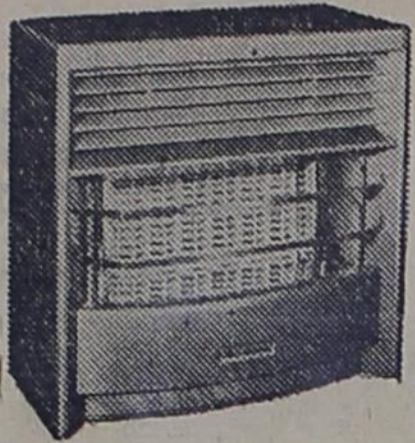

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Pioneer Lawyer Dies In Florida

Judge Herbert A. Rider, a veteran attorney and public official of Hendry County, died at his home in LaBelle Tuesday, at the age of 85. He had remained active and carried on his law practice until recent weeks.

He had served as county judge and the title "Judge" was retained by his many friends and acquaintances, who always referred to him as Judge Rider.

He was a native of Georgia and received his early education in the schools of that state, graduating from the Atlanta Law College. He practiced law in Georgia; was a school teacher for several years. He was county attorney in a Georgia county and also served in a similar position in Oklahoma before going to Florida.

He served as city commissioner and mayor of LaBelle, Fla., as county attorney and county judge. He was an active member of the First Baptist Church of LaBelle, serving as deacon. He was a Mason and a Woodman of the World.

Funeral services were held Oct. 10th in the chapel of Engelhardt Funeral Home in Fort Myers with the Rev. Reeves C. Dean, pastor of the First Baptist Church of LaBelle officiating, assisted by the Rev. Duane Zoller. Burial was in Griffin, Ga.

Mr. Rider, a former Gorman, Texas resident and Ex-Hankins College student, was a brother of the late Homer Rider and was the last of the Rider family.

If you were born before August 30, 1922, you don't have any, says SSS headquarters.

If you were born after August 30, 1922, you legally are required to be registered, unless you are not yet 18 years old.

Any man past 35 is no longer liable for military service. But he still is obligated to inform his local draft board of any change of address.

Livestock Show were discussed. The following officers were elected: Ross Wilson, Gorman, President; Waverly Massingale, Eastland, Vice President; and Glynn Gilliam, Eastland, Secretary-Treasurer.

The 1963 County Livestock Show, which is expected to be the biggest one to date, will be held in Eastland on March 15 and 16. Last year's show attracted some 750 entries from Eastland and surrounding counties. In addition to FFA and 4-H entries in swine, dairy, beef and sheep divisions, the 1963 show will feature an open division for breeding beef cattle. It is expected that the open show will attract many entries from registered Hereford breeders in this area.

It was reported to the group in Monday's meeting that cattle testing for brucellosis would probably begin in Eastland County on or about January 1, 1963. The Livestock Raisers Assn. sponsored the producer sign-up last spring and summer petitioning the Livestock Sanitary Commission to declare Eastland County as a Type II Brucellosis Control Area. The Association voted to request the Livestock Sanitary Commission to sponsor a big county-wide meeting of livestock raisers in the Eastland High School auditorium on the night of December 17. The purpose of this meeting would be to inform producers of purposes and methods regarding the testing of cattle for brucellosis. Post Office Helps Count Livestock

Rural mail carriers from the Gorman Post Office will leave some livestock survey cards along their routes beginning Nov. 16.

"Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms," Postmaster Baze explained.

Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes.

"This means that not every box will get a card," Mr. Baze said. "For this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings."

Carriers assisting with the survey are: D. R. Clark, Rt. 1; W. O. Parr, Rt. 2; and A. O. Clark, Rt. 3.

Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for the Texas and National pig crop report and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service releases, newspapers, farm magazines, radio and television.

Peanut Growers To Vote On Peanut Quotas On Dec 11

Peanut growers will vote on Tuesday, December 11, to decide whether quotas will continue to be used in marketing their crop. William F. Bryant, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Comanche County Committee, said recently. The vote will be on quotas for the 1963, 1964, and 1965 crops.

According to the Chairman, a grower will be eligible to vote in the referendum if he is entitled to share in 1962-crop peanuts planted for harvest as nuts on a farm having more than one acre of peanuts planted. A landlord of a standing rent, cash rent, or fixed rent tenant is not eligible to vote.

At least two-thirds of the growers voting in the referendum must approve the quotas if they are to be made effective. Whether or not quotas are approved, the 1963-crop peanut acreage allotments will remain in effect as a means of determining eligibility for the available price support.

Mr. Bryant explained that the issues in the peanut quota referendum are similar to those in quota votes for other "basic" crops. If the quotas are approved by growers, the quotas with marketing penalties on "excess" peanuts - will be in effect in each of the three years, and growers who comply with their allotments will be eligible for price support at the full announced rate.

If quotas are not approved by the growers, the quotas and penalties will not be in effect for 1963-crop peanuts, and price support to growers who comply with

their acreage allotments will drop to 50 percent of parity. In this case, another referendum would be held in 1963 for the following three crops.

Peanut marketing quotas, as approved by growers voting in prior referendums, have been in effect each year since 1949. The last previous referendum was held in December, 1959, when 94.9 percent of the growers voting approved marketing quotas for the 1960, 1961, and 1962 crops.
