Important Farmers Union Meeting Is Scheduled Here

A very important meeting for all farmers of this area will be conducted on Thursday night, November 29, 1962, when the Eastland County Farmers Union meets at the Gorman High School Auditorium.

The meeting, scheduled to begin at 7:30 p. m., will stress the importance of soil testing. Mr. Joe A. Lemmons, Mexia, Texas, a commercial specialist in the use of lime, phosphate, and other soil additives, will join a representative of Texas A&M College in discussing proper soil testing and how it can improve the farmer's net income. Soil testing is being recognized more and more as an essential tool in determining the types and amounts of fertilizer needed for a particular farm in enabling the farmer to reach maximum production per acre. Obtaining the proper representative soil sample will be discussed as well as how to get the results from the tests and apply the findings.

Mr. Wayne Eaves, President of the Eastland County Farmers Union, urges all members and directors of the organization, as well as the general public, to attend this most important meeting.

County Pecan Show Slated For Dec. 14-15 At Ranger

W. T. Panthers Tie May Tigers 8-8 In Final Game Of Season

Gorman's Panthers had to settle for a tie ball game last Friday night to close out the season for both teams, while the Rising Star Wildcats were pouncing the Blanket Tigers 39-8 to win the District 21-B Crown. The Wildcats play District 22-B Champs, Johnson City Friday night at 7:30 in San

Saba for the Bi-District round. Rising Star has a 6-2-1 record and Johnson City has a 9-1 season mark. Coach Weldon Hill and Assistant Coach Frank Gray were members of Rising Stars 1949 Championship eleven, the last time the Cats had won District until this fall.

The Panthers, after making several good drives in the third and fourth quarters but being stopped by fumbles, recovered a Tiger fumble on their nine yard line. On first down Gary Overstreet rumbled the line for a four yard gain. With second and goal-to-go on the five Ronnie Page ran a keeper for another four yards to the one. Page again ran a keeper for the 6 pointer. Ronnie then threw to Overstreet in the right flat for the two pointer to tie the game at 8-8 with four minutes left in the game.

The Panthers held the Tigers on three downs forcing them to kick and with only a couple of minutes left in the game Overstreet rambled down the sidelines to about the Tiger 30 for his longest run of the game. A May player apparently didn't like the way he ran with the ball for he started an argument with him which the referees and coaches promptly settled.

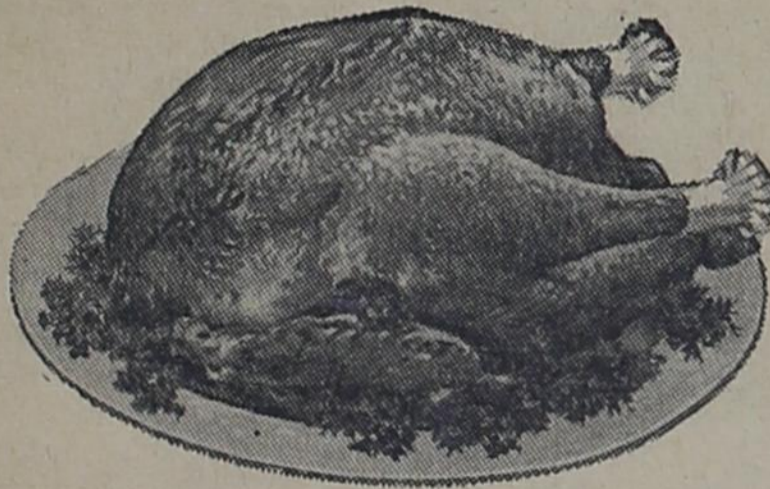

HINTS OFFERED ON CARE OF GAME AFTER THE KILL

What kind of reception do you receive, "Mr. Hunter," when you take home your bag of game? Does your wife throw up her hands in disgust?

If she does, the fault may rest with the hunter. The mishandling of game after the kill often makes impossible a tasty preparation job in the kitchen, and the putting of meat on the family table as you would like it.

Immediate proper bleeding of game animals is most important in improving flavor of meat. The same is true for ducks and geese and most other game species. This practice will do much to remove the strong, gamey flavor which some people dislike.

Field dressing is recommended immediately after the kill, especially if the weather is relatively warm. The sooner the animal is dressed the better for immediate dressing means fewer chances for meat spoilage or undesirable flavor or odor.

Keep the game clean. Avoid letting hair, feathers, dirt or other trash or debris come into contact with the meat. Before the blood dries, wipe the body cavity clean with either a dry or slightly moistened cloth rather than by washing

If the weather is warm, game should be put into cold storage as soon as possible. If it is held just above freezing for several days, the meat will become more tender and have less of the undesirable "gamey" flavor. A deer should be aged in cold storage much the same as the carcass of a beef animal. Omit the aging process and your wife will have good reason for hoping you don't bag a deer this year.

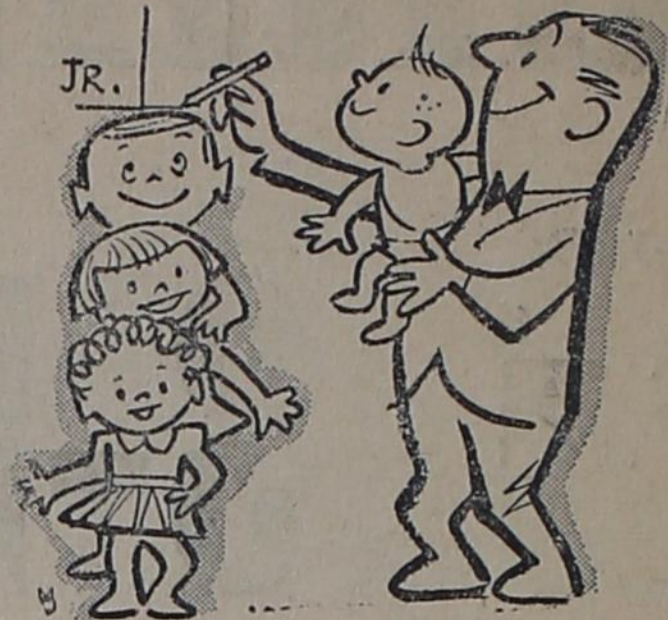

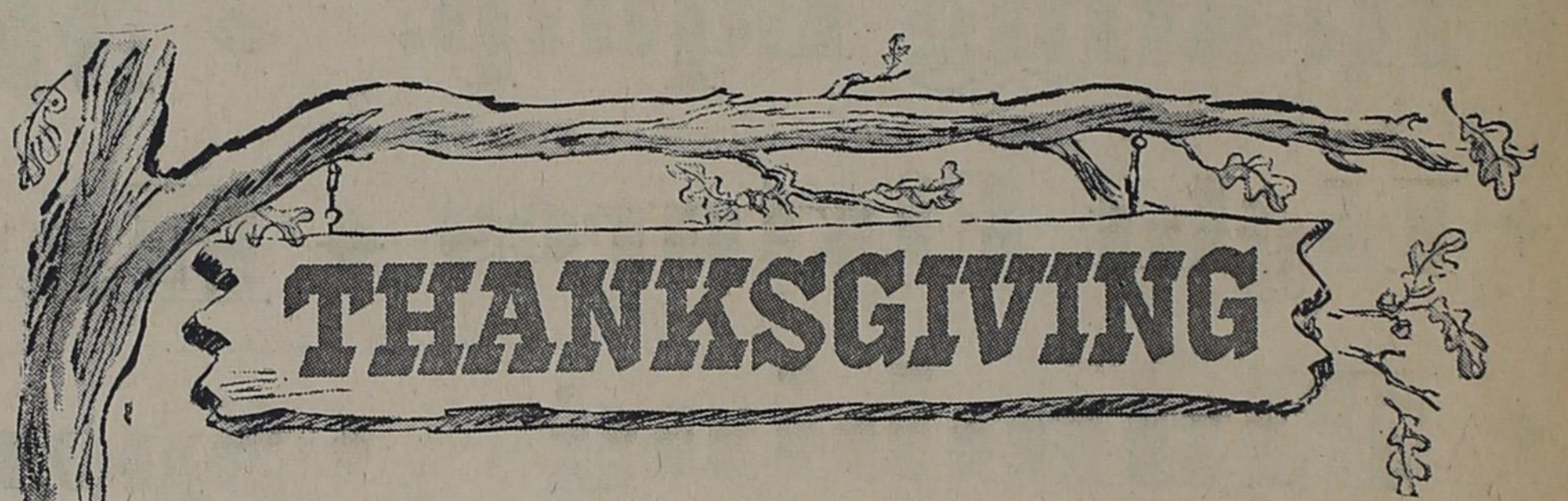

School Board Meet Held November 12

The Gorman School Board met in regular session on Monday, November 12 with Mr. Dean Kirk being the only member absent.

Mr. and Mrs. Doyle Lee Jobe and Mr. Ed Johnson met with the board to discuss their school problems stemming from pupil-teacher relationships. Supt. Taylor agreed to do anything he deemed appropriate to relieve the situation.

Certain changes in the school personnel hospitalization benefits were adopted. The changes included "major medical benefits" and a \$12 per day room allowance. Changes will become effective on Nov. 1, 1962.

The board approved a school policy whereby there would be no discrimination in playing integrated athletic teams or engaging in competitive activities with integrated schools. (The expression of the above policy stemmed from the fact that the Ranger High School girls basketball team, tentatively entered in the Gorman Invitation Basketball Tourney, was known to have two Negro girl members.)

Approval was made to pay \$6.16 as Gorman Schools' share of the recent consolidation election supplies expense.

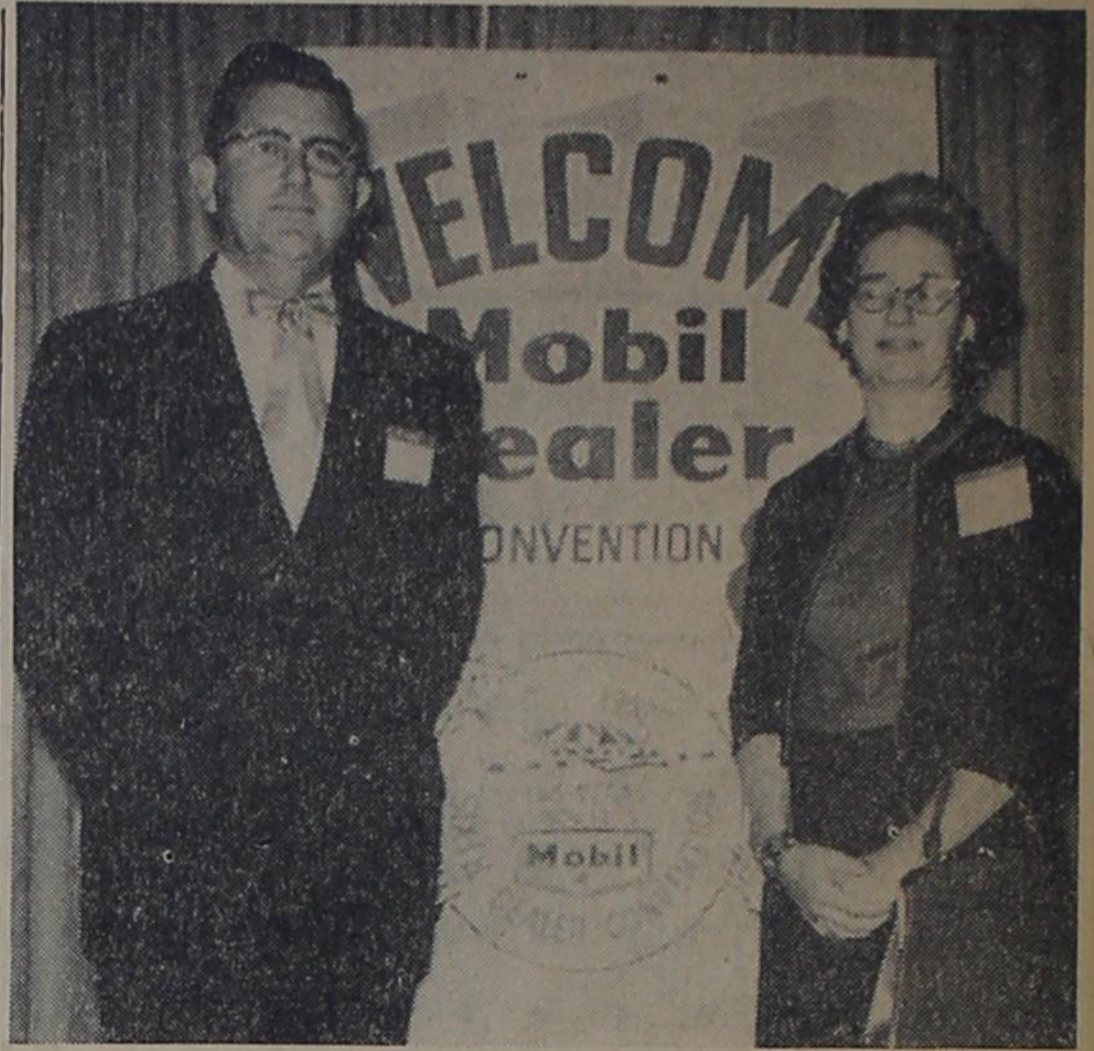
A policy on athletic, band and cheerleader award jackets was adopted requiring that a student "participating actively and satisfactorily" in a second major sport (not necessarily "to letter") in order to be eligible for a full award, paid for by the school.

A "survey and analysis of the physical needs of the school plant" was inspected and discussed briefly, and tabled for further study.

Supt. Taylor and Tax Assessor-Collector, Mrs. Louise Rankin, were authorized to prepare an outline and analysis report listing and describing the various types and classes of properties being rendered for school taxes, showing the existing basis and practices used in setting the values for school tax purposes.

A report on 1962 taxes collected to date showed the current roll to be 64% paid.
