


The meeting, to be convened at Hotel Texas and to be hosted by the Texas Livestock Auction Assn. will open with a luncheon at 12:30



When frozen food thaws in your home, is it always necessary to discard it? Research studies reveal that if

the temperature of the food has not risen above ordinary refrigerator temperatures (40 degrees F.), then you may consider refreezing it - - provided it has acceptable odor, texture and color.

The process of refreezing in itself introduces no hazard. If the partially thawed food is safe to eat, it is safe to refreeze.

A rise in a food's temperature would have to answer. And now up to thawing impairs color, flavor, and texture, and the refreezback out. It is the best thing that ing period causes further loss of quality. If the total time involved is short enough, there may be quality left to justify refreezing.

> No health hazard is involved if the temperature of the food has not risen above ordinary refrigerator temperature. Food-poisoning bacteria have never been found to grow at temperatures below 38 degrees F., and they grow very slowly between 38 and 45 degrees. Other bacteria can grow slowly at these or even lower temperatures, and they cause off-odors and off-flavors that spoil
