

EASTLAND CO. COMMISSIONERS ARE ENJOINED IN COURT CASE

EASTLAND (RNS) — A temporary injunction to restrain Eastland County Commissioners from using county equipment on city or private property in Gorman was granted in 91st District Court Tuesday by District Judge Turner Collie.

C. O. McMillan of Stephenville, attorney for the commissioners, gave immediate notice of appeal to the 11th Court of Civil Appeals at Eastland.

Frank Sparks, attorney for the plaintiff, submitted the case as it had been presented last Thursday, alleging that "the county commissioners court is using county equipment unlawfully within the City of Gorman."

He said the plaintiffs, J. L. Butler and Bryan L. Johnson of Gorman, asked the injunction to restrain Glenn Justice, commissioner from Gorman, and the other commissioners from use of the equipment on private and city property.

McMillan, speaking for the defendants, said, "Gorman does not have the equipment nor the means to secure the equipment. Gorman has a bigger stake in this project (for city street improvement) than do the plaintiffs."

He contended that "only officials of the City of Gorman have a right to make the complaint. These men (the plaintiffs) are not such officials. The injunction would serve no purpose except to punish the people of Gorman and that area."

Judge Collie said, in ruling for the plaintiffs, "Use of equipment on a private airport in Gorman is certainly a violation of law. The good intentions of the commissioner is not to be considered. There is no violation of the penal code in this Eastland County case."

Judge Collie said, citing cases concerning work on city streets by county equipment, that he found "that where city streets are not a part of a previously designated highway, county equipment should not be used."

After the ruling, McMillan asked for \$10,000 bond to be furnished by the plaintiff to cover possible damage to Gorman streets because of the work stoppage. Sparks objected. The judge set the bond at \$2,500.

Pretty Miss Barbara Jobe, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Jobe, was crowned Queen of Gorman's Diamond Jubilee during a gala pageant on Thursday night at Brogdon Field.

Miss Jobe was crowned by Mr. Ross Wilson, President of the Gorman Diamond Jubilee Committee. A concert by the Tarleton State Band, under the direction of John Giardano, preceded the coronation and an address by Texas Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White.

Introducing Mr. White was Mr. Ross Wilson. In Mr. White's address to a capacity crowd he urged the citizens to continue with the same spirit, dedication and citizenship that the early day settlers had in making Gorman the fine community it is today, and we should honor these people who are our root stock. That we should pray that we have inherited the same courage and foresight to face our new frontiers.

Mr. White stated he felt that he was a better American by having spent three weeks in Europe, a trip he had just completed. He said, "I appreciate America and Texas so much more, since making the trip."

His trip to Europe to attend two week conferences with the European Common Market officials, resulted in some disturbing conclusions. White said, "I think we are going to have to scratch and fight to keep the markets we have, and if we don't, we may end up on the economic defensive. European officials were firm in their requests for 'quality' instead of 'quantity' for today's purchases. That the American and Texas farmer are respected the world over for their farming skill and know how in farm production, and every effort should be used to keep up production and quality products. Texas agriculture has an important stake in foreign policy, since most of our state farm products are salable as exports."

Master of ceremonies was Mr. Bob Green, who reviewed briefly, events of the past seventy-five years that led to Thursday, October 3, 1963 and the coronation of a Gorman Diamond Jubilee Queen.

To the background music of "Everything's Coming Up Roses," played by the Tarleton Band, handsome lords and ladies from neighboring realms promenaded to the queen's throne to pay homage to our queen.

The Hico Tigers spoiled Gorman's Homecoming on Saturday night by defeating the Panthers 6-0 for their fifth loss in as many starts.

The capacity crowd, which filled the Gorman side and almost half of the Hico bleachers, saw the Panthers get within five yards of the goal line on one occasion but missing the opportunity to cross the double stripe. The homecoming fans also received a heartbreak when fullback William Lee Jay broke over the right side of the line and rambled for 74 yards before being brought down from behind by the Tigers on the one yard line, only to be called back due to a clipping foul.

The game was played on even terms until late in the fourth period (about 4 minutes left to play) when the Panthers gave the ball to Hico on the Panther 12 yard line after a bad pass-back from the center on an attempted punt which went over the head of the punter. In three plays the Tigers scored when halfback Jerry Casey rambled the last seven yards. The try for extra points failed leaving the score at 6-0 with only about 2 minutes left to play. The Tigers tried an on-side kick which failed.

However, the Panthers were called on a foul also for having an illegal receiver downfield. For the first time this season Gary Overstreet got knocked out of the leading ball carrier spot. William Jay was the leading ball carrier for Gorman with 46 yards on 11 trips (which would have been even greater if the marvelous 74 yard ramble had not been nullified). Overstreet made 42 yards on 17 tries (the 16 yard loss on the miscue on the attempt to punt hurt his average). Jerry Ormsby got 24 yards on 5 carries and Terry Clark had a —16 on 10 tries. Clark's average also was hurt badly by being caught behind the line of scrimmage on a number of plays.

The Panthers journey to Baird on Saturday night to take on the Bears in the Bears Den in their homecoming game. The Bears always play Gorman a tough battle on their home ground and the Panthers will have to play much better football than they have been playing to stay in the game at Baird.

"Do I need, and can I buy, the same kind of insurance - fire, theft, liability, for example - that homeowners purchase?" an apartment dweller asks.

Yes, you may buy the "Residence Contents Broad Form" or "Tenants Form" policy which provides protection for your household property against the perils covered in the Homeowners Broad Form Policy. These perils include fire and lightning, theft, windstorm, smoke, freezing of plumbing, leaks or overflow of water from plumbing or heating systems; vandalism and malicious mischief or damage from aircraft.

In addition, the liability portion of the policy contains three especially important kinds of protection.

The first, personal liability, protects you against claims arising from bodily injury to others - that is, if a visitor slips on your waxed floor and sues you for damages.

You are also covered for medical payments for persons injured in your home. This section of the policy pays all reasonable medical expenses, up to the limits set in your own policy, regardless of who is at fault in the accident.

Finally, you are covered if you or a member of your family damages someone else's property, including damage done by your children. If your child is under 12 years of age, you are even protected if the damage is wilful.

As to what type of insurance you need, and the amount, that should be discussed with your local independent agent. If you have jewelry, objects of art or other high value items for example, you may need a special policy.

ARDIS PORTER ENTERS DALLAS VA HOSPITAL

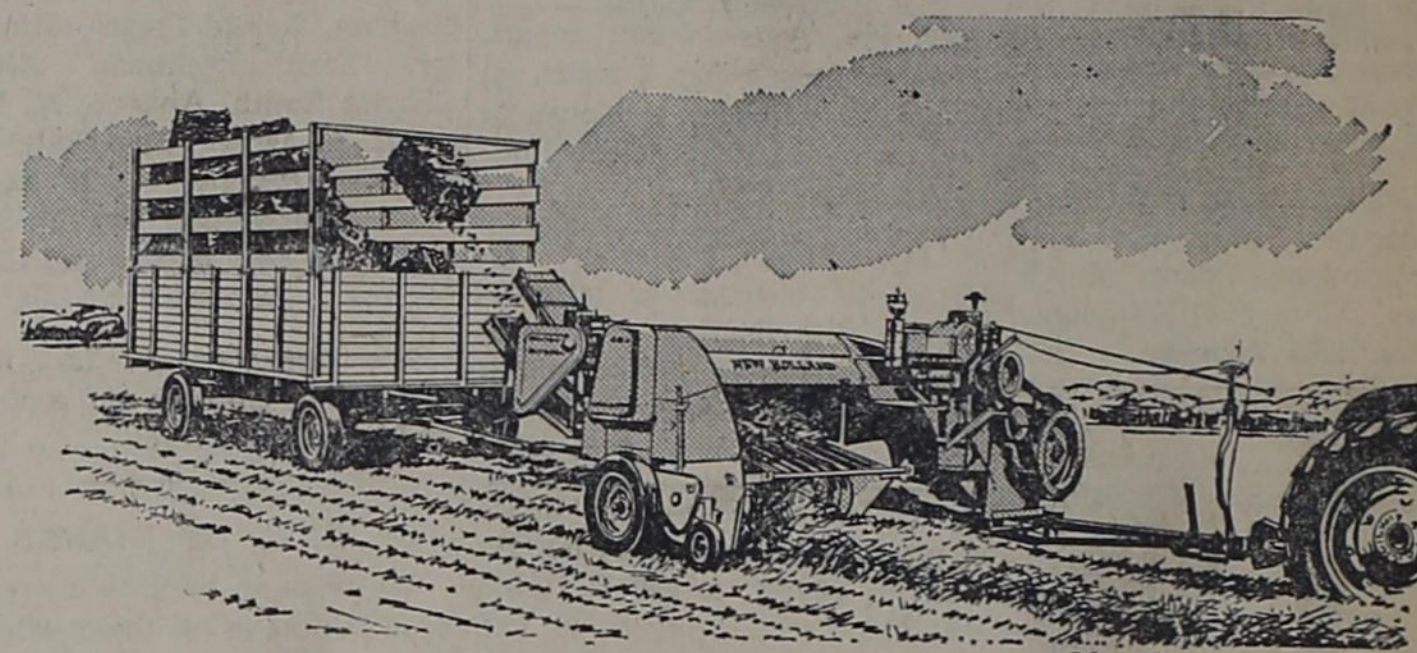
Word reached the Progress of office Wednesday that Murle Ardis Porter of Eastland had been admitted to the Veteran's Hospital in Dallas.
