Browsing with Bev

How about serving coffee cake with breakfast in the morning. Coffee cake is especially good on cooler mornings, or serve it when friends drop by. Here is a real good coffee cake you may want to try:
CINNAMON BUTTERMILK COFFEE CAKE
Buttered square pan, 9-inch
2 cups sifted flour
2 cups firmly packed brown sugar
1/2 cup (1 stick) butter
1 egg
1 cup buttermilk
1 teaspoon baking soda
1 teaspoon cinnamon
1/3 cup sifted flour
1/2 cup chopped nuts
Preheated 325 degree oven
Mix flour and brown sugar. Cut butter in until the mixture resembles coarse meal. Set aside three-fourths cup of this mixture to be used for topping. To remaining flour mixture, add egg, buttermilk, baking soda, cinnamon and the one-third cup sifted flour. Mix only until dry ingredients are well moistened. Pour into buttered pan. Mix sugar mixture that was set aside and chopped nuts; sprinkle over the top. Bake 50-60 minutes. Let cool in pan and cut in rectangles about 1 1/2 x 3 inches.
Try this tip - make it easier for yourself: If brown sugar is lumpy, press through course sieve; or heat in slow oven; or crush lumps with rolling pin. Measure it just before you use it.
To go along with the cooler weather we've been having, people have been fixing waffles, either for breakfast, lunch or supper - they're good anytime. Here are some P's and Q's that might help you in using your waffle baker: The majority of waffle bakers require no greasing. The waffle baker should be preheating while you are mixing the batter. If the waffle baker has no automatic heat control, test by sprinkling a few drops of water on the grids. It is ready for use if water "dances" before evaporating.

Pour batter quickly over the grids. Start from center and work out to sides. Do not keep open longer than necessary. When steaming stops or signal goes off (4-5 minutes), lift lid and gently remove waffle with fork. After baking, allow waffle baker to cool with lid up.

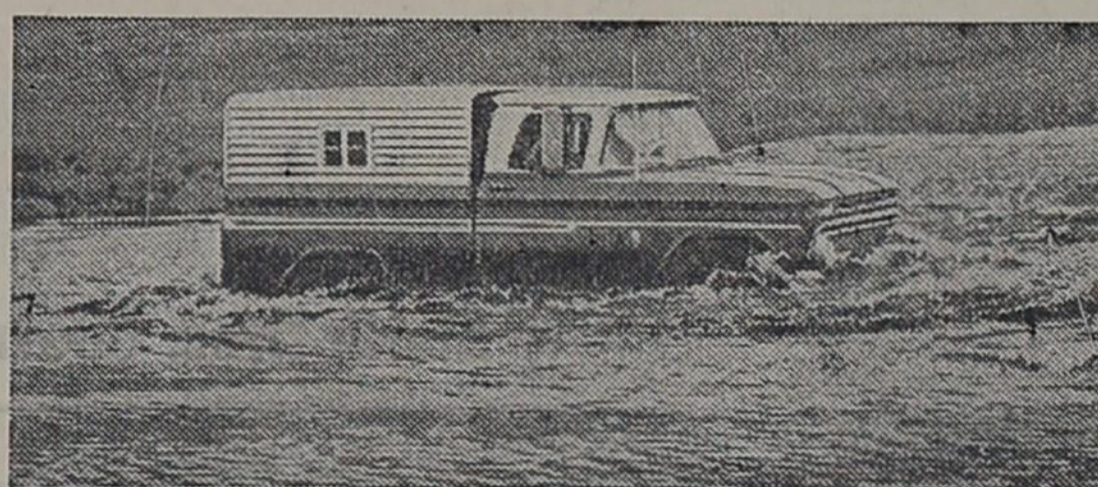

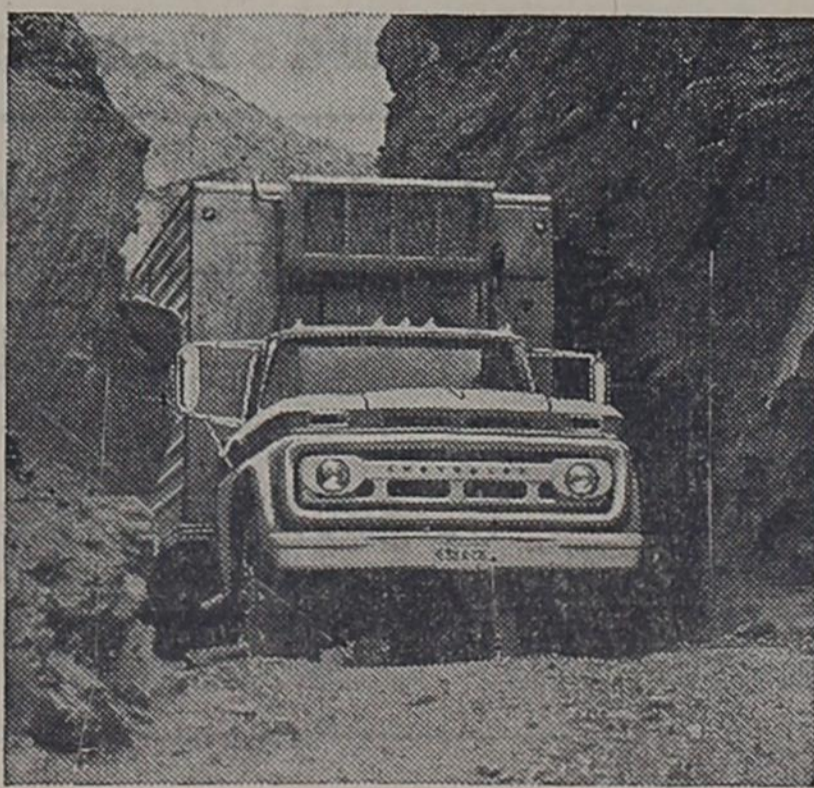

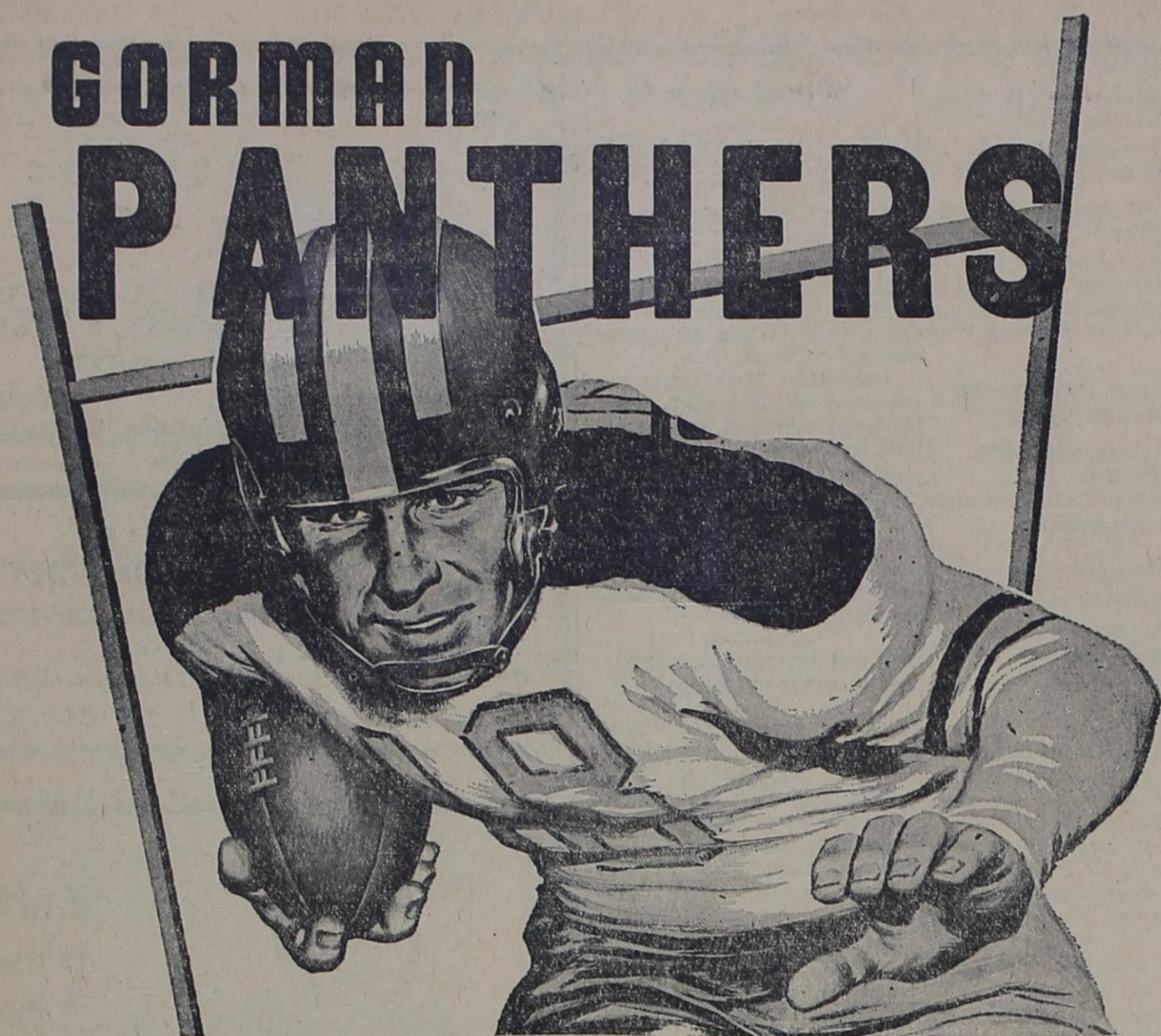
