## Driver Training Course To Begin Here On May 29th.

Thirty students from Desdemona, De Leon and Gorman have signed up for the course in Driver Training to be offered this summer.

The starting date has been set for Friday, May 29, at 7:30 a. m. at the Gorman High School.

Instructor for the course will be Mr. Bill Little, High School Principal of Gorman High.

The classroom portion will cover 30 hours of instructions and is scheduled to extend over three weeks period, five days per week, beginning at 7:30 each morning.

In addition to the three hours of classroom instruction, each student will be required to do six hours of "in car observation" and six hours of "behind the wheel training." This experience will be scheduled individually.

The entire course is expected to extend over about six weeks.

An automobile for training will be provided through the courtesy of Smith Bros' Chevrolet Company of Gorman.

One-half of a High School credit will be given for satisfactory completion of the course.

Students completing the course satisfactorily and passing the required tests will be granted a limited operators license.

Students must be at least 14 years of age before the tests can be given.

Also, parents of teenage boys who have completed the Driver Training course will be able to purchase liability insurance at a lesser rate than one who has not had the course.

## Gorman Voters Approve Proctor Water Proposal

Citizens of Gorman voted on Saturday for approval of the Proctor Water Proposal by a margin of 229 to 141 in favor of the project.

The proposal gives the Board of Commissioners of the City of Gorman the authority to enter negotiations for a contract with the Upper Leon Municipal Water District for the purpose of furnishing a water supply to Gorman.

If the negotiations are successful, the City will be assured of an adequate water supply for the next 70 years.

Engineers estimate it will take approximately 18 months to build a reservoir, filtering plant and lay the pipeline for the water supply to the neighboring towns of Dublin, De Leon and Comanche, and Gorman, who have all approved the water project.

well service company to advise and aid in restoring the new water well in the West part of town to full service. Considerable difficulty has been experienced with this well the last few days. It is believed that the water level has receded and that perhaps there has been some caving in of soil in and near the well. The matter of allowing water customers an additional 1,000 gallons of water at no extra charge for the months of June, July and August was considered. It was concluded however, that a final decision on this matter would be deferred until the status of the new well is known so that we will be in a more sure condition regarding the supply of water.

The commission also voted unanimously to do an amount of street paving later in the summer, which will total an approximate cost of \$2,500.00. Streets on which work will be begun are Crescent and Lexington. Crescent Street connects the Farm-to-Market road extending South to Duster and Highway 6. A part of Crescent had previously been paved on an experimental basis, but the job proved unsuccessful. Lexington Street begins at the Northeast corner of the school ground and runs in an easterly direction toward Highway 6. In other action, the commission voted to offer for sale, through sealed bids, two old city trucks.

The commission also wishes to point out two things which are objectionable to many citizens. First, it is strongly urged that area residents refrain from disposing of dead animals in the city dump pits. Objectionable odors from this source have been noted from residents living near the dump area. The second item is that of bicycle riding on the sidewalks in the business section of town. This endangers persons who step out of doorways of business places into the path of rapidly moving bicycles. No ordinance has been passed in regard to either of these items, as it is hoped that bringing these to the attention of the people will suffice in bringing about a satisfactory solution.

**A Hymn Is Born**

**My Country 'Tis Of Thee**  
A busy youth writes a song in half an hour

Samuel Francis Smith was always busy . . . always on the go. Just like Lowell Mason who was forever buzzing about Boston composing music, publishing song books and directing choirs. It was early in 1832 that Boston's civic-minded William C. Woodbridge gave Lowell Mason some songs he had brought back from Germany. Woodbridge had come across the songs while studying European school systems and thought Mason might want to translate some of them for his choirs. The music showed promise but, to Mason, the words might as well have been written in Egyptian symbols. Then Mason thought of young Samuel Smith, the ministerial student and Harvard graduate who knew 15 languages. Samuel Smith lived in the shadow of the church where they hung the lantern that night Paul Revere rode the horse. So he naturally absorbed his share of patriotism. It was, according to Smith's account, a half hour before sundown Feb. 2, 1832, that he got around to translating one of the German songs for Lowell Mason. It was under the patriotic title (in German) "God Bless Our Native Land." England had also been using the tune to "God Save The King" for a hundred years. But why translate the German words? He took a piece of scrap paper "six inches long and half as wide" and, by the time the sun was down, he had written some verses of his own. The following July 4th Mason's children's choir sang "My Country 'Tis Of Thee" for the first time. On Nov. 16, 1895, a famous Baptist minister hurried to catch a train. He was on his way to fill a preaching engagement. Besides writing books, teaching languages at Newton Center, and holding important posts in his denomination, he was the author of 150 church hymns. The conductor of the train was about to sing out his traditional "board," but lowered his arm. Something had happened on the platform of one of the coaches. Perhaps the old gentleman had taken the steps too spryly for his 87 years. At any rate, Samuel Francis Smith died as he had lived . . . on the go. Of all his work, Dr. Smith is best remembered for his missionary hymn "The Morning Light Is Breaking" and for these verses he wrote on a scrap of paper in half an hour when he was 26 years old.


Let music swell the breeze,  
And ring from all the trees,  
Sweet freedom's song;  
Let mortal tongues awake,  
Let all that breathe partake,  
Let rocks their silence break,  
The sound prolong.

Our father's God to Thee,  
Author of liberty,  
To thee we sing;  
Long may our land be bright,  
With freedom's holy light,  
Protect us by Thy might,  
Great God, our King!

My country, 'tis of thee,  
Sweet land of liberty,  
Of thee I sing;  
Land where my fathers died,  
Land of the Pilgrim's pride,  
From every mountain side,  
Let Freedom ring.

My native country, thee,  
Land of the noble free,  
Thy name I love;  
I love thy rocks and rills,  
Thy woods and templed hills,  
My heart with rapture thrills,  
Like that above.

## Browsing with Bev

Research studies show that the average homemaker uses a knife about 332 times a day.

Unless she is unusual, she is likely to use the same three-inch paring knife to hack up a steak, slice jaggedly through a grapefruit or peel a peach.

Choose a knife designed to do a particular job. It will cut down on work and improves the food product.

A homemaker doesn't need every type of knife that cutlery manufacturers put on the market. A basic selection of kitchen knives that will expedite the various jobs may vary from family to family.

Here are descriptions of eight basic knife types, along with information about some of the jobs they are designed to do.

French chef's knife with an 8 inch blade -- for dicing, chopping and mincing raw vegetables, fruits and nuts; carving hot roasts.

Carving knife, 7 to 9 inches -- for heavier work, such as carving beef, veal, pork roasts and other hot meats.

Boning knife, 5 to 6 inch blade -- for cutting around bones of hams, roasts, leg of lamb and other cuts.

Utility knife or trimmer, 5 to 7 inch blade -- for slightly heavier jobs -- slicing carrots, potatoes, onions, oranges, green peppers.

Narrow slicer, 8 inch blade -- for slicing steak, poultry, cold processed meats, sausage and some cheese.

Ham slicer, 9 1/2 or 10 inch flexible blade -- for getting wafer-thin slices of ham, boneless roast, turkey breasts, cold meats and the likes.

Butcher knife, 7 inch blade -- for dismembering poultry, other heavy-duty jobs.

New LVNA members are Juline Casey and Irma Fox. The next meeting will be in Gorman on the 8th. of June.

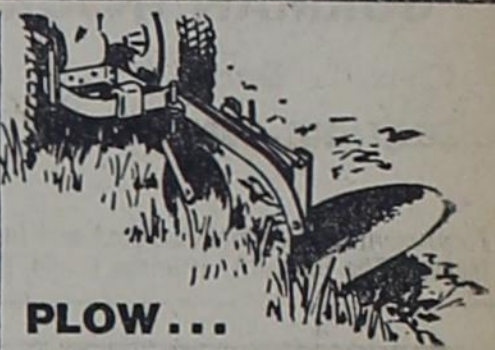
