PUPILS TO REGISTER HERE ON FRIDAY MORNING WITH CLASSES TO BEGIN SEPT. 4; FULL FACULTY

On Friday, August 31, registration will be held for the 1962-63 school year in the Gorman schools.

A general faculty meeting is scheduled for 8 a. m. on Friday prior to registration. Registration for grades 1 through 8 will be held at 10 a. m. Registration for juniors and seniors will be at 10 a. m. in rooms 3 and 4 and freshmen and sophomore groups will register at 11 a. m. in rooms 1 and 2.

All first grade students are required to present a birth certificate and proof of small pox immunization.

Full day of classes will begin on Tuesday, September 4 when school will take up at 8:20 a. m. Buses will run on a normal schedule to arrive at school at approximately 8:10 to 8:15.

Classes will dismiss each day at 3:40. The lunch period for most students will be 45 minutes and will extend over a period starting at 11:25 to 12:55.

Prices for lunches will be the same as last year: pupils in grades 1 through 4, 25c per meal and all other students and adults will pay 30c. The procedure for payment and accounting will be taken care of by each home room teacher, with help from the office secretary and the principals and superintendent, in a manner similar to that used last year.

CHARLES BROWN ELECTED AS BAND DIRECTOR

In a special meeting of the school board Friday night, August 24, Charles Brown, lately of Arlington, was employed as band director and intermediate social studies teacher for the coming year.

Mr. Brown, twenty years of age and single, has attended North Texas University at Denton and Arlington State College, completing heavy schedules in music education, especially in band training, in both institutions.

SCHOOL POLICIES

In statements to the Progress this week Supt. W. R. Taylor gave some indications as to his philosophy on discipline and student control and concerning his attitude on "expected changes" in policies of school operation.

Taylor's comments included the following:

"I value student respect very highly, and I give students credit for being able, in most cases, to recognize right and wrong and also to recognize fairness and reasonableness in dealing with behavior problems.

"I realize that there must be many rules and policies, written or understood, in regulating student activities and school life. We believe that many good practices have been in operation in the Gorman Schools in the past and that the basic situation is not bad. We feel that the boys and girls here are basically good and are only normal in their tendencies toward 'delinquency and problem-making.'

"As the need arises, there will be policies, rules and regulations forthcoming. We plan to be diligent and cooperative in planning and executing all phases of our school program in such a way as to prevent many problems and to cope adequately with those that arise.

"Our administrative policy in general will be one of 'controlled privileges', with counselling and firm penalties, and withdrawal of privileges where respect is violated.

"Our plans are to assist in bringing about a revision, re-affirmation and reprinting of school board policies, to develop and print an Administrative and Teachers Handbook, and to encourage and assist in drawing up and putting into operation a Student Handbook. These things we hope to do during the current school year.

"Some problems that have been brought with emphasis to our attention are use of automobiles by students and smoking by students. Statements of our administrative policies on these matters follow."

Use of Autos by Students

The use of automobiles by students during the school day will be considered by school authorities as a privilege that may be taken away if not properly respected.

A special "Student Driving Permit" will be provided for student who meet the following requirements:

- (1) Possess a valued operators license,
- (2) Agree to observe the following regulations: (a) drive slowly, carefully, quietly and courteously to and from school and especially on or near the school campus and anywhere that other students or pedestrians may be near,
- (3) Drive only as necessary in traveling to and from school, to and from lunch and on errands or missions other than part-time,
- (4) Co-operate with school and city officials and with parents on any "problem" that may arise as a result of students driving cars.

Persistent failure to observe any of the above regulations may lead to the withdrawal of the "Student Driving Permit."

Sitting In Autos At School

Students shall not sit in automobiles at school during the school day.

Smoking of Tobacco at School

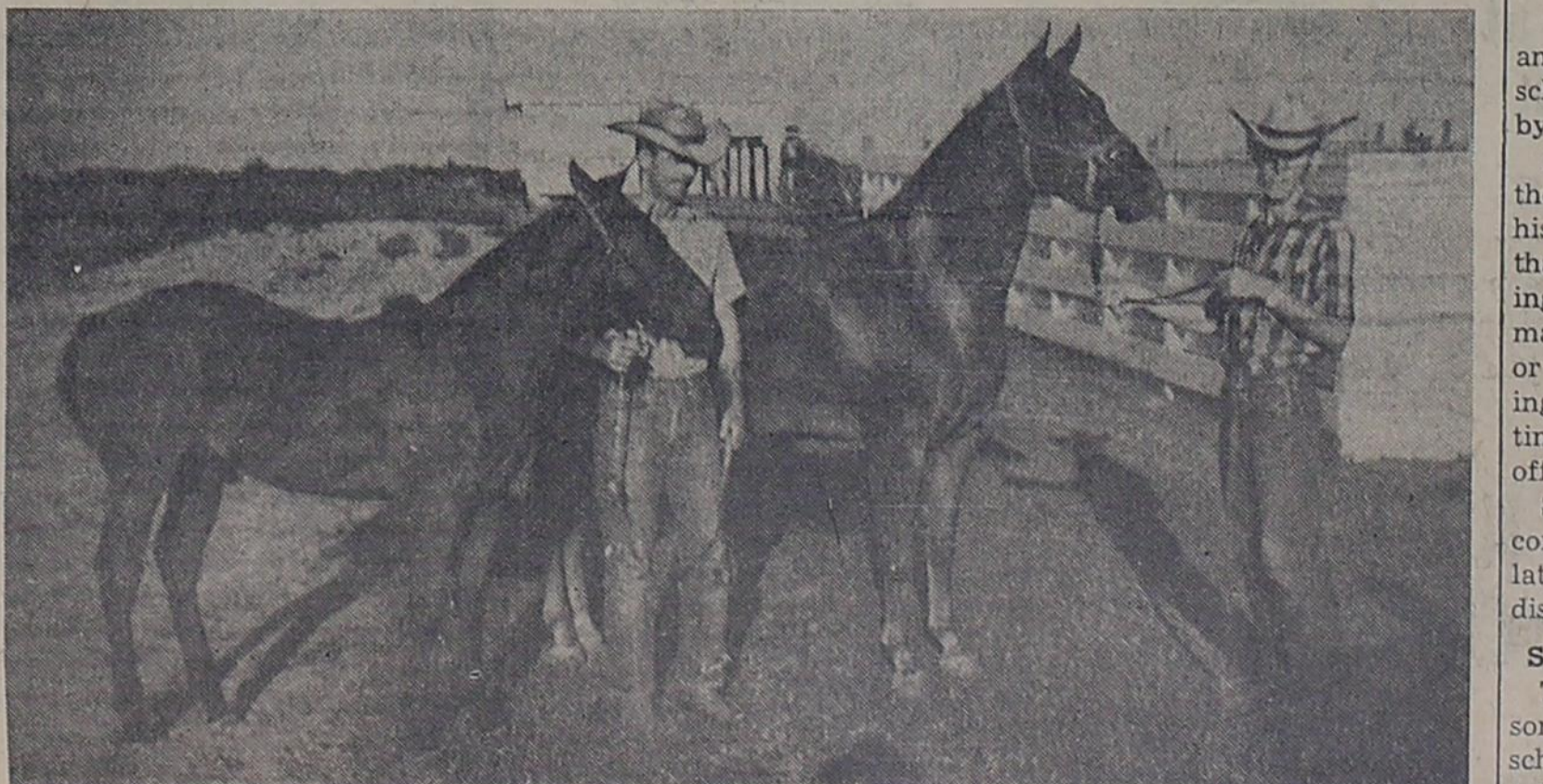
Smoking or use of tobacco in any form by students during the school day will not be sanctioned by school authorities.

If a high school student, with the knowledge and permission of his parents or guardian, requests that he be allowed to smoke during the school day, the privilege may be granted by the principal or the superintendent, the smoking to be done at a place and at times designated by the school official.

Smoking by students under any conditions other than those stipulated above, will be treated as disciplinary cases.

Smoking By School Personnel

Teachers and other school personnel should smoke during the school day or at school activities only at places isolated from students and student groups and at times when it will not interfere with their school duties.

As It Looks From Here

WASHINGTON, D. C. — ALL THE TALK and all that is written about the accomplishments of the Soviets in placing two men in orbit at the same time reminds us that they are more adept at propaganda than any nation in the world. Certainly this includes our own.

THE REASON IS FAIRLY SIMPLE. The Soviets need not exercise any compunctions as to what they say or do. It is a part of their system.

ON THE OTHER HAND, ours is a system built on moral standards of truth which place restraint on our actions.

AT THE PRESENT TIME WE ARE TRAINING Special Warfare Forces. These are forces especially trained in guerrilla warfare such as is being fought in several parts of the world and with which we will probably be occupied for a considerable time to come. We have been woefully deficient in this type of force. The Soviets, however, accuse us of lighting fuses to set off an unlimited war. The Chinese Communists have parroted this same line. Such an article appeared not long ago in the "Red Star", a publication similar to our armed forces publications.

EVEN THE FREEDOM WHICH WE ENJOY by criticizing our own Government is used by the

Communists against us. They take published criticism as a type of revolt, magnify it all out of proportion and tell other people of the world that this is the prevailing attitude in America. They do not distinguish between an "Administration" and the Government itself. They place no limit or virtue in the fact that our citizens are free to criticize an Administration, whether it be national, state, county or municipal.

FRONT ORGANIZATIONS & SYMPATHIZERS IN THE United States are always on the look-out for public statements, letters to the editors, critical articles in magazines and newspapers, as proof that we are not a united people.

NOT LONG AGO THE FOREIGN MINISTER of Communist Vietnam in conference in Geneva, quoted from a letter written by some "prominent United States citizen" to President Kennedy on the "intervention" of United States forces in South Vietnam, to prove that people not only opposed U. S. policy in that area, but approved of the Communist policy. In the press, radio, in all places and on all occasions where a forum is available to them, they attack the free world, and particularly the United States.

AT THE MOMENT, THEIR PROPAGANDA is directed against the British as holding in subjugation Gibraltar. Great Britain has recently cut aid to Gibraltar and people there are highly critical of their mother government.

AS A RESULT, THE DEMAND COMES from the people of Gibraltar to be granted their independence. This, of course, is fuel for the most vicious kind of Communist propaganda to get the British out.

WITH COMMUNIST PRESSURES IN MOROCCO, where Russia is furnishing foreign aid including military equipment, Gibraltar stands as a ripe plum for them, should they get control of this North African territory.

GIBRALTAR IS AN IMPORTANT FLANK of the NATO alliance and the gateway to North Africa and Spain, as well as a vitally important defense area for the straits of Gibraltar and two seas.

WE MAY NOT THINK OF THE ROCK OF GIBRALTAR, as it is called, as being strategic or important. Many other areas of the world, far removed from our immediate interest, are just names.

TO THE SOVIETS, IT IS ANOTHER PLACE to expand their influence.

Space Kitchen May Be Seen At State Fair October 6-21

Unearthly problems, such as liquid that won't pour and food that won't stay on plates, will face orbiting astronauts at mealtime 250,000 miles from home.

In a central exhibit in the Electric Show at the 1962 State Fair of Texas, October 6 through 21, the Whirlpool Space Kitchen will show proposed solutions to the problems.

How all foods and beverages required by a three-man crew on a fourteen day mission could be stored and prepared will be shown in this mockup of the Space Kitchen recently constructed by Whirlpool Corporation for the Aeronautical Systems Division, Air Force Systems Command.

Although it contains versions of most appliances found in American homes, the Space Kitchen weighs only 800 pounds and is seven and one-half feet high and ten feet long.

Food-expelling devices, a thermoelectrically-operated freezer and refrigerator, a self-contained hot and cold water system and wet and dry waste disposal sections are a few of the features to be found in the kitchen.

Every inch of space will be used and some space will even do double-duty. Racks of canned frozen foods will be stored within the freezer while the freezer door contains tightly-shelved layers of bite-size sandwiches. When the spaceman has eaten food contained in cans, the containers will be dead-stored in their original storage location to conserve space.

Many foods will be stored in pull-down bunkers until selected for use, then the astronaut will heat them to 170 degrees in a special three-cavity oven. When he is ready to eat he will screw a metal expelling device to the bottom of the can and a nipple-like mouthpiece to the top. Each squeeze of the expelling handle forces some of the food through the nipple into his mouth.

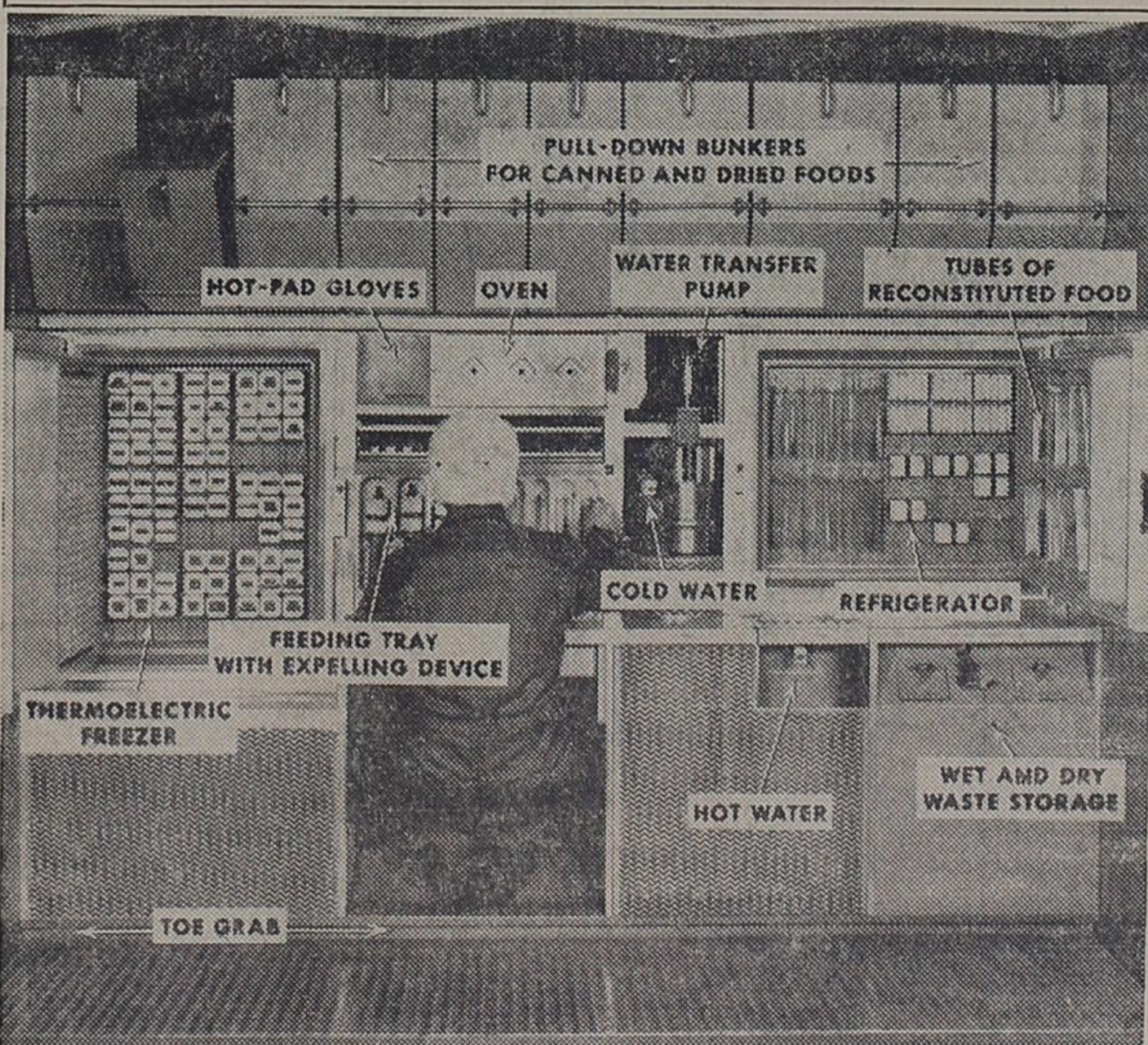

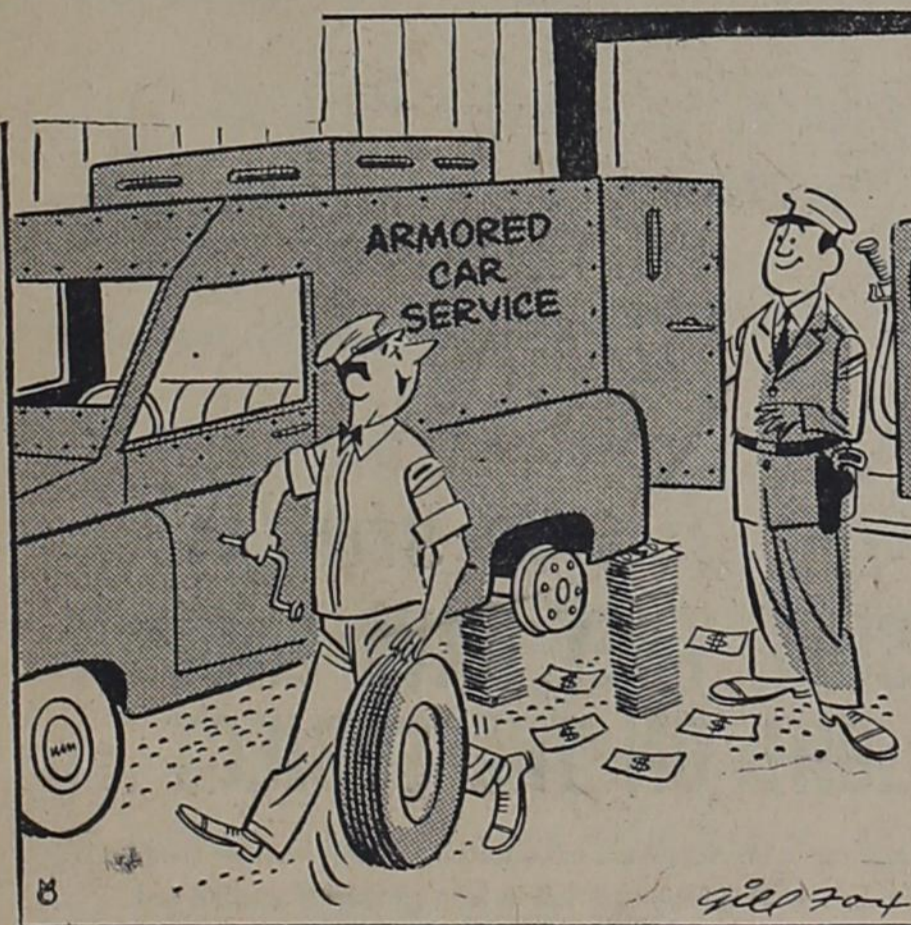

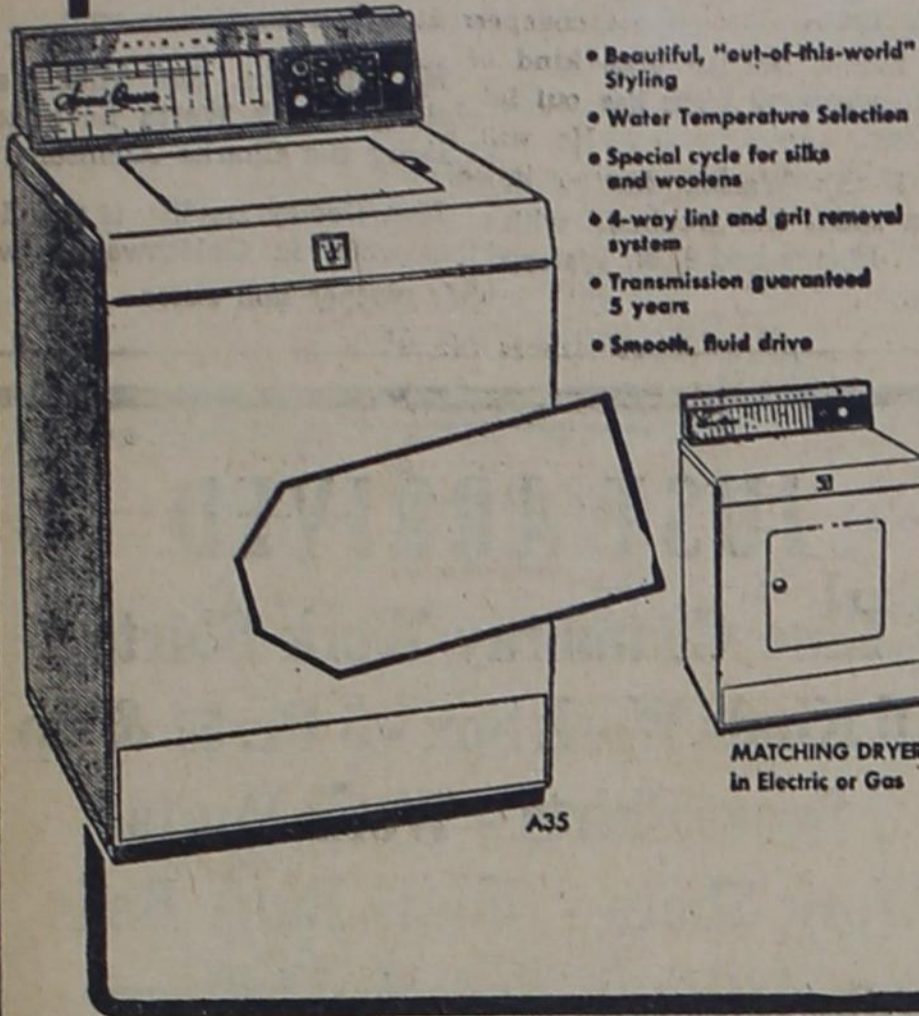
