- 3 cups raw Spanish peanuts
- 3 teaspoons butter
- 1 teaspoon salt 2 teaspoons soda
- Boil sugar, Karo and water until threat spins. Add peanuts and stir continuously after peanuts are added. Cook until it turns a brownish gold. Take from fire, add butter, salt and soda. Pour onto buttered board and cool.






