## CUBS LOSE TO DUBLIN 14-12 IN THRILLING TILT

The Gorman Grade School Cubs lost a real close ball game on Tuesday night by a 14-12 margin when they hosted the Dublin Kittens at Brogdon Field.  
The Cubs scored first in the game on a beautiful reverse play with Robert Hunt carrying for the touchdown from 38 yards out in the first quarter. The try for points failed and the Cubs led at the end of the first stanza 6-0.  
The Kittens tied it up in the second quarter on a 32 yard play for the score. The try for points failed and the half ended with the score knotted at 6-6.  
Following the second half kickoff the Cubs moved to another touchdown in the third quarter on a fine gallop of 23 yards by Daryl Hirst to put the Cubs in front 12-6. Again they failed to get the extra points.  
In the fourth period the Kittens tied the score on a four yard plunge and then added 2 points to make the final score read 14-12.  
The Cubs got a drive going late in the fourth quarter and were moving deep in Dublin territory when the final whistle blew.  
Gorman outgained the Kittens on the ground with 213 yards to the Kittens 153. The Cubs completed 2 long passes. The Kittens did not try the airways. Gorman got 8 first downs to 7 for Dublin. The Kittens were penalized 5 yards while the Cubs received 20 yard in penalties. The Kittens recovered one Cub miscue on an on-side kickoff.  
Tommy Clark, the Cub center, received a bad cut on his leg in the game. A cleat cut his leg and it required six stitches to close the wound.  
A tentative return game with De Leon is set for Tuesday, Oct. 16 at Gorman. Then the Cubs will play Comanche on Oct. 30.

## FINAL RITES FOR MRS HOLLIFIELD HELD TUESDAY

Mrs. Allie Gray Hollifield, 93, one of Gorman's eldest and most beloved citizens, died Monday at 7:30 a. m., October 1, in the Blackwell Hospital following a stroke which she suffered on July 11.  
Mrs. Hollifield, the daughter of the late Dr. George Gray, a pioneer doctor in Eastland and Comanche counties, moved to Gorman with her late husband, William Hollifield, on January 20, 1893. He preceded her in death in 1924.  
Born in Montgomery County, Arkansas on April 7, 1869, she had lived in Rising Star for eight years before coming to Gorman, where she has lived 69 years.  
She was known as the town's historian, being blessed with a perfect memory, she could recall events, faces, names and dates perfectly, even in her reclining years.  
She was a member of the Church of Christ.  
Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday, October 2 in the Church of Christ in Rising Star with Mr. H. McDonald officiating. Interment was in the Rising Star Cemetery.  
Survivors are one son: George Hollifield of Gorman; two daughters, Mrs. Joe Barnes of Rising Star and Mrs. Henry Capers of Gorman; two half-sisters, Mrs. George Anne Bennett of Cross Plains and Mrs. Kate Murphy of El Paso; four half brothers, T. G. and Dick Gray of Gorman, Newt Gray of Fort Worth, and Buster Gray of New Mexico; three grandsons, Perry Barnes of Colorado City and Burnie and Roy Barnes of Rising Star; and four great-grandchildren.  
Pallbearers were Othell Clark, Graydon Baze, Bill Parr and H. H. Pullig of Gorman and R. M. Earp, Gene Hill and Cecil Shults of Rising Star.

**Record Attendance At First Methodist Homecoming Sun.**  
Record attendance marked the first Homecoming held in the seventy-one year history of the First Methodist Church. Two hundred and fifty-one attended the morning worship service, while two hundred and twenty remained for the noon lunch. A lesser number attended the afternoon service.  
Rev. Robert Sanders, pastor, stated "we are grateful for those who attended, but we know the real thanks must go to those members who worked long and hard preparing for the day. We are most grateful for their every effort."  
The day began with Sunday School and Mr. C. J. Thompson of Copperas Cove taught the adult and young peoples classes. He taught the adult class for many years while he lived in Gorman.  
Rev. Robert Haynes, pastor of Couts Methodist Church in Weatherford and former pastor during the years 1957-59 at which time the new church was built, preached the morning sermon.  
Rev. W. F. Smith of Waco, who was pastor during the years 1947-49, and Rev. A. W. Franklin of Fort Worth, also a former pastor during the years 1934-38, took part in the morning worship service.  
Welcome greetings were given by Mr. Ross Wilson and C. J. Thompson gave the response.  
Special music was given by Edith Bolt of TWC.  
The afternoon sermon was given by Rev. R. Henry Price, who was pastor during the years 1945-46.  
Mrs. Dona Moorman gave a report on the courtesy committee.  
The Gorman Methodist Church was organized by Rev. H. S. Anglin May 17, 1891 with 13 members. The first pastor was assigned as part of the Carbon Circuit Dec. 1, 1893. The church lot was purchased for \$35.00 in May, 1894.  
A frame church building was built in 1894. In Nov., 1905 the first appointment as a station church was made.  
The old brick building was completed in 1906. The present parsonage was built in 1915.  
On January 4, 1959 formal opening services were held for the present church facilities with Bishop W. C. Martin in charge.  
Rev. Robert Sanders, the present pastor, is the 41st. to serve the Gorman Church.

## Panthers Journey To Hico Friday; Eastland Too Strong

The Gorman Panthers lost a hard fought ball game on Friday night at Brogdon Field to a strong Eastland Maverick eleven by a score of 26-0. The Panthers fought all the way in the rough and tumble affair.  
Eastland opened the scoring early as Joe Cooper caught the opening kickoff on the Maverick 7 yard line and sped 93 yards down the sideline for 6 points. The try for points failed.  
The Panthers held the Mavericks until the second quarter when Cooper snagged a Panther punt on the fifty yard line and rambled the entire distance for the second tally of the evening. Beck scored the two pointer and the half ended 14-0 in favor of Eastland.  
Gorman retained the Mavericks in the third period and played them on even terms until the final stanza when Eastland made a sustained drive of some 60 yards to paydirt. Gary Graham capped the drive with a 2 yard plunge over tackle for the tally. The extra points try failed.  
Eastland wound up the scoring for the evening when they intercepted a stray Panther aerial on the Eastland 25 yard line and returned it to the fifty yard stripe. From there the Mavericks moved to the eight yard line and Gary Graham went the final 8 yards for the score. Again the try for points failed and the game ended with Eastland taking a 26-0 decision.

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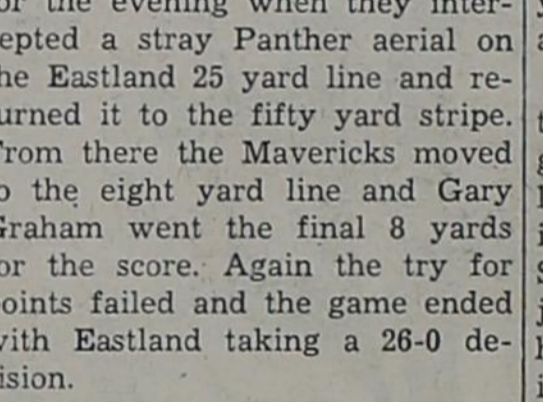

He ran back, picked up the ball, returned it up the field about 10 yards before stopping to punt. The amazing thing is, he got the punt off for a 35 yard kick, only 15 yards being accredited to his punting average.  
Page was again the offensive leader for the Panthers with 45 yards on 15 carries for a 3 yard average. He had to take over the Quarterback spot in the latter part of the game when Bobby Rodgers, regular quarterback, was injured. Gary Overstreet got 18 yards on 6 tries for a 3 yard average. Bobby Rodgers got 10 yards on 5 trips for a 2 yard average before being injured. Harold Rodgers made 8 yards on 4 carries for a 2 yard average.

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

Peanuts are so delicious! Peanuts have been on everyone's mind since the Peanut Bowl festivities, so I thought I would give you some ideas and recipes using peanuts. Peanuts are no longer considered as only "nibble bait." They can be used many ways at meal-time as well as for snacks. They add crunchy goodness to any dish and make it company fare. Peanuts are rich in the B vitamins needed for steady nerves, pep and energy. Their high quality and quantity of protein rates them tops as a meat alternate.

#### TOASTED PEANUTS

Put a small amount of oil into shallow pan, pour in the peanuts and stir them until they are well coated. There should not be any excess oil in pan, just enough to give an oily surface to each nut. Set the pan in oven and stir often until they become light brown. Drain on a platter and sprinkle with salt.

#### FRENCH FRIED PEANUTS

Heat your deep fryer to 375 degrees and put your peanuts in hot oil. In 4 minutes take peanuts out of boiling oil and drain them on paper toweling. Spread peanuts on a platter and sprinkle with salt.

### Bridge Tourney Set At B'wood Oct. 5-7

Brownwood's first sectional bridge tournament sponsored by the Heart of Texas Playing Area will be held Oct. 5-7 at Brownwood Hotel, according to Dr. D. V. Rodgers, publicity chairman. He said the American Contract Bridge League of New York City has sanctioned the tourney.

Players for the Heart of Texas Sectional Bridge Tournament are expected from an area bounded roughly by Lubbock, Midland, Sweetwater, Abilene, San Angelo, Eden, Del Rio, Uvalde, San Antonio, Kerrville, Austin, Fort Hood, Waco, Dallas, Fort Worth, Wichita Falls and Amarillo, although players from over the U. S. are eligible.

From 200-300 players are expected in each event, with 800-900 players total. The sponsoring organization is composed of duplicate bridge clubs in Brownwood, Gorman, Cisco, Coleman, Brady, Mason and Menard, which form part of the Fort Concho Unit No. 204, with headquarters in San Angelo.

Announcements to about 3,000 players will be mailed from New York and special mailing of invitations will be made directly from Brownwood to all known duplicate bridge players in nearby cities. Any duplicate bridge player may enter the various events even though he may not be reached by invitation.

Various committees are being appointed from area members to plan for the event. Mrs. John Kimble of Gorman is on the telephone committee.

First and second place trophies will be awarded in all events. First events will be at 7:30 p. m. Friday, Oct. 5, with two games running at the same time — men's pairs and women's pairs.

Sessions will be at 9:30 a. m., 2 p. m. and 8 p. m. Oct. 6 and at 2 and 8 p. m. Oct. 7.

Joe and Louise Mathews, professional directors assigned by ACBL, will direct all events.

### New System Began On School Grading

In about three more weeks report cards on student progress and achievement will be issued. Students and parents will observe a system of marks different somewhat to that used in recent years, but a system that is used widely and generally well-understood.

An explanation of the system follows:

#### Grades One and Two

Letter grades E, S and U will be used to indicate Excellent, Satisfactory, or Unsatisfactory progress. When these marks do not convey adequately the desired information to the parents, a letter or an invitation for a conference will be used.

#### All Other Grades

Letter grades A, B, C, D (or U), and F will be used, with plus and minus symbols added for further refinement. These marks will have the following interpretations:

F: below 60 - Failing  
D-: 60 thru 63 - Unsatisfactory.  
D (or U): 64 thru 67 - Failing if continued.  
D+: 68 and 69 - Failing if continued.  
C-: 70 thru 73; C: 74 thru 77; and C+: 78 and 79 - Barely passing to low average.  
B-: 80 thru 83; B: 84 thru 87; and B+: 88 and 89 - Average to above average.  
A-: 90 thru 93; A: 94 thru 97; and A+: 98 thru 100 - Good to Excellent.

#### Basis For Grading

Six-Weeks Grades: Daily work, including pop quizzes, written assignments, notebook work, etc., will constitute two-thirds of the six-weeks grade. Unit and six-weeks tests will constitute one-third of the six-weeks grade.

This grade may be adjusted downward or upward a maximum of five points for attitude, conduct, attendance, etc.

As a rule a teacher should show at least one grade per week on which to base a daily average.

#### Semester Grades:

The three six-weeks grades will constitute two-thirds of the semester grade, and the semester examination will constitute one-third of the semester grade.

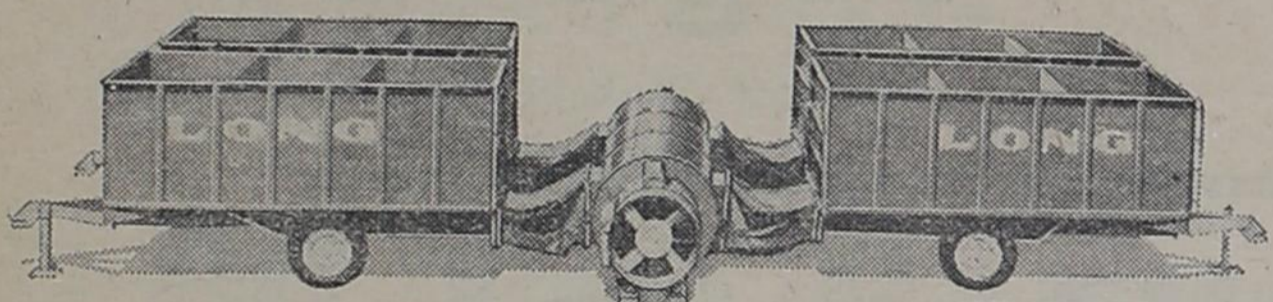

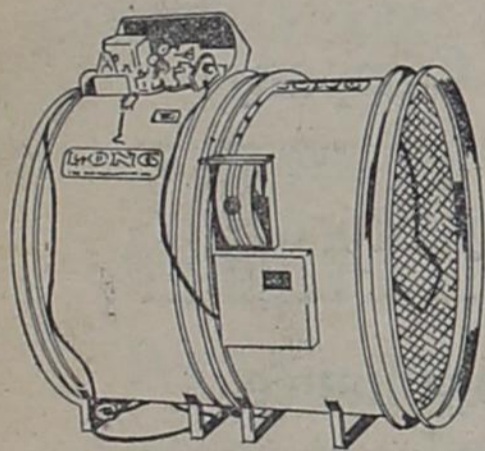

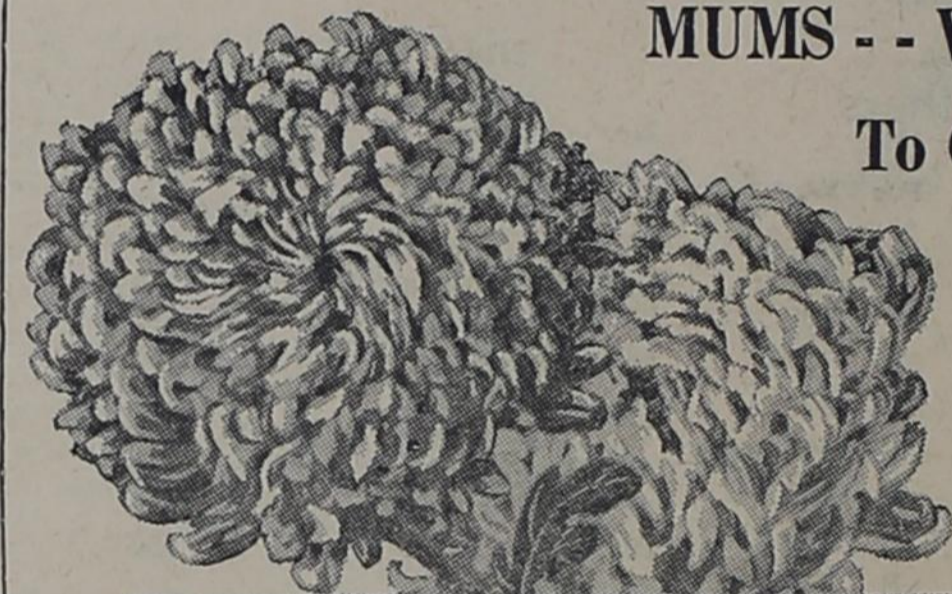
