## Last Rites Held For Dr. McDaniel

Dr. R. R. McDaniel, pioneer surgeon of Quanah, and well known in that area, died at 4 p. m. Sunday, August 26 in the Quanah Memorial Hospital following an illness of two weeks.

Funeral services were held at 10 a. m. Tuesday, August 28 at the Quanah Methodist Church. Entombment was in Greenwood Memorial Park, Fort Worth, Tuesday afternoon.

Born July 9, 1892 in Gorman, Texas, Dr. McDaniel moved to Quanah in 1914, following his graduation from the University of Tennessee Medical School.

During World War I he served as surgeon in the American Army. He also served with the British Royal Army Medical Corp doing reconstruction surgery in English hospitals.

Returning to Quanah in 1919, he was primarily responsible for the construction of Hardeman County Memorial Hospital in 1936. He had served as chief of staff of the hospital since its construction.

Survivors include his wife of Quanah and a niece, Mrs. Joe R. Wise of Fort Worth.

## 12 Rural Accidents In Eastland County Reported in August

Sergeant Roger W. Sosebee of the Eastland Highway Patrol Sub-district released today the Eastland County rural traffic accident summary for August, 1962.

Sergeant Sosebee reported that 12 rural traffic accidents occurred last month in which no one was killed, 4 injured with property damage amounting to \$9,710.00.

During the same month last year there were 16 accidents with no one killed, 10 injured and property damage amounting to \$9,145.

Sergeant Sosebee reminded that more strict compliance with our traffic laws would further reduce this tremendous loss by so many of our citizens each month.

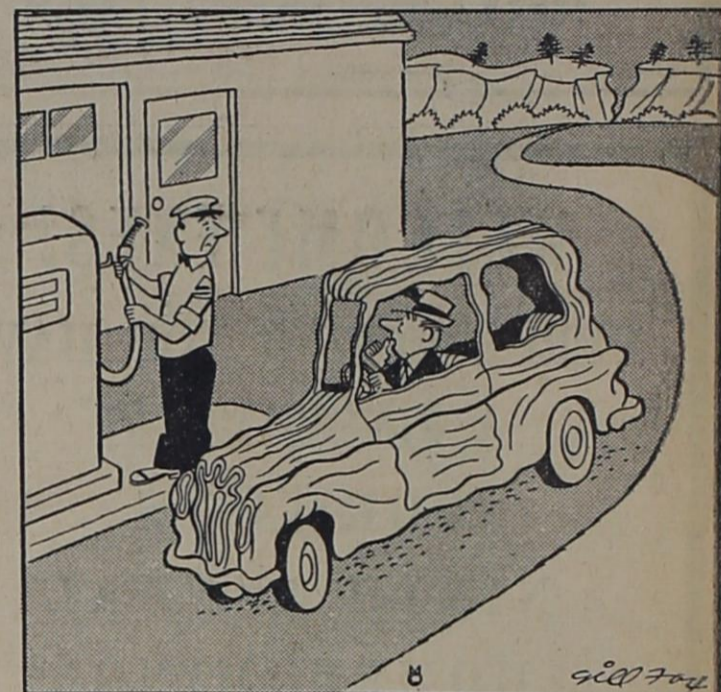
Though some conflicts in activities exist, sixty or more persons, including children, are expected to be present at this "get acquainted get-together."

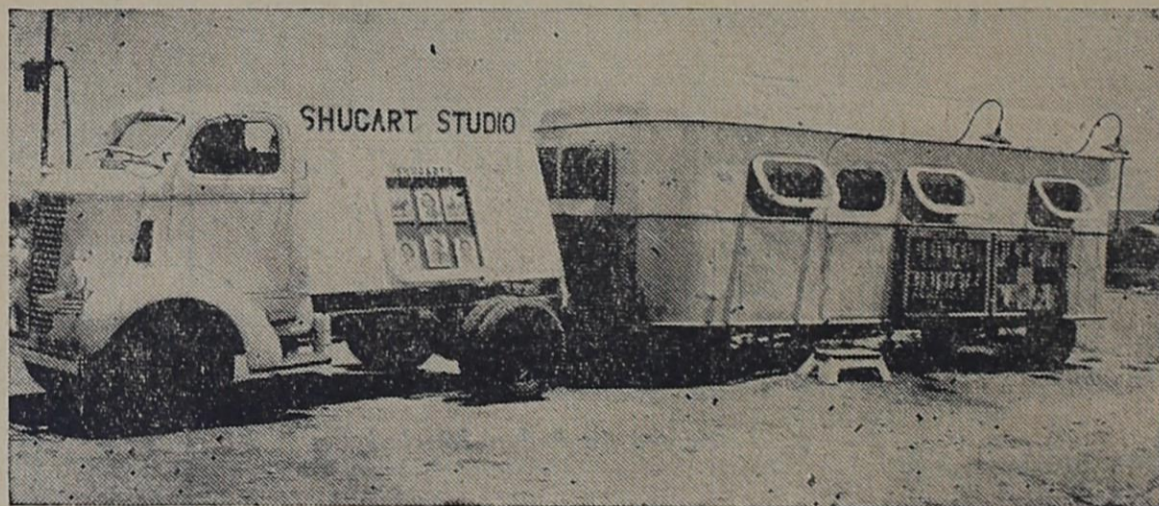

Purpose of the organization will be to make improvements on the school buildings such as paints, curtains, etc.

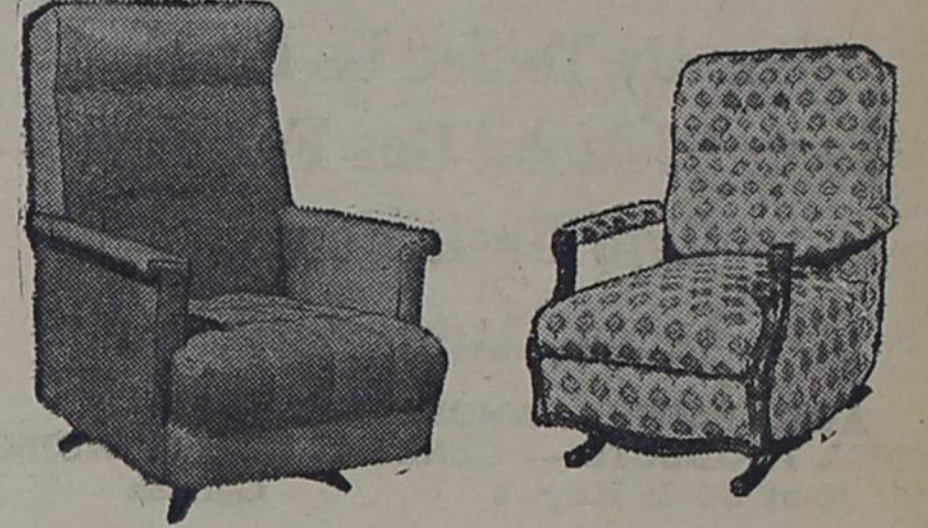

### Browsing with Bev

Do you look for a nice bright sunny day to do your wash? Well, it's not always the woman who gets her wash out first who gets the best results. Clothes come out whitest if you wait until 11 o'clock or so to hang out the wash.

There is less fading between 9 and 11 a. m. and less bleaching in the afternoon between 1 and 3 p. m.

As for durability, the sun takes its greatest toll in the summer months. Unbleached fabrics suffer most.

Here are a couple of interesting facts: More bleaching and more fading occurs during the midsummer months. There's better retention of whiteness in your clothes in late summer.

Wire hangers used by dry cleaners are only a temporary means of transporting clothes from the cleaning establishment to your home — and should not become a permanent accessory in your clothes closet. Wire hangers are not shaped correctly for clothes to hang on them for a long time. If used for storing clothes, they cause the garment to lose shape and droop. Wire hangers also have a way of poking into garments. They may cause holes or snags in loosely woven or fragile fabrics.

Wire hangers are not durable enough to support heavy coats or suits.

In selecting wooden hangers, there are differences in design which are important to consider. The hangers that have extra thick ends that look like a duck's bill will keep garments in shape.

And don't forget the children. There are hangers scaled to their clothes sizes, too.

Joe has won several first and second places in Quarterhorse Shows held over the state recently and is to be commended on his fine crop of Quarterhorses.

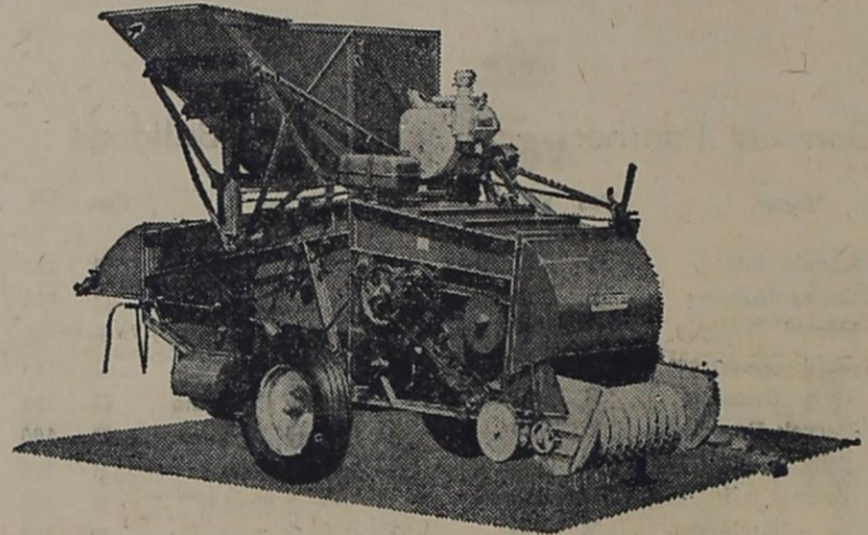
