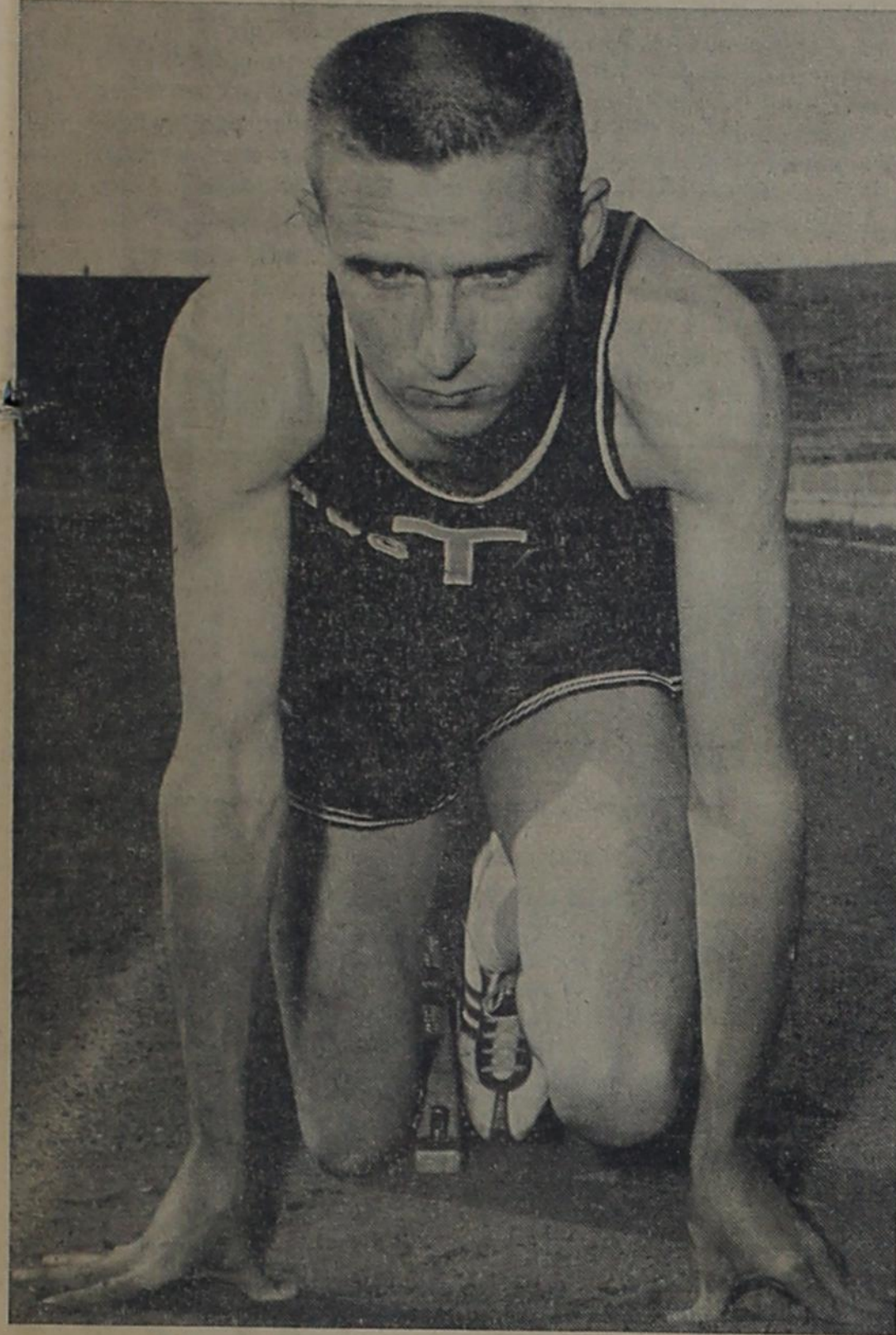


## Jerry Anderson To Be Participant In NCAA Track Meet In Albuquerque



Jerry Anderson, senior physical education and biology major at Texas A&M College, has set quite a few new records in track and field events in recent meets. A 1960 graduate of Gorman High, he is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Buck Anderson of Route 1, Gorman. Jerry set a record time in the Open Quarter Mile of 47.6 and 46.8 in the mile relay in the Southwest Conference Meet held at Fayetteville, Ark. He has only been beaten twice in the mile relay, and the A&M team ended tenth in the nation this year.

He will compete in the United States National Track and Field Federation Meet in Houston Saturday, June 8th. The record set by Anderson at the Abilene Christian College meet on May 18th, qualified him for the Houston meet. The NCAA Meet will be held in Albuquerque, N. M. June 13, 14 and 15th, in which Jerry will be competing, will end the season for him. Anderson meets occasionally with the Brown twins, Elmer and Delmer, for "peanut talk." The Brown boys are former students in the Gorman Schools and were top track and field men in the nation and Olympic stars in the late 1930's. A brother, Larry Anderson, a 1963 Gorman graduate, will enter A&M this fall. He is also rated a good track and field man. Anderson will spend the summer with his parents.

## Lower Electric Rate To Become Effective June 30

The City Commission of Gorman on May 31st, 1963 approved a schedule of reduced residential and general service rates for customers of Texas Electric Service Company. The new rates were presented to the Commission by Mr. Hallmark, manager of the company. Mr. Hallmark said that based on the year 1962, the proposed reduction in residential electric service bills of 6.9 percent and an average reduction in commercial and industrial bills of 7.2 percent. These percentages are overall averages. Some bills will be reduced more than the overall average percent, while some will be reduced less than the overall average. Some bills will not be affected by the rate changes. No electric service bills will be increased by the rates, according to Mr. Hallmark. All residential bills for consumptions in excess of 70 kwh will be lower on the proposed residential rate than on the present residential rate. Residential bills for consumptions of 70 kwh or less will be unchanged by the proposed residential rate. Mr. Hallmark said that the company recently lowered its residential and general service rates in the Fort Worth area and is now in the process of lowering these rates in all other areas that it serves. The new rate schedules are to become effective on June 30, 1963.

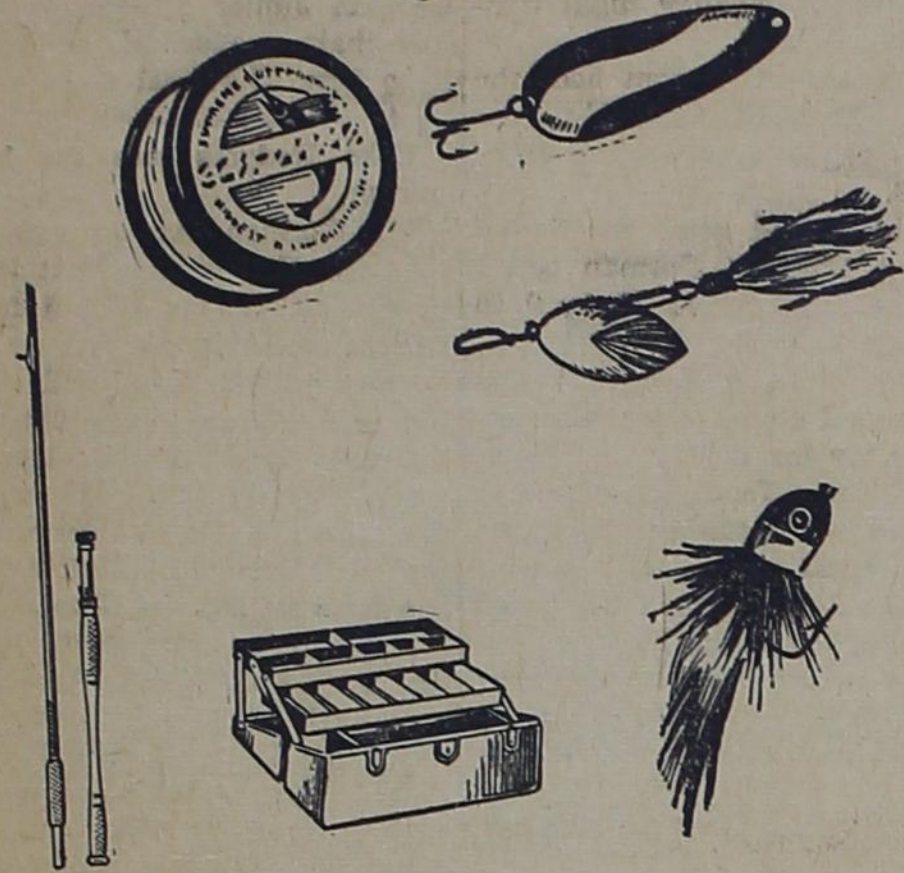

Tribute was paid to Mrs. Chesley as a person who had lived and made some of the history of Eastland county, and who has contributed much to the heritage of the area.

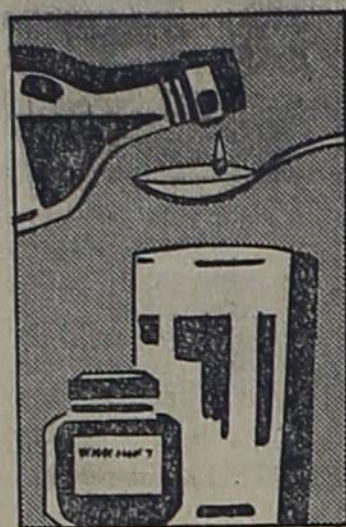

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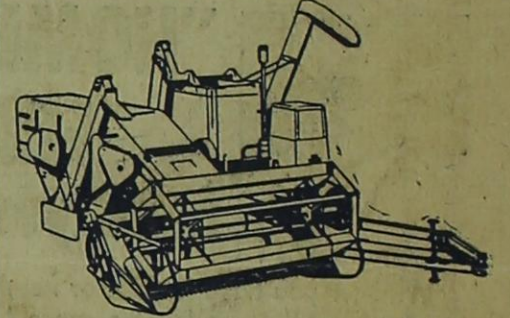
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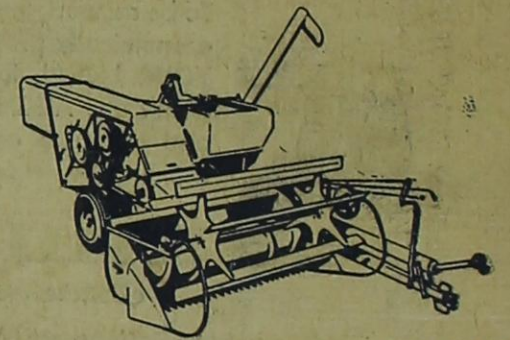
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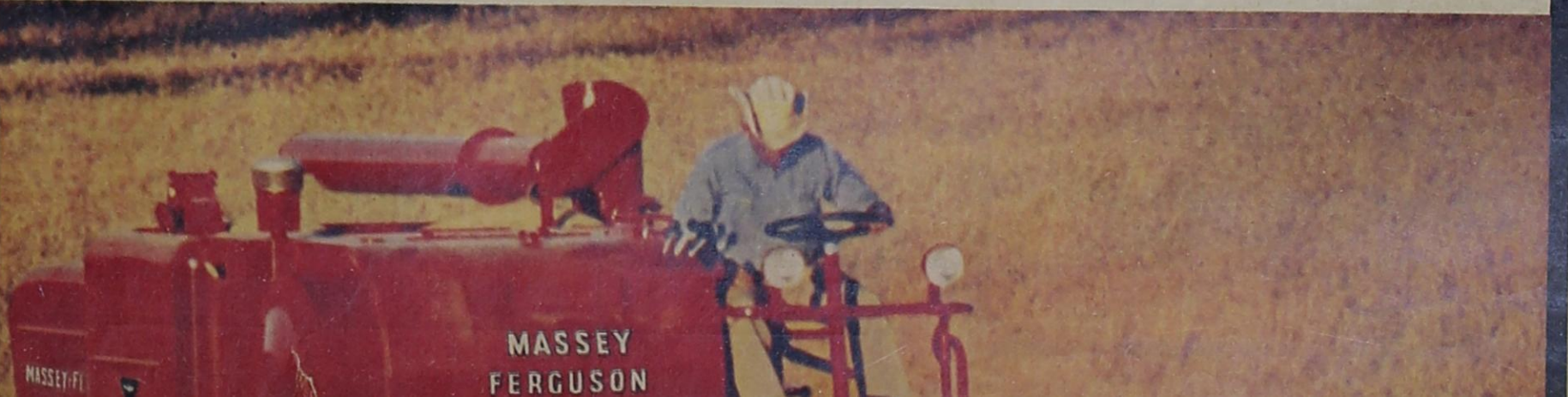


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## DESDEMONA NEWS

## Financial Report And Screwworm Eradic'tn Program

There has been sporadic outbreaks of screwworms from various counties in the state and two cases in the Gorman area on the Davis Smith and A. H. Tyrone ranches. Fortunately the eradication officials have been able to move in on very short notice to contain the infection. The promptness with which the eradication officials have been able to move into these counties is a result of producers submitting samples promptly, the samples being identified, and officials in charge notified immediately of the sample as a confirmed case.

County agents now have a plan of Action to follow where positive cases have been identified in their county. The cooperation of producers in and around the infected area in making closer inspection of their livestock for present cases — and when possible, spraying — has helped contain the infection.

Producer cooperation is extremely important in the eradication program.

Many producers are marking lambs in certain sections of the state, and in many sections cows are calving. Screwworm cases in recently marked lambs and in the navels of new born calves have been reported in a number of instances. Producers should pay close attention to these situations

to help prevent new cases.

The following figures list the number of animals inspected for screwworms on the control line for the week ending May 11, 1963. Cattle, 543 — Sheep and goats 9346.

More than \$3 million collected from Southwestern livestock producers and sportsmen for screwworm eradication has been deposited by Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation and additional funds are still expected.

The Eastland County final report of Screwworm Drive already sent to the Foundation - \$7,629.78.

\$925.20 was forwarded with the present report, making a total amount of \$8,554.98 collected. Approximately 325 individuals made contributions.

Contributions by communities were Rising Star - \$2,694.78; Cisco - \$2,393.50; Eastland - \$1,722.50; and Gorman - \$688.30.

C. G. Scruggs, SWAHRF president, said the fund was "An achievement by the livestock industry and sportsmen of the Southwest that is unprecedented as to amount of funds contributed and the over-all interest and participation by individuals."
