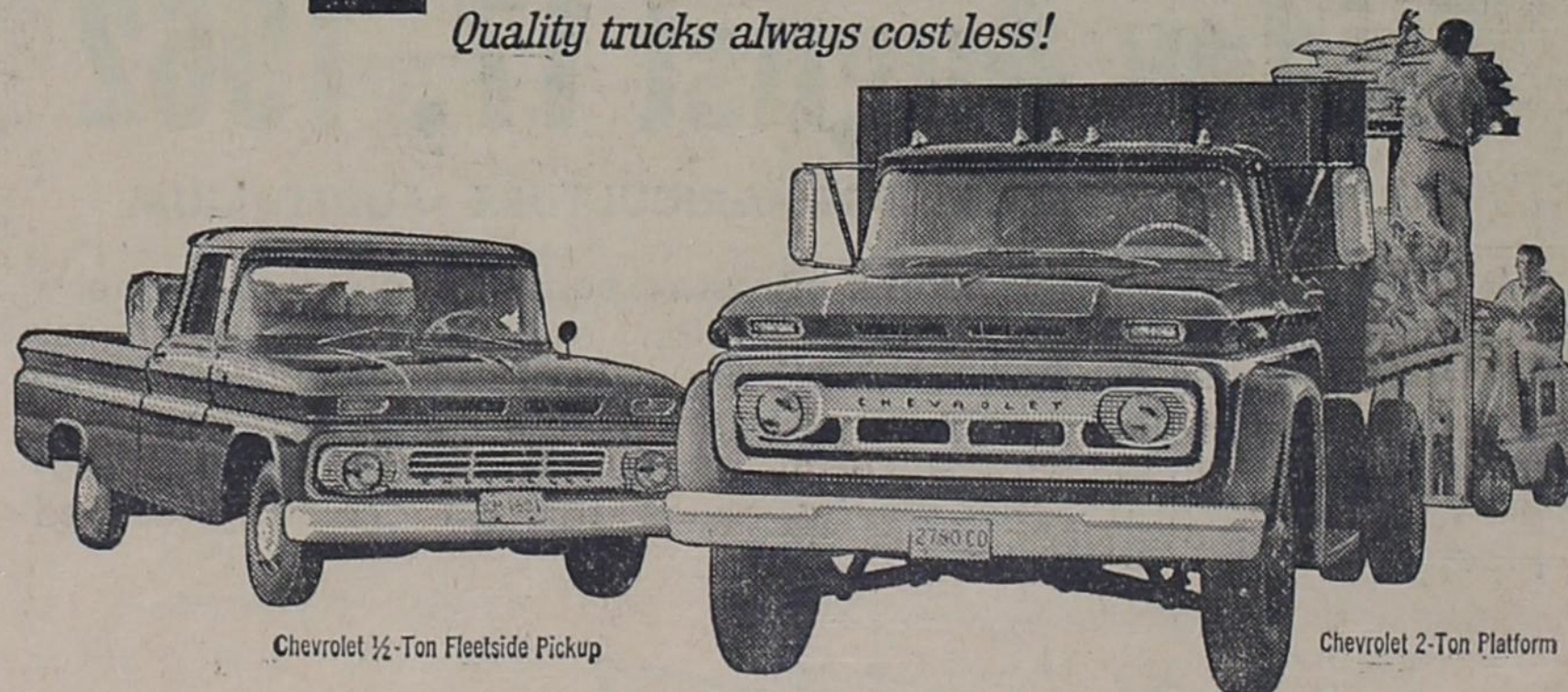

Voters Urged To Study Amendments

In this issue of the Progress there appears the full text of four of the Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the upcoming General Election (Nov. 6). So that

you may be fully informed, we urge that you read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your vote. A brief digest of the 14 proposed Amendments follows:
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR25) - Provides Workmen's Compensation Insurance for

the employees of all political subdivisions.
NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR 9) - Raises the limit on use of state funds to assist needy aged, needy blind and needy children from Forty-seven Million Dollars (\$47,000,000) to Fifty-two Million Dollars (\$52,000,000).
NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 22) - Permits creation of hospital districts in Ochiltree, Jastro, Hansford and Hopkins Counties.
NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (HJR 46) - Provides for a State program of acquiring conservation storage facilities in reservoirs.
NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 51) - Creates hospital districts and limits their power.
NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR 36) - Authorizes retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more.
NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 13) - Insures continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency, resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature.
NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (SJR 7) - Establishes a ceiling of Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year on the amount that may be paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled.
NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 70) - Authorizes the construction, equipping, maintenance and financing of a home for the aged in Titus County and permits the Legislature to authorize the creation of two (2) hospital districts in Brazoria County.
NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 12) - Permits state employees to serve as consultants or on advisory committees, or as members of a Public School Board provided they are not members of the teaching profession, with a state agency or any political subdivision thereof.
NUMBER ELEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 25) - Authorizes resale of repossessed lands in the Veterans Land Fund, to any buyer, after having been first offered for resale to veterans.
NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT (SJR 19) - Delegates limited zoning powers to any county ordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.
NUMBER THIRTEEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 6) - Provides that

taxes or bonds previously voted in any Independent School District, major portion of which is in Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by any change in boundaries and authorizes the continuance of the levy of taxes after such change without further election.
NUMBER FOURTEEN ON THE BALLOT (HJR 32) - Provides for trials de novo on all appeals from actions, rulings, or decisions of administrative or executive agencies of government.

WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS"
By C. WILSON HARDER

Millions once laughed as Fibber McGee's catchall closet door opened to spill the helter-skelter mess hidden inside.
While causing no mirth, today's Fibber McGee closet is becoming the Social Security system; the catchall for vote seeking politicians.
This is a reason 77% of the nation's businessmen, voting through the National Federation of Independent Business, disapproved additional Social Security taxes for aged hospital care.
By 1969, if no further frills are added, the combined SS rate paid by employers and employees will be 9 1/4%. Rep. Herlong has introduced a resolution for a constitutional amendment to freeze the maximum permissible tax at 10%.
While this measure is probably better than no limit at all, there is a question if the limit should not even be lower.
SS tax increases poses an economic paradox apparently obvious to all but to the socialistic element of lunacy along the Potomac.
Every time the employer half of SS taxes are raised, labor cost increases. This increases his costs and prices at a time when inflation at home, non-competitive pricing abroad, are pointed out as grave national problems.
Yet, a strong case can be made for SS benefits for em-

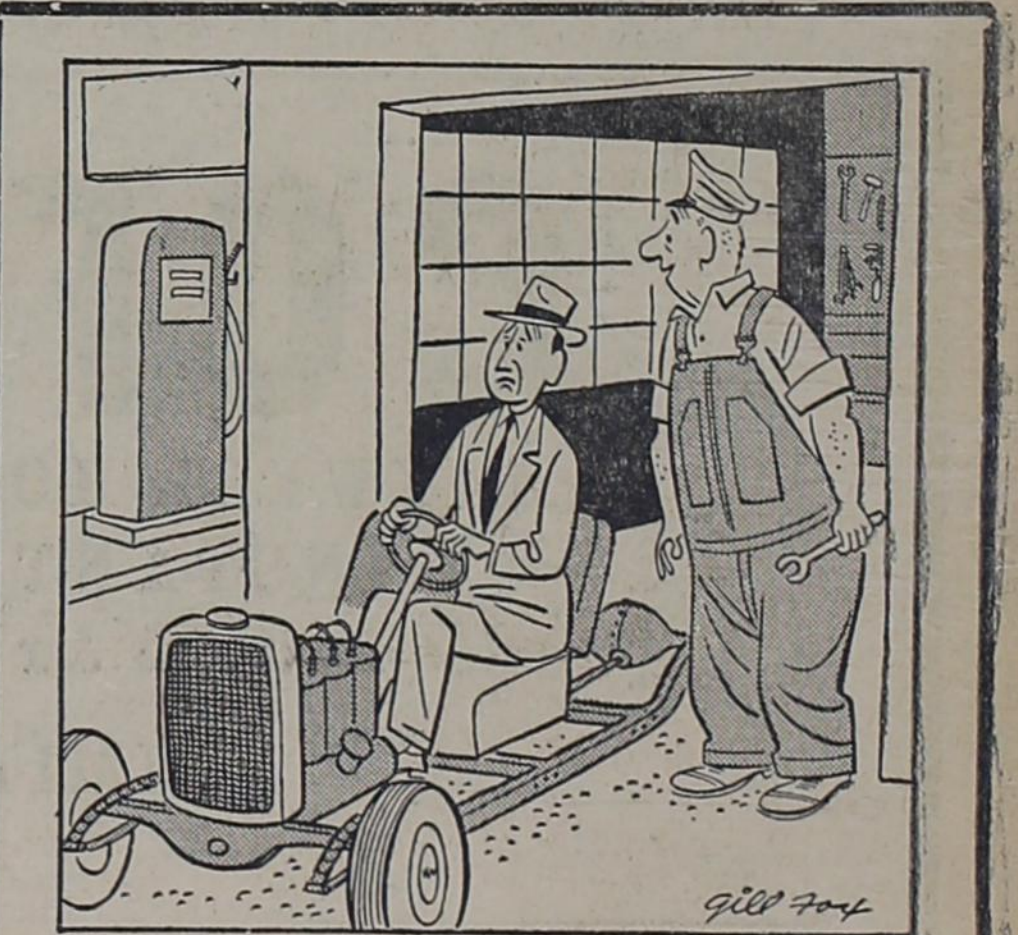

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.
SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 62 and which shall empower the Legislature to provide for the temporary succession to public offices so as to insure the continuity of governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack; providing for the proclamation and publication of this proposed amendment by the Governor.
BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 62 and to read as follows:
"Section 62. Continuity of State and Local Governmental Operations. The Legislature, in order to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, shall have the power and the immediate duty to provide for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, of whatever nature and whether filled by election or appointment, the incumbents of which may become unavailable for carrying on the powers and duties of such offices. Provided, however, that Article I of the Constitution of Texas, known as the "Bill of Rights" shall not be in any manner, affected, amended, impaired, suspended, repealed or suspended hereby."
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack; providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable."
"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack; providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable."
Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

Mrs. Lucille Duke, English teacher in the Gorman Schools, attended the International Convention of the Delta Kappa Gamma Society at the Bellevue Stratford Hotel in Philadelphia, Pa. during the week of August 9th.

Dr. Clara Cockerille, professor of education, Westminster College, Pa., speaking at the Birthday Luncheon August 9, asked searching questions and expressed deep convictions about the truths teachers hold to be self evident. More than 1,500 mem-

bers of this international honorary organization for women educators attended the biennial convention. The society is organized in all fifty states and the District of Columbia and six Canadian provinces with current membership of over 80,000.

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 25 proposing an Amendment to Section 60 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide insurance for all employees; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 60 of Article III of the State Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all employees of the county or political subdivision as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties or political subdivisions of this State and for the payment of

the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November A.D. 1962, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said Election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.


