## Panthers Lose Homecoming Tilt; Host Mavericks Friday

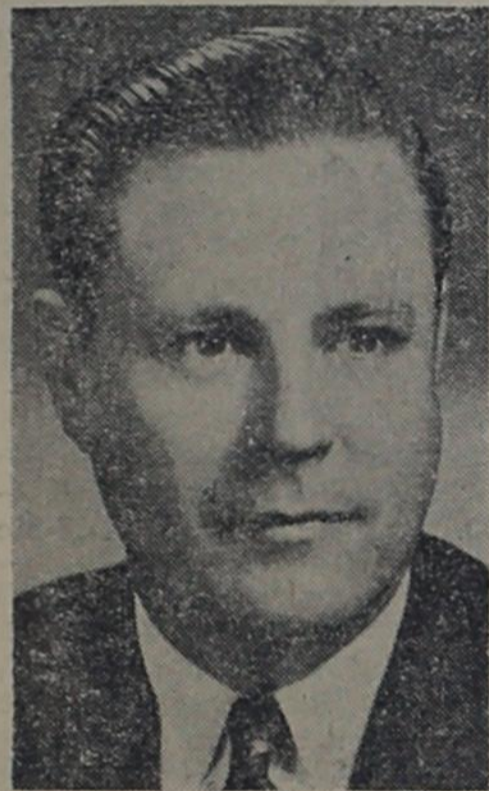
The Gorman Panthers lost a heart breaker on Saturday night in the Homecoming Game before a capacity crowd, to the Ranger Bulldogs by a score of 7-0. This was the best game by far for the Red and Blue this season.

The lone score in the game came in the third quarter when Johnny Wells caught a 45 yard touchdown pass from Quarterback Johnny McGee.

The Panthers did a fine job on offense and defense against the Bulldogs of Ranger. They moved the ball well on the ground but again they were not successful in their aerial attack. They were on the Ranger 6 inch line when the first half ended and were inside the 15 yard line on a real good drive when the final whistle blew.

He also made 23 yards on runbacks. Gary Overstreet made 41 yards on 11 trips for a 3.7 yard average. Harold Rodgers got 17 yards on 5 carries for a 3.4 average. Bobby Rodgers, running from the Quarterback spot, gained 16 yards on 8 tries for a 2 yard average.

The Panther punter, Gary Overstreet, did a real fine job in that department in the Homecoming tilt. He punted 7 times for 239 yards for a 34 yard average per kick. This is an even greater achievement considering that Gary is a first year man.

## B. M. BENNETT NAMED JUDGE REST OF TERM

B. M. Bennett of Gorman was appointed County Judge to complete the unexpired term of John S. Hart, deceased, during a special called meeting of Eastland County Commissioners last Friday morning.

Tip Arther was named Chairman of the Court to conduct the business of appointing a man to fill the office.

The motion to appoint Bennett was made by Buck Collins and seconded by Carl Lamb.

The oath of office was given by County Clerk Johnson Smith.

Bennett will act as County Judge until the end of this term, the first of January.

Charles Freyschlag, Special County Judge, was named by the practicing attorneys of the County when Judge Hart had surgery.

His appointment was to extend until November 12.

Bennett was an unsuccessful candidate for the office of District Clerk in the primary election.

He was the third runner up in a two man, one woman race. He was defeated by Roy Lane and Ann Justice, second runner up.

He has served as County Commissioner for Precinct 2 for four terms.

Immediately before his appointment, Bennett rendered his resignation as a Commissioner and appointed Glenn Justice to fill the vacancy.

Justice was winner of the Precinct 2 Democratic nomination in the primary election.

Justice was sworn in Friday afternoon.

"After nine and a half years as a county commissioner, I appreciate the honor of the office of judge. I will continue to do the best I can to take care of the business of our county," Bennett stated.

Judge Bennett began his new duties Friday signing papers and handling probate cases.

## PASTURE SHORT COURSE SLATED HERE OCT. 1-5

A pasture short course for adult farmers will be held October 1-5 under the sponsorship of the Gorman High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to Mr. W. R. Taylor, Supt., and Mr. E. C. Bramlett, teacher of vo. ag.

Mr. Tom Bowers, pasture specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Soil and Crop Science at Texas A&M College, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M.

Mr. Bowers holds a B.S. degree in Agricultural Education from Texas Tech and has completed work at A&M toward a M.S. degree in Agronomy. He has had 9 years of field experience as a county agricultural agent, where much of the emphasis was on pasture production.

"Many pasture short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Bowers and all have met with outstanding success," according to Mr. J. B. Payne, area supervisor of vo. ag., Stephenville, Texas. Arrangements for adult education short course in pasture and in other fields are made through Mr. Payne's office.

The short course at Gorman is scheduled to begin Oct. 1 at 7 p. m. in the vo. ag. building. Other meetings in the series of 5 will be held on Oct. 2-3-4-5. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Bowers will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Mr. E. C. Bramlett.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the supt. of schools, Mr. W. R. Taylor, or the teacher of vo. ag. Mr. E. C. Bramlett. An entry fee of \$2.00 will be charged. Pasture Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Bowers states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as adapted grasses and legumes, fertilization, weed control, grazing management and grazing systems. The primary purpose of the course is in helping farmers and ranchers to make the most profit from their pastures.

"Short courses in pasture, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the new cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M College," stated Bob Craig, associate professor, Dept. of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M College, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This cooperative program," states Craig, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vo. ag. to provide improved educational services to farm people."

The Gorman Ex-Students Ninth Annual Homecoming had the largest attendance in the history of the homecoming. One hundred and sixty registered, compared to 102 a year ago.

A near capacity crowd attended the business meeting; 208 ate dinner Saturday evening at the Homecoming Dinner and an estimated 2,000 persons attended the football game between the Panthers and Ranger Bulldogs.

The activities began with everyone registering at the high school auditorium, getting their identification cards as to their name and year graduated and where they

now live. They were served coffee and cookies and then invited into the auditorium to hear the Gorman Stage Band, the Dale Glasson Trio, and the action game song "Hole In The Bucket," done by the Panther Pep Squad Leaders.

At 2 p. m. the business meeting got underway. President Gene Rodgers called the meeting to order and promptly got things rolling.

Mr. John Goble, minister of the Gorman Church of Christ, gave the invocation and Graydon Baze welcomed the Ex-students.

Mrs. Dorothy Sparks, secretary, read the minutes of last year's meeting.

Then the election of officers was held. Mr. M. E. Shell was elected President; Thurman Jay, First Vice President; Dr. W. M. Brogdon, Second Vice President; Mrs. Ruby Lee Kinser, Secretary; Mrs. Frankie Jo Harper, Treasurer, and Mrs. Dorothy Hatcher, Publicity Chairman.

Mrs. Wanda Brown Glasson of Baird was elected Coming-Home Queen of 1962.

Mr. Othell Clark introduced Truman Brown of San Angelo, who gave a very interesting address on our American Heritage.

Roll call followed the address and the Class of 1936 had the largest number in Attendance with 10 and the 1939 Class was second with 7.

Mr. and Mrs. Morris Scoggins (she was formerly Charlotte Hudson) won the traditional box of Gorman Goobers for the one who traveled the farthest. They came more than 1300 miles from Calif., with Maurice McMullen running a close second.

Several families were represented; the Morris brothers, Parker, Jimmy, Huppy, Harvey and Mack were all here; all of the Todd family, the Westmorelands, and all but T. A. of the Brown family.

Mrs. Ollie Andrus had competition as the one that had attended the Gorman School the Earliest. Mrs. Andrus last attended in 1889. She was accompanied by her daughter, Nita Williamson, both of San Antonio. The oldest man attending was Mr. Sullivan, the father of Roy and Ralph Sullivan, he being 90 years of age was by far the oldest man here.

A memorial service was held in memory of Mrs. Imolene Short Park, Mrs. Clara Love Cain, Mrs. Susie Bennett-Ellison, Bishop Craddock, Floyd Eison, Finis E. Eppler, Ray McDaniel, George Duke, Sam C. Reynolds, Dr. Elmer Jones, Miss Dora Baskin (teacher), and W. T. Creager (school board member).

After the business meeting adjourned everyone gathered downtown where an old fashioned pep rally was held. The band, under the direction of Mr. Charles Brown, played several numbers and the pep squad lead in some yells and then W. C. Browning introduced Ex-Panthers and Ex-Cheerleaders.

At 6 p. m. the evening meal was served at the school cafeteria where two hundred and eight persons enjoyed some delicious barbecue from the Eubank's Catering Service of Cisco.

Immediately following the dinner the football game between the Panthers and the Ranger Bulldogs got underway and, ever though the Panther put up a good scrap, the 7-0 defeat was the only thing that kept the day from being a complete success.

The Panther Band treated the huge crowd with some fancy marching and playing just before the arrival to the center of Brogdon Field of Miss Sunny Rawson, Homecoming Queen of 1962, escorted by Max Grice, in a beautiful Chevrolet Corvair furnished by Smith Bros. Chevrolet Co.

Close behind in a well polished 1924 Chevrolet came the Coming-Home Queen of 1962, Mrs. Dale Glasson of Baird. While the band played Mr. W. R. Taylor, Supt. of the Gorman Schools, presented Miss Rawson with the traditional dozen red roses and Mr. Gene Rodgers, President of the Exes Association, presented Mrs. Glasson one dozen red roses.

Following the football game receptions were held at the Fire Hall and in the educational building of the First Baptist Church. Refreshments were served and talk of yesteryear was being done by classmates that had not seen each other for many years. Everyone expressed sheer delight and left swearing that they would never miss another homecoming.

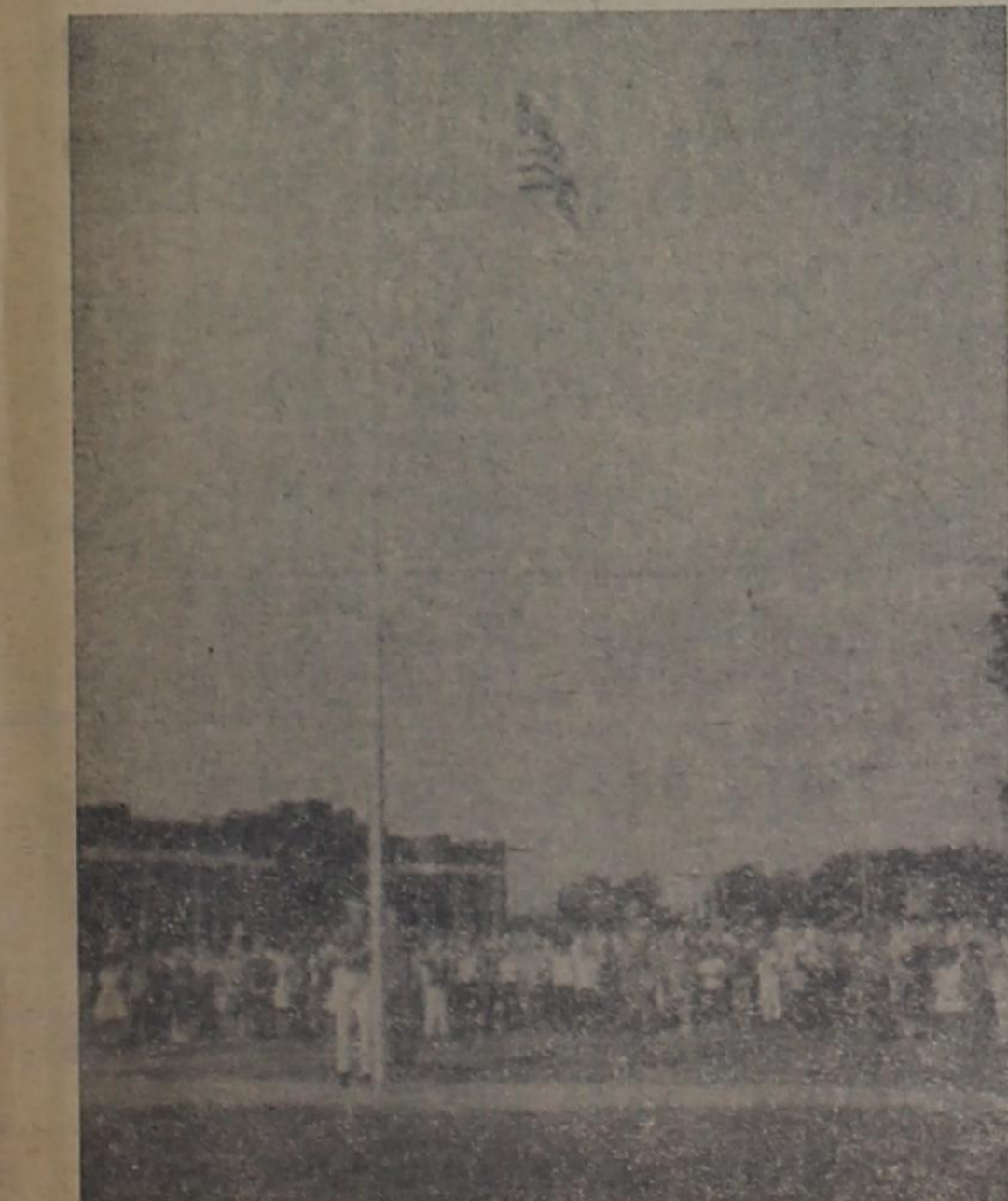

Quail Thompson served as Chief of the Gorman Volunteer Fire Department from 1950 until this year when Gabe Wright was elected Chief.

During his 12 years as Chief, the Fire Department had a regular membership of 22 members and a waiting list. The Department, under Mr. Thompson's leadership, met all of the requirements of Fire Drills, reports and equipment. The Fire Department, in cooperation with the City, was helpful in getting a 7c reduction in the fire insurance key rate.

Always ready to fight a fire, Quail leaves his store at the first sound of the fire whistle - and whoever happens to be in the store takes charge until he returns. Most of the time Mrs.

Thompson rushes from home to take his place at the store. Quail stated that our fire department's record has only been made possible by the fine cooperation of the volunteer firemen who work with him.

T. L. (Dick) Jay was elected Mayor of Gorman in 1950 and served 12 years. During this time through a joint project of the city and property owners, thirteen blocks of new paving was laid. Five blocks of sealcoat was placed on downtown streets at the city's expense.

The balance of the city's bonded indebtedness was paid off. Water and sewer mains were extended and several fire plugs installed. The water tower was

painted twice. Right of way was purchased for Hwy. Six. Several pieces of equipment were purchased, for cash, to maintain streets. A new warehouse was built at a cost of \$4,200. A new water well was drilled and equipped with pump. During this administration two new pieces of fire fighting equipment were bought and paid for. All of this was accomplished without increasing city taxes.

## WHAT ABOUT USE OF MONROE DOCTRINE IN CUBAN SITUATION?

WASHINGTON, D. C. — BY REASON OF THE CUBAN SITUATION today, the following is the May 18, 1961 edition of this column.

THERE IS A FRENCH PROVERB which says in effect that the more things change, the more they remain the same. History does repeat itself.

EVERY MAIL BRINGS LETTERS DEMANDING, imploring or suggesting that we do something about Cuba, and in many is the question, "What about the Monroe Doctrine?"

THE MONROE DOCTRINE WAS PROCLAIMED ON December 2, 1823. It was chiefly directed at Russia as we might do if we were writing it today.

IN THE EARLY 1800's Russia was looking to establish a colony in what is now the States of Oregon and Washington.

JUST PRIOR TO THIS PERIOD Napoleon had been defeated and the stronger nations of Europe were looking for places to expand their empires. They were talking of sending fleets to South America to take over new governments which had been established after gaining their independence from Spain.

THE EMERGENCE of new nations in Latin America, the Revolution in the United States and France, caused the kings and emperors of Europe, except the British who had invested in trade in South America, to feel that what was needed was to make the world safe from democracy.

THE IDEA OF THE DOCTRINE originated in the Administration of Thomas Jefferson. Jefferson was getting old. John Quincy Adams was Secretary of State and argued with Jefferson that the Doctrine should be made to apply to all of Europe and not just Russia alone. This theory was carried forward through the James Madison Administration and finally formalized by James Monroe.

THE FIRST PART OF THE DOCUMENT is aimed directly at Russia and the second part at Emperors of Europe.

THE UNITED STATES HAD LITTLE to back up its declaration that foreign governments should not be permitted to gain a foothold in the Western Hemisphere, but depended on the British Navies to enforce the Doctrine. The Monarchs of Europe were angry and made open threats to ignore the pronouncement. Nothing happened and little more was heard about the matter until around 1845. Polk was President at this time and he found occasion to restate the policy.

FOLLOWING THIS PERIOD AND during the Civil War, France set up a puppet government in Mexico under Maximilian. From 1862 to 1867 the military power

of France maintained the Emperor Maximilian on a shaky Mexican throne.

IN THIS YEAR OF 1867 the United States had an Army left over from the Civil War. After a period to recoup and recover from the weariness of the conflict and the assassination of Lincoln, the United States gave France her orders to get out of Mexico. Without very much argument and less resistance, the French pulled out but left Maximilian. The emperor managed to hold together a small force of Mexicans who protected him for a short time, but he was soon captured by Juarez and shot.

THE UNITED STATES HAS NEVER permitted a foreign country to secure itself in the Western Hemisphere. In a day when all we had to back up our demand was determination, we were successful. We should be as determined today when we have the strength to enforce this policy.

OF COURSE THIS IS NOT 1823 nor 1845 nor 1867, and armadas and armies are not invading Latin America or the Caribbean. But a different kind of invasion has taken place, and it is time we expanded the interpretation of the original Doctrine to include the insidious advances of Communism. If the Nations of Latin America will realize their eminent danger of this new invasion they will join the United States for the protection of their very existence as free and independent people.

THE MONROE DOCTRINE IS WITH US afresh. As the French say, "The more things change, the more they remain the same."

## New Guard-Lite Is Offered By TESCO

A new lighting service being offered by Texas Electric Service Company is receiving an enthusiastic reception by the company's customers to TESCO Manager Tom Hallmark.

Called Guard-Lite, the new service provides for a complete outdoor lighting fixture which will adequately light up to 30,000 square feet. The lights are available to Texas Electric customers in the Gorman area for as little as \$4 a month. This monthly charge includes normal installation on a 30-foot wood pole, electricity, and all maintenance, including replacement of lamps.

The Guard-Lite fixture contains a white mercury vapor lamp which gives the brilliance of more than four 100-watt incandescent light bulbs. An electric eye turns the lamp on at dusk and off at dawn. "There are hundreds of uses for this unit," Mr. Hallmark said. "It will light up to an acre of farm area or a 100-car parking lot. It

## Browsing with Bev

The steam iron continues to grow in popularity and has become standard equipment in most homes. For economy, the steam iron should not replace the conventional iron for starched and dampened ironing.

When buying a steam iron, to determine your personal requirements for a steam iron, check these features:

Comfort: weight, shape of handle, room for hand and location of cord.

Balance: Steady when the iron is on its heel rest.

Water opening: Convenient size and location.

Temperature settings: Easy to see and have a wide range, especially a low setting for synthetic fabrics.

Soleplates: Stainless steel is easier to keep but more expensive than aluminum.

Reservoirs: Stainless steel or brass corrode less than aluminum. Special features: "Spray sprinkle" for dampening, water level indicator, extra long cord, left or right hand design.

Service and parts: Should be available.

How to care for your iron: Read and follow manufacturer's instructions. For best results use distilled or demineralized water. Once the demineralizers have changed color, they must be replaced. Know capacity and measure correct amount of water. For safety, disconnect iron from electric outlet while filling.

Protect soleplate from scratches, avoid ironing over pins or snaps. When ironing is completed, turn steam switch to "dry" to prevent corroding of the valve and disconnect cord.

Drain iron while still hot. When cooled, store in upright position.

To clean your iron: Soleplate: Clean while iron is cool. Use mildest method that will do the job - first a damp cloth, detergent, scouring powder or soap filled steel wool. Wipe clean. Rub heated iron over waxed paper, then on dry cloth.

If the vents of the steam chamber become clogged, return the iron to the manufacturer for cleaning.
