Peanut production from the 1962 crop is estimated at 1.8 billion pounds, 68 million pounds above last year, and 274 million pounds above average. Of this total production, about one-third to onehalf is used for peanut butter.

Making peanut butter is a relatively simple process. However, you needn't burden yourself with this chore when so many delicious brands are available at your gro-

Peanut butter variations include 'chunky", in which bits of chopped peanuts are mixed with finely ground peanut butter; "homogenized", to which oil is added and the mixtures processed to retard separation; "honey", to which | honey is added to produce a different flavor; "yeasted", to which yeast is added to enrich its food value; and "fortified", to which vitamins are added to restore the vitamins lost in processing.

So, if you're looking for a food to include in your everyday menus, because of its high nutritive value, taste appeal and attractive price, you'll find it hard to beat peanut butter.

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
