

Nick Eaker, vice president and Director of Engineering of Hallmark Instruments, 6612 Denton Drive, Dallas, Texas, is still the same friendly fellow he was in Gorman and extends an invitation to his friends to drop by when they come to Dallas.

The technical explanation of their Citizen Band Radios which are sold coast-to-coast is too much for a layman to understand but the instrument is simple to operate. SCHOOL TAX & BOND ISSUE GET VOTERS' OKAY

Voters of the Gorman Independent School District approved by more than 2 to 1 Saturday, the School Tax Hike and Bond Issue.

The number of votes polled was comparatively low in the district which includes parts of Eastland and Comanche Counties and has a potential of 750 voters, as only 186 votes were cast.

Proposition No. 1, which authorized the trustees to levy an annual tax not to exceed \$1.50 on \$100 valuation, carried by a vote of 131 to 51.

Proposition No. 2, the Bond Issue of \$40,000, which will be used to purchase school equipment and repair buildings, etc., passed by a vote of 126 to 56.

Mrs. W. C. Emerson Opens Dairy King


Mrs. Clarence Emerson has leased the Hallmark Dairy King and is now open for business.

James Anthony Hart Awarded 4-Year Caffarelli National Merit Scholarship



James Anthony Hart, an Abilene High School senior and former Gorman School student, has been awarded a 4-year Rocco C. Caffarelli National Merit Scholarship to the college of his choice.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. James A. Hart of Abilene and grandson of Mrs. Eula Hart of Route 2, Ranger.

Hart plans to enter the University of Texas and major in physics.

The scholarship was won in nationwide competition with more than 600,000 other high school students who took the 3-hour National Merit Scholarship qualifications test.

Hart was one of 17 scholars selected this year by Frost National Bank of San Antonio. Sixteen grants were awarded from Caffarelli Scholarship Trust, and one from the Myra Stafford Pryor

Trust, with the Frost Bank trustee for the student.

Young Hart was born in England during World War II. He received the first six years of his education in the Gorman School and gives Mrs. Grace Nix some of the credit for his scholastic achievements, by giving him a good foundation in math and other subjects she taught him, when he was a student of hers in the 4th grade.

A bout with scarlet fever when he was a freshman and a ruptured appendix during his freshman year which almost took his life, prevented Hart from active participation in the field of sports.

He has visited 22 states and made a trip back to England. A member of the Junior Academy of Science he has held memberships in the 4-H Club and Civil Defense.



LIFE IN THESE UNITED STATES AS A FARMER

By JOY LOVE

Following is the second place winner in the Excelsior Club essay contest held recently:

A former president, Theodore Roosevelt, once wrote, "No nation has ever achieved permanent greatness unless this greatness was based on the well-being of the great farmer class, the men who live on the soil; for it is upon their welfare, material and moral, that the welfare of the rest of the nation ultimately rests." Elsewhere he also wrote: "Our civilization rests at bottom on the wholesomeness, the attractiveness, and the completeness, as well as the prosperity of life in the country . . . Upon the development of country life rests ultimately our ability, by method of farming requiring highest intelligence . . . we need the development of men in the open country who will be in the future, as in the past, the stay and strength of the nation in time of war, and its guiding and controlling spirit in time of peace."

It is interesting to look at the agriculture industry in the manner B. M. Baruch does in his writing: "The cities are but the branches of the tree of national life, the roots of which go deeply into the land." Agriculture seems to be declining in importance with the grow-

ing production and use of manufactured goods. Although this may be true, farmers still hold a very important position in America today. Agriculture is important because of soil conservation, of breeding of plants and animals, and many other scientific experiments are done or tried in this field of learning.

Agriculture is important to all people. It is important as to its indispensable function of food production, its place in the total wealth and income of the nation, in foreign trade, and also growth in population for the urban centers.

It is interesting to notice how the urban and rural lives are connected. One could not live and prosper without the others services. As stated in The Encyclopedia Americana, the products of American farms furnish more than forty percent of the raw materials of industry, and give employment to approximately thirty-three percent of the workers in manufacturing plants. On the other hand, farmers get, on the average, forty to fifty percent of each dollar spent by the consumer on the retail markets. Urban workers receive in wages about sixty percent of what farmers spend for industrial goods and services furnished by urban peo-

ple. Railroads also benefit from the transporting of farm products.

The nation's best shock absorber in times of depression is agriculture. This provides the unemployed with a place to go and to enable them to earn a living.

Now, to narrow the idea some and look more at farm life apart from the other agricultural fields.

Farming has always had to be in order to survive. When the Europeans first came to America, they no longer held to old customs but started shaping their lives in a new fashion. The Indian served as a model at first. The newcomers copied the Indians' clothing, his shelter, his crops and methods of cultivation, and sometimes even scalping and war cries. The Europeans had come here to have freedom and to form a land much like the Mother Country, but the result was totally new. The new ways, methods, and whole living were completely American.

The farm is a good place for both young and old. Life on the farm is more closely connected with nature than life may be in cities.

It is interesting to note that marriages occur at an earlier age for those living on a farm than for those living in cities. Although this may be true it is also interesting to see that the divorce rate is higher for those raised in the city. More families in the country have children, and these families have more children than those living in the city. The farm life is much better for children where it is not as constricting. There seems to be more freedom, more useful experiences, and a better way of life found on the farm. Also children are regarded as assets on the farm, whereas many city couples consider them liabilities. The farm helps the children, and the children can also help the farm. There are chores for every member of the family from very young to old age.

It should be true that people can live longer lives living as farmers than as a person in city life. The busy traffic, hurried and hectic hours, stale air, close and tight surroundings, and other activities of the city would cause one to become tired, nervous, and reach old age early in life. It is true that farming is hard work, and one works all hours of the day and sometimes night, but it is an interesting work. If a person past retirement age has something of interest he can do, he will be more concerned with his health than he would coupled up in a city.

Agriculture has contributed some character traits that are very useful to a nation. Farming today and also other types of agriculture, produce feelings of individualism, conservation, thrift and frugality, a desire for ownership, democracy of attitude, religiousness, devotion to the purity of the home and of family life, and patriotism.

There can be no greater bulwark against communism, with its policies of state ownership or land, than a healthy condition which finds three of every four farmers owning the farms they operate. This should make an impression on everyone and express the importance of agriculture.

TOASTED PEANUTS

Put a small amount of oil into shallow pan, pour in the peanuts and stir them until they are well coated. There should not be any excess oil in pan, just enough to give an oily surface to each nut. Set the pan in oven and stir often until they become light brown. Drain on paper toweling, spread on a platter and sprinkle with salt.

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
