

It was under the patriotic title (in German) "God Bless Our Native" but lowered his arm. Something had happened on the platform of one of the coaches. Perhaps the old gentleman had taken the steps too spryly for his 87 years. At any rate, Samuel Francis Smith died as he had lived . . . on the go.

Of all his work, Dr. Smith is best remembered for his missionary hymn "The Morning Light Is Breaking" and for these verses he wrote on a scrap of paper in half an hour when he was 26 years old.
