- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons soda

Boil sugar, Karo and water until throat spins. Add peanuts and stir continuously after peanuts are added. Cook until it turns a brownish gold. Take from fire, add butter, salt and soda. Pour onto buttered board and cool.

Midway Baptist, Pioneer Church, Ends Long Service

On October 7, members of the Midway Baptist Church agreed to discontinue services and to transfer their properties to the First Baptist Church in Gorman.

The decision was not easily made by the congregation. It left the members with a tinge of sadness.

The church was organized in the early 1890's, the exact year being uncertain.

First meetings were held at the Elm School House, where a brush arbor was built.

The church was called Midway being mid-way between the Elm and Jewell Communities.

First record of church messengers being sent by the Association was in August, 1899 at Eastland. They were C. H. O'Brien, G. W. Haver, S. W. Prichard and D. N. Holleman, Holleman, being the first pastor and was not an ordained minister.

In 1903 a sight had been purchased by "Uncle" Joe Underwood and deeded to the church and a new building was dedicated. They organized with a membership of 21. The peak of membership, 206, was reached in 1920.

Family names appearing frequently in the church history include Underwood, Prichard, Mason, Porter, Kinser, Curb, Bennett, and Wood.

Some of the early pastors of the church were the late Willie Skaggs, and his brother, Frank Skaggs. J. W. Henderson of Route 2, Gorman, pastored the church at one time. Rev. Ben Clements, who now resides in Gorman with his daughter, Mrs. Arthur Mahan, was pastor of the church for many years.

The church did not hold full time services until after World War II.

In the early 1950's the membership rose again to approximately 200 after having decreased over a period of years.

The recent pastor was Stanley Echols, a student at Howard Payne College.

The present deacons were Rob Kinser, who was also Church School Supt., E. L. Curb, Roy Kinser, Artis Porter, Marvin Lewis, who was also church treasurer, and J. W. Lawrence.

Mrs. Tom Broom was church clerk. Mrs. James Kinser, accomplished player of sacred music, was the church pianist for many years.

The Gorman First Baptist Church is happy to welcome the Midway folks who will be wanting a new church home.

Jerry Dupuy Seeks Aid For Dominican Republic People

Jerry Dupuy, a graduate of Gorman High School and now a member of the Peace Corps, wrote this letter to Gorman this past week: "The situation here has settled down to the routine. The past three weeks we have been planting tomatoes and pineapples. We have about 1700 pineapples planted.

The people here have treated us quite well. We have had only one incident. It occurred last night. Someone threw a rock thru the rear window of our jeep and it broke the front window also. The people are generally friendly and most are industrious workers.

Four workers are helping here at the farm which is to be an experimental, agricultural vocational school, the first of its kind in the country. A team from A&M was here last month and both men said they knew Mr. Bramlett.

We are trying to get some Babe Ruth baseball leagues started as well as other youth groups. However, the biggest problem is obtaining equipment. The same is true of all kinds of seeds. All the seeds here are those which have been inbred. Perhaps we could get a "seed food program" going in Gorman. If everyone there would contribute one package of vegetable seed it would be of tremendous help to us and the people of the Dominican Republic.

If two or three Boy Scout books could be found I'd certainly appreciate them. I'd like to organize a Scout program. There is literally nothing to occupy the time of children from the fourth grade until they are old enough to work. There are no schools beyond the fourth grade."

These Dominicans - newly released from the dictatorship of Trujillo - so few miles from Communist Cuba - are at a crossroads in their thinking. Jerry is doing something to bring them to a better understanding of Americans.

Arrangements have been made for you to leave all kinds of vegetable seeds with Mrs. Estelle Craddock at the Progress office, with Mrs. Roy Parker, or Sunday in the box provided at the Methodist Church. Land Of Korea Is Topic Of WSCS

The Land of Korea and the problems of its people were topics of discussion at the Tuesday afternoon meeting of the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

Among the many problems of the Koreans are poverty in a country ravaged by war, the uncertainty of a North and South truce, and shortage of industrial plants.

Mrs. Donald Bolt discussed the church in Korea, stating that Koreans were confused by the un-Christian attitude of many people attached to the USA Army of Occupation and by the many divisions of the Christian church. Another problem she stated was the breaking away from tradition, necessary in becoming a Christian.

Mrs. G. C. Acrea closed the session giving reasons for continuing aid to the Korean people.

Developments Of Proposed Peanut Laboratory Told

Approximately two years ago key people in the peanut industry working through the National Peanut Council began to plan a national research laboratory. A planning committee was established composed of industry people from the Virginia-Carolina area, the Southeast area, and the Southwest area. The purpose of this planning committee was to organize all facets of the peanut industry so that a combined effort could be made in appealing to the U. S. Department of Agriculture and Congress to provide for such a laboratory. This planning committee met several times and discussed means of approaching the proper agencies to enlist support for the laboratory. At these meetings the question of the location of the laboratory always came up. Mr. Ed Young of Dawson, Georgia, Chairman of the committee, and Mr. Steve Pace of Americus, Ga., committee Vice-Chairman, always assured the committee members from the Southwest and Virginia-Carolina areas that once the initial appropriations had been made that the planning committee would then consider the site for the laboratory.

This initial appropriation was made by Congress on July 22, 1961. It is a matter of record that the following was written in a letter of May 22, 1962 to Senator Russell of Georgia from Mayor Carl Rountree of Dawson, Ga. — "On March 22, 1962 after reading that an appropriation for investigation of a site for the laboratory was planned, we, the undersigned, representing Dawson and Terrell County, Georgia, made an application to you and to the Department of Agriculture for consideration of Dawson." We are advised that Mr. Ed Young was a part of the Delegation who made application to locate the laboratory at Dawson, Ga. The entire peanut industry at this time was under the impression, from assurances of Mr. Young and Mr. Pace, that nothing would be done concerning location until after the appropriation had been made and we were naive enough to believe this — much to our detriment. We blithely went along expecting the planning committee to again meet to consider location, blithely that was until an announcement by the Secretary of Agriculture on August 25, 1961, stating that the laboratory would be constructed in Dawson, Georgia.

It was stated that the committee from the USDA to select a site for the laboratory was limited by orders of their superiors to look only in the state of Georgia for a site and that this committee, after being so limited, recommended the city of Tifton, Georgia, as the location of the laboratory but that this recommendation was placed aside and the village of Dawson selected to be the final site.

In a statement prepared by the Agricultural Marketing Service and also in another statement before the Senate Appropriation Subcommittee the following was said, "The land will be made available and deeded to the government without cost. Also, necessary water, electricity, gas, sewerage, and other public utilities, including connections and service, and rights of way and easements, including roads if necessary, will

be furnished and financed from non-federal sources."

This was the kind of Southeast maneuvering that the industry people in the Southwest and Virginia-Carolina have been fighting for many months. More recently an appropriation was approved by the Senate Subcommittee for the construction of this laboratory due to the powerful leadership of Senator Richard Russell. However, the House committee turned down the appropriation thanks to some loyal representatives from Virginia, North Carolina, Texas, and Oklahoma. This then called for an effort by a conference committee composed of members of both houses of Congress to try to work out the differences. The past few days the House conferees have held firm in their opposition to an appropriation for a laboratory. When the conference committee could not reach an agreement, it became necessary that the House members of the conference committee return to the House floor to seek further instructions. At this point Congressman Forrester of Georgia was able to get a voice vote in the House on the matter which would have given authority for the laboratory appropriation. Congressman Omar Burleson is almost solely responsible in the ultimate victory which seems to be ours at the moment.

Congressman Omar Burleson strongly condemned this action and was able to persuade the Speaker that there ought to be a roll call vote the following day on this vital subject. In a roll call vote last week the House turned down the laboratory appropriation by a substantial majority.

We are reliably informed that Congressman Burleson is almost solely responsible in the ultimate victory which seems to be ours at the moment. There is only a fractional chance that the tide can be reversed by the Senate at this point. Too much credit cannot be given to Omar Burleson in his untiring efforts to organize and hold together House opposition to this appropriation which we feel would have benefited Southeastern type peanuts to the detriment of Texas-Oklahoma and Virginia-Carolina grown peanuts.

Incidentally, you ought to know that only a few of the Senators have raised objection to Senator Russell's move to construct the laboratory. One is Senator Ralph Yarborough of Texas. Therefore, Mr. Yarborough is also due a word of thanks.

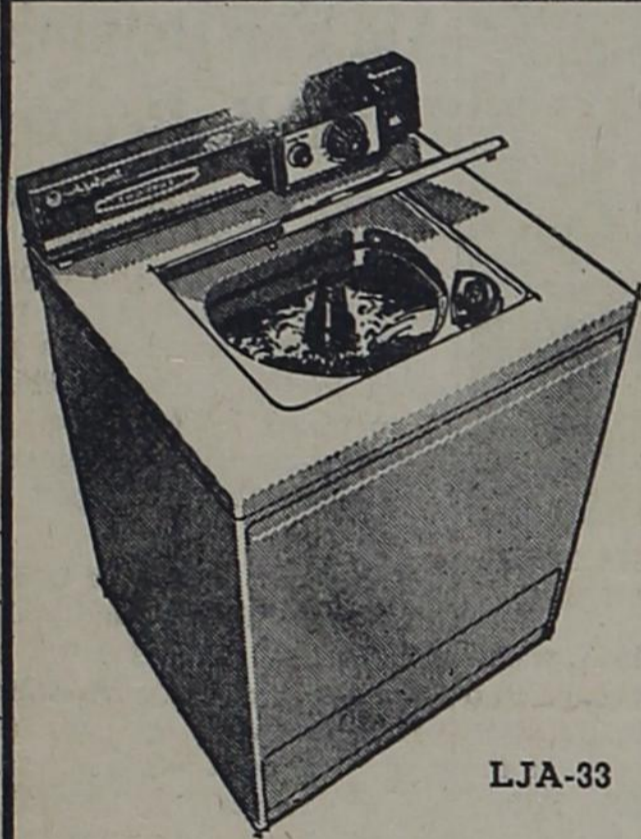
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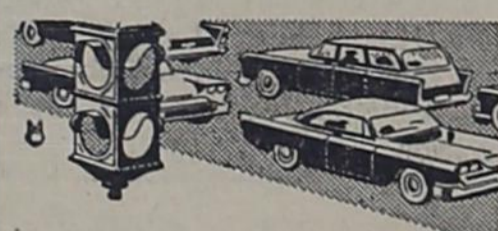

Browsing with Bev

What can you do about hot weather? Homemakers might try to follow the basic philosophy of the late Will Rogers, who possibly could have put it this way: "Some folks merely complain about summer heat while others do something about it."

Clever menu planners can help solve the heat problem. Homemakers can serve light, refreshing and nourishing foods appropriate to the season. They can make good use of the wide variety of fresh fruits and vegetables so abundant in today's produce markets.

To spruce up a potato salad, try adding some chopped cucumbers. Use green peel and all for an interesting texture to the usual softness of this salad. Frilly-edged endive makes a perfect summer salad base, and its slightly tart taste gives a bit more flavor than do other salad greens. The endive flavor can be toned down by combining equal parts of crisp head lettuce and endive, and add a slice of onion, finely chopped, and a subtle lemon dressing.

The most wanted of all electric appliances is the electric mixer. If mixing is done by hand, it is the homemaker who takes the beating!

There are three main types of mixers from which to choose. Perhaps these ideas will help you determine how to select the one that fits your particular needs and situations:

Stand mixers: Choose a stand mixer if you have no shortage of counter space; you bake a great deal; often mix in large amounts and would like to use mixer accessories. In this type mixer, the beaters are supported on a stand, and usually accessories such as juice extractor, can opener, food shredder, coffee grinder and knife sharpener are available.

Built-in mixers: You may prefer this type if you can afford the counter space.
