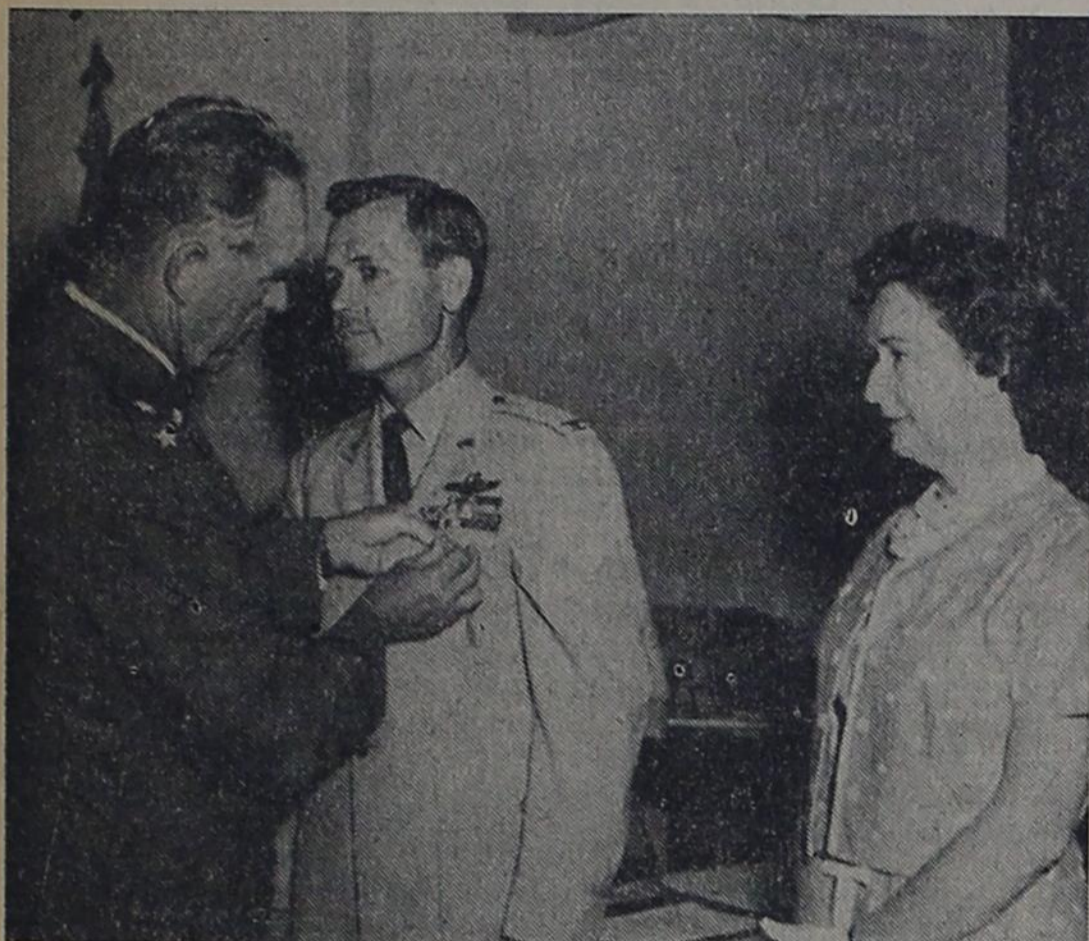


## Col. Nathan Mehaffey Retires From USAF August 31 After 22 Years Service

From Flying Cadet in 1941, to Colonel and the Pentagon in 1962. A most colorful career in the U. S. Air Force ended for Col. Nathan G. Mehaffey, when he retired on August 31, 1962 after 22 years of active duty, the last six as a Col.

Having spent several years in the Pacific, Europe, 11 states and the District of Columbia, flown 500 hours in trainers, fighters, and bombers, he still likes Texas best and states "He wouldn't want his children to grow up anywhere else."

## Buford Parker Harvests 50th Crop

Mr. Buford Parker of the Koko Community, Eastland County, Texas, is currently harvesting his fiftieth consecutive peanut crop. This must establish some sort of a production record so far as peanuts are concerned. Mr. Parker, age seventy-one, has lived in the same community all of his life having been born on a farm adjoining that which he operates today. In a recent interview he stated that he expected a yield of some thirty bushels per acre this season. In looking back over the years he recalls that 1949 and 1950 were the best crop years yield wise and that 1943 was one of the worst crop years.

Mr. Parker has thirty-seven acres in peanuts which he rotates with other crops. For years he has used commercial fertilizer and has followed peanuts each year with a cover crop. His first crop of peanuts was hand planted, covered, and cultivated mainly with a row harrow. He states that his first crops were threshed with steam boiler power. Mr. Parker states that he planted some cotton each year until the boll weevil took over. He recalls laughingly that his last cotton crop of four acres was planted for the purpose of making a mattress but that he had to buy fourteen pounds of additional cotton to have enough to complete the mattress following his cotton harvest.

The home of Mr. and Mrs. Thurman Jay, two miles west of Gorman on the old Carbon highway, was destroyed by fire Monday afternoon.

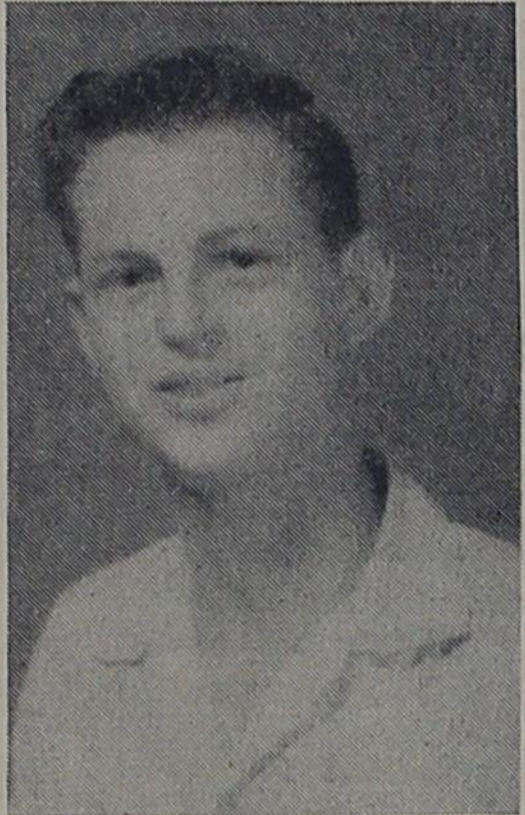
The fire was believed to have started from appliances in the back part of the house.

Turner believes he lost control of the car as it was making the sharp curve near the Wilbur Overstreet home.

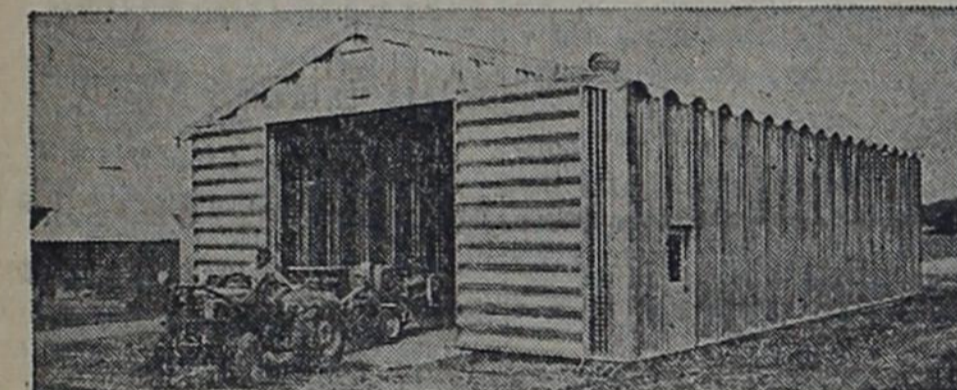

## WASHINGTON AND "SMALL BUSINESS" By C. WILSON HARDER

In all the discussion of slashing U. S. tariff protection to work with the European Common Market, it has largely escaped notice that there is a disparity between the legal business practices in Europe and in America.

The U. S. antitrust laws are not recognized in Europe, where business is done largely by cartels and monopolies. These cartels have their own cosy way of rigging markets. Unfortunately, they have also been teaching the big American combines who have set up operations in Europe to take advantage of the cheap labor, some of the tricks.

A recent example is the case due to be tried in October in Federal courts in which the government charges that the two largest American electrical manufacturers were in cahoots with a European firm to keep U. S. made radio and TV sets out of Canada.

The European party to this arrangement was Philips Gloeilampenfabrieken, of Holland. This is a huge firm, many of whose products are sold in the United States.

But the Justice Department found that Philips as well as the two U. S. combines have Canadian plants.

It is charged the three conspired to keep American products out of Canada by reserving all patent rights for their Canadian subsidiaries.

The apparent result, Justice Dept. charges, has been to restrict U. S. sales of radio and TV sets in Canada to less than 1% of total sales volume of nations' northern neighbor.

Last month the Dutch firm signed a consent order by which it agreed to stop taking part in this rigging of the Canadian market. The American firms are scheduled to go on trial in October.

Now, even though the Dutch combine, by signing the consent decree, tacitly admitted guilt, actually, unlike the U.S. firms involved, there is a large question in this area.

European firms, in their own nations, can engage in all sorts of market rigging practices legally, just as in a like manner a citizen of Russia can preach Karl Marx in Red Square with full legality.

Thus, there is opened up a serious question. If American tariffs are abandoned, on the theory that if Europe has a free market in America, America will likewise have a free market in Europe, will the U.S. economy benefit?

The answer is probably no. For there exists between the American concept of free enterprise and the Europe concept of market rigging by monopolies a chasm as deep as that which exists between the American and Russian economic concepts. There can be nothing in common in a Common Market where part adheres to the archaic practice of market rigging by monopolies, and the other part believes in a free and open market place.

## It's Time For... EYE CARE

Proper care of the eyes during the sunny months of the year cannot be overemphasized. It is quite easy for an eye to become sunburned just as the skin may become burned.

This condition of the eye is called solar retinitis and one can even lose his vision—permanently—because the nerve endings may be affected.

The use of proper sun glasses or sun contact lenses are important and these can be prescribed by your doctor. Cheap sun glasses often are of poor optical quality and they will distort vision or they may not be enough protection in screening harmful rays of the sun. Your sun lenses should be checked by your optometrist or your ophthalmologist.

Sun glasses should not be worn at night. According to the National Eye Research Foundation, about 8 per cent of the light is removed by ordinary spectacle lenses. As a rule, doctors do not prescribe darker tints to be worn at night, and sun glasses which are much darker should not be worn after dark because of reduced visibility and danger of driving accidents.

Some people who wear glasses or contact lenses are content with any type of sun glasses, chiefly because they are mainly interested in screening out the light rays of the sun. These people should know they are doing their eyes a great deal of damage and should consult their eye doctor for the proper type of sun protection.

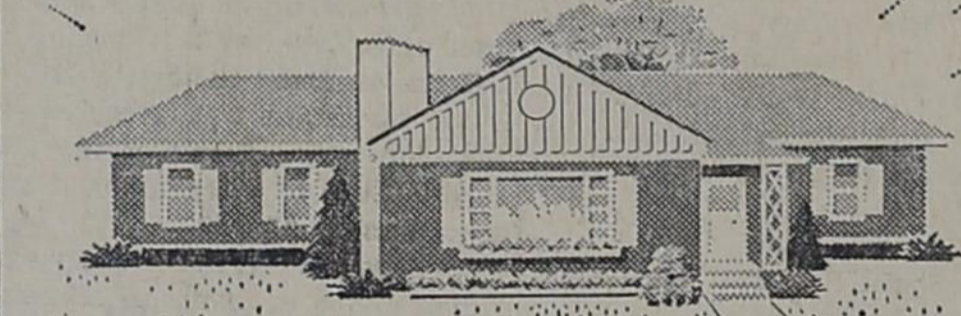

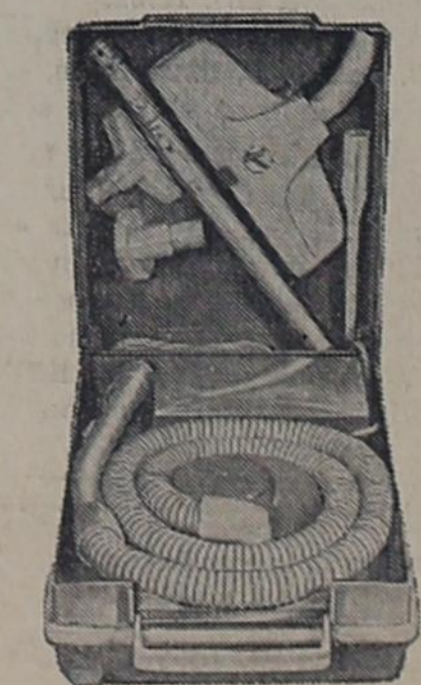

**MUNY LEAGUE  
CITES DANGER  
IN AMENDMENT**

AUSTIN — Texas municipal officials have been advised that they "might as well close down everything but the city jail" if a proposed amendment to the Texas Constitution is adopted this fall.

George E. Murphy, President of the Texas Municipal League, told officials of the more than 600 member cities of the League that the so-called "trial de novo" amendment, to be voted on Novem-

ber 6, "could, as presently written, virtually destroy municipal government in Texas, except for certain of its police powers."

"There is no reason to believe that sponsors of the proposed amendment meant to cause the havoc and mischief that could result for our cities if the proposal were adopted by vote of the majority this year," Murphy said. "On the basis of the opinion of our legal staff and the judgement of outstanding members of the Bar whom we have consulted, however, I must advise you that very grim consequences could result for cities and all local government if our State Constitution were amended in the manner proposed."

Murphy pointed out that the "trial de novo" procedure would mean that "even the most simple action or decision by any administrative agency or officer of municipal government could be subject to inexhaustible litigation in the courts. Our cities could, in effect, be placed under control of the State Courts, rather than the locally-elected Councils."

As examples of the "mischief" that could be caused by the "trial de novo" procedure, Murphy listed the following:

1. City Councils might have their authority to enforce zoning regulations nullified, meaning that if an application were denied for permission to construct a commercial establishment in a residential area, applicants could, in effect, ignore the Council's ruling and involve property-owners and city officials in costly court proceedings.

2. If municipal health inspectors found insanitary conditions in a public eating place, they could not require a clean-up without a court battle which might last for a period of years.

3. Decisions to hire — or not hire — applicants for municipal employment could be taken to court. Municipal control over employment practices — including hiring, firing, promotion, salaries, etc. — could, in effect, be transferred from City Hall to the courtroom.

4. Even the granting of a dog license by city agencies could be made subject to review in the courts.

"The real loser from this change," Murphy said, "would be the local taxpayer. If he went to City Hall for a decision, neither the taxpayer nor the city government itself could be certain that

the most simple administrative decision would be final. Every decision could be made subject to court review and the burden of proof could be imposed upon municipal government, rather than upon the individual instigating the suit.

"It is entirely conceivable that costs resulting from the "trial de novo" procedure could force an increase of one-third to one-half in municipal budgets of many cities and require corresponding increases in tax rates."

Murphy emphasized that, "As worded, this amendment could mean the end of local self-government in Texas. It would place the effective control not only of our cities but of our school districts, water districts, flood control districts, and our counties entirely in the hands of the Legislature and could make Courts the Administrators of local government in Texas."

"If this amendment were to be adopted in its present form, it would have the incredible effect of making Texas the first and only political body in this country to abandon and destroy the system of checks and balances between the branches of government which is so indispensable to our freedom."

In his remarks directed to city officials, Murphy added, "I do not propose to set myself up as a political philosopher. My purpose is to alert you to the specific troubles this amendment could cause in the operation of municipal government in Texas. I find myself compelled to say, however, that the dangers and evils of over-centralized government can be as great at the state level as at the Federal level."

"As Americans, all of us are conscious of the vital importance of maintaining the separate integrity of the three branches of Government — Legislative, Executive, and Judicial. The Constitution of the United States does not expressly mention this division of powers. However, the first Constitution adopted by the Republic of Texas — and every constitution adopted by Texans since the Republic became a State — prudently spells out this division and directs that the separation of powers shall be maintained.

"I am positive that if the people

of Texas were asked to vote directly on the question of whether local self-government should be made subordinate to control of the State Courts or the State Legislature, the vote would be overwhelmingly against such a radical and dangerous departure. The choice is not so clearly stated in the "trial de novo" amendment proposal, but the danger is no less real and great. A fundamental change in the form and philosophy of our government is presented, perhaps, inadvertently, by this amendment. Under these circumstances, I am sure that you will want to take an active role in making certain that voters are fully aware of the implications of their choice when they mark their ballots on Amendment No. 14 next November 6."

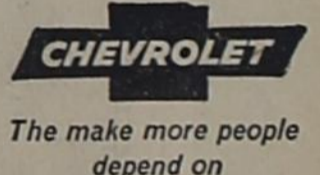

## Browsing with Bev

Here are some do's and don't's for hanging pictures:  
DO -

1. Hang your pictures flat against the wall.
2. Glue pieces of foam rubber at the lower corners of pictures. This prevents dust from collecting behind the picture and keeps the picture straight on the wall.
3. Use gummed-cloth hangers for light weight pictures. They work best on smooth walls. To apply them, moisten the glue and press to the wall. The hook is ready to use when the paste dries. To remove, moisten the cloth with water and peel off.
4. Use regular picture hooks, available in many sizes, to hang medium weight pictures, mirrors, etc. Drive the long brad through the hook at an angle, increasing the weight it can hold.
5. Drive nails or brads through an X of cellophane tape to prevent plaster from cracking when the nail is removed.
6. Use two parallel wires down from the picture moulding at the ceiling to give adequate support for heavy mirrors and pictures. To hide wires used in this way, paint them the exact color of the wall.
7. Try grouping three pictures with a lamp for an informal arrangement. Let the lamp take the place of a fourth picture. The lamp then lights up the group.
8. Place a picture at the side of a furniture grouping with a plant, lamp or other accessories to balance the unit. The informal arrangement is often more pleasing than the stiff formal one, which
