

SCHOOL REGISTRATION SET FOR FRIDAY, AUGUST 31; CLASSES TO BEGIN TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER 4

On Friday, August 31, registration will be held for the 1962-63 school year in the Gorman schools.

A general faculty meeting is scheduled for 8 a. m. on Friday prior to registration.

Registration for grades 1 through 8 will be held at 10 a. m. Registration for juniors and seniors will be at 10 a. m. in rooms 3 and 4 and freshmen and sophomore groups will register at 11 a. m. in rooms 1 and 2.

All first grade students are required to present a birth certificate and proof of small pox immunization.

Full day of classes will begin on Tuesday, September 4 when school will take up at 8:20 a. m. Buses will run on a normal schedule to arrive at school at approximately 8:10 to 8:15.

Classes will dismiss each day at 3:40. The lunch period for most students will be 45 minutes and will extend over a period starting at 11:25 to 12:55.

Prices for lunches will be the same as last year: pupils in grades 1 through 4, 25c per meal and all other students and adults will pay 30c. The procedure for payment and accounting will be taken care of by each home room teacher, with help from the office secretary and the principals and superintendent, in a manner similar to that used last year.


A band director is yet to be named.

Co. Farm Bureau Barbecue Set For Friday Night At 7

The Eastland County Farm Bureau Annual Barbecue will be held in the Eastland City Park Friday, August 24th at 7:00 p. m.

Guest speaker will be Dr. Rupert N. Richardson, professor in Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, Texas.

Dr. Richardson grew up in Stephens County, north of Caddo. Educated in Simmons College, the University of Chicago and the University of Texas, he taught in the public schools for four years, was principal of Cisco High School in 1915-16, and taught one summer in Britton's Training School.

Dr. Richardson has been a professor in H-SU since 1917 and was president of the college from 1943-53. On various leaves of absence he has taught in the University of Texas and a summer in the University of Oklahoma.

He is the author of several books, among them, "The Greater Southwest," with Carl C. Rister and "Texas, The Lone Star State."

Dr. Richardson grew up on a farm and ranch and has operated a stock farm the last sixteen years. He is a member of the Taylor Co. Farm Bureau. He is now president of the Texas State Historical Agency for Historical preservation, an agency seeking to preserve historical buildings, things, places, and the memory of great and worthy men and women.

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 62 and which shall empower the Legislature to provide for the temporary succession to public offices so as to insure the continuity of governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack; providing for the proclamation and publication of this proposed amendment by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 62 and to read as follows:

"Section 62. Continuity of State and Local Governmental Operations. The Legislature, in order to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack, shall have the power and the immediate duty to provide for prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public offices, except members of the Legislature, of whatever nature and whether filled by election or appointment, the incumbents of which may become unavailable for carrying on the powers and duties of such offices. Provided, however, that Article I of

the Constitution of Texas, known as the "Bill of Rights" shall not be in any manner, affected, amended, impaired, suspended, repealed or suspended hereby."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment empowering the Legislature to insure continuity of state and local governmental operations in periods of emergency resulting from disasters caused by enemy attack by providing for the prompt and temporary succession to the powers and duties of public office, except members of the Legislature, the incumbents of which may become unavailable."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36 proposing an Amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to authorize for elected and appointive officers and employees, who serve in such capacity for twelve (12) or more years in any county or other political subdivision, a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Program.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:


Section 1. Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"(b) Each county and any other political subdivision of this State shall have the right and the Legislature may enact appropriate regulatory laws to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for its elected and appointive officers and employees; provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters voting in such election of the county or other political subdivision. No person shall qualify for benefits unless he shall have served in such capacity for at least twelve (12) years, except for those persons otherwise qualified prior to the effective date of this Amendment. The amount contributed by the

county to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county and State."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors in this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing retirement, disability, and death benefits for elected and appointive officers and employees of counties and political subdivisions who have served in such capacity for twelve (12) years or more."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWELVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19 proposing an amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas to add a new Section to be known as Section 1-A which permits the Legislature to delegate certain zoning powers to the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, immediately following Section 1, to be known as Section 1-A which shall read as follows:

"Section 1-A. The Legislature may authorize the governing body of any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof to regulate and restrict the speed, parking and travel of motor vehicles on beaches available to the public by virtue of public right and the littering of such beaches.

"Nothing in this amendment shall increase the rights of any riparian or littoral landowner with regard to beaches available to the public by virtue of public right or submerged lands.

"The Legislature may enact any laws not inconsistent with this Section which it may deem necessary to permit said counties to implement, enforce and administer the provisions contained herein.

"Should the Legislature enact legislation in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to delegate limited zoning powers to any county bordering on the Gulf of Mexico or the tidewater limits thereof."



Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

favorable comments about the energetic young man who has done so much for the association. He opened the meeting without any great amount of ceremony — the invocation and then an introduction of Pres. Howell who gave the welcome. Before the program started Mr. Wilson asked all who were actual peanut farmers to stand and a surprisingly large number were on their feet immediately.

Ab Abernathy, district manager of the State Department of Agriculture with headquarters in Stephenville, was among the crowd and lending his assistance to making the day a success. Mr. and Mrs. Abernathy are happy in their new surroundings at Stephenville. Moreover, they seem to like this section of Texas. They know agricultural and livestock men in all sections of West Texas.

One thing about the crowd that was noticeable was the large number of shelling plants represented. Buyers and managers of peanut plants in several different parts of the peanut growing territory were present. Caddo County, Oklahoma, where Anadarko is the county seat, had an unusually large delegation present. A big crop is marketed at Anadarko every year.

One of those seen in the audi-

ence was Dutch Winters, the amiable attorney from Fort Worth who has a wide acquaintance in the Stephenville region. He owns a fine farm in Hood County—near Granbury—where he has a sizeable allotment of acreage for peanut farming. Those who wish to contact Mr. Winters can reach him at 5919 Forest Hill Drive, Fort Worth.

Mrs. Evah Sparkman who lives at Desdemona but works for the association at Gorman was in the crowd and enjoying meeting many of her friends. Her husband is employed by Magnolia at Desdemona. In recent weeks Mrs. Sparkman has been taking time off to stay at home during the hot weather. She and Mr. Sparkman get their mail at Desdemona.

Like so many of their friends and neighbors, many from different sections of Hood County are frequent visitors in Stephenville where they do considerable shopping. Mr. and Mrs. Johnnie Rollins were in the crowd and they make their home at Granbury. He is one of the directors of the association. The peanut crop in Hood County is favorable at this time but like most of the others here he said that rain was badly needed. They get their mail on Rt. 2, Granbury.

Only a very few peanuts have been sold from the 1962 crop, said B. H. Scott, De Leon buyer, who attended the Friday meeting. He fears that dry weather has reduced

the yield of the crop in most places. In his opinion, the late peanuts are going to need rain—and need it soon. Those who wish to contact Mr. Scott can reach him in De Leon, Texas.

"Our population is expanding so fast that we are filling a school room every month," Mr. Burroughs said with considerable enthusiasm. He owns and operates the American Nut Corporation at Lewisville. Lewisville is near Fort Worth and Dallas and reaps a rich harvest by reason of employment its citizens receive in the two big towns.

J. W. Little who gets his mail at Rt. 2, Granbury, near the famed village of Acton was quick to say that he was a close and inti-

ENJOY VACATION IN SOUTH DAKOTA



PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 25 proposing an Amendment to Section 60 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide insurance for all employees; providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 60 of Article III of the State Constitution, be amended to read as follows: "Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties and other political subdivisions of this State to provide Workman's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide its own insurance risk, for all employees of the county or political subdivision as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties or political subdivisions of this State and for the payment of

the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November A.D. 1962, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions"; and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workman's Compensation Insurance for all employees of all political subdivisions."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provisions for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter may vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said Election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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
