BALLOTING ON SCHOOL TRUSTEE ELECTION SET SATURDAY APRIL 4

Four names have been placed on the ballot for two places to be filled on the Gorman Independent School District Board of Trustees election which is slated for Saturday, April 4th.

Candidates listed on the ballot are Dr. W. M. Brogdon, Gaylon (Gabe) Wright, J. O. Jackson, Jr. and L. D. Belyeu. Dr. Brogdon

and Gabe Wright are seeking reelection.

The election will be held in the High School building on Saturday, April 4 with polls opening at 8 a. m. and closing at 7 p. m.

W. G. Baker will preside as election judge and clerks will be Mrs. Estelle Craddock, Mrs. Viola Eaker and Mrs. Rooney Williams. Mrs. Dorothy Hatcher is the alternate clerk.

To be eligible to vote in the April 4 Gorman School Trustee Election, a voter must reside in the Gorman Independent School District and be a qualified voter.

Persons receiving Free Poll Tax exemption certificates are not eligible to vote in local elections. The Free Poll Tax exemption certificate qualifies a person to vote only for members of Congress, President and Vice-President.

Mrs. Alvin Laseter received a call Tuesday from her sister, Mrs. Ralph Hudson, who is stationed at Elmendorf AFB, near Anchorage.

All the families were well and none were injured, which is something of a miracle with so much damage and destruction to homes, buildings, etc.

Dr. R. G. Garrett, Executive Director of the Texas Animal Health Commission, announces the reaccreditation of Eastland County as a Modified Accredited Tuberculosis Area.

Your County Agent, Mr. J. M. Cooper, has received the certificate which is good for six years.

"This Commission wishes to express its appreciation to the people of Eastland County for the splendid cooperation extended to its representatives while work was being conducted in Eastland County; and requests the further cooperation of the citizens of the area to maintain the tuberculosis status of the county," Dr. Garrett concluded.

Sen. Yarborough To Address Group At Proctor Dam

Comanche Chief March 27, 1964 —

Formal dedication of Comanche County's new \$15,000,000 Proctor Reservoir will be held Saturday afternoon, April 11, beginning at 1:30 o'clock. United States Senator Ralph Yarborough will be the principal speaker for the dedication ceremonies.

Many other distinguished civic and governmental officials are expected to attend. 17th. District Congressman Omar Burleson, who was chiefly responsible for steering the project through Congress, will be on hand. Comanche County's 64th. District State Representative Ben Barnes will be the master of ceremonies.

Festivities will begin at 1:30 and will continue throughout the afternoon, concluding with a barbecue at 5 o'clock.

Formal dedication ceremonies will conclude at 3 o'clock; then from 3 until 5 o'clock there will be a water show. The Dallas Skiing Club, one of the foremost ski clubs in the Southwest, will put on a skiing exhibition.

Music for the affair will be provided by the Comanche High School Indian Band.

Barbecue Tickets Available

Herbert Goodson, who heads the steering committee from Comanche for the dedication, urges folks to buy their tickets for the barbecue soon. Tickets for the barbecue are on sale at \$1.50 and may be purchased from the Comanche Chamber of Commerce or at The Comanche Chief.

The Comanche Chamber of Commerce and other local civic organizations, as well as Chambers of Commerce in other nearby towns, especially Dublin, sponsored numerous trips by representatives to Washington to present briefs and support for the project and to urge appropriation of necessary funds.

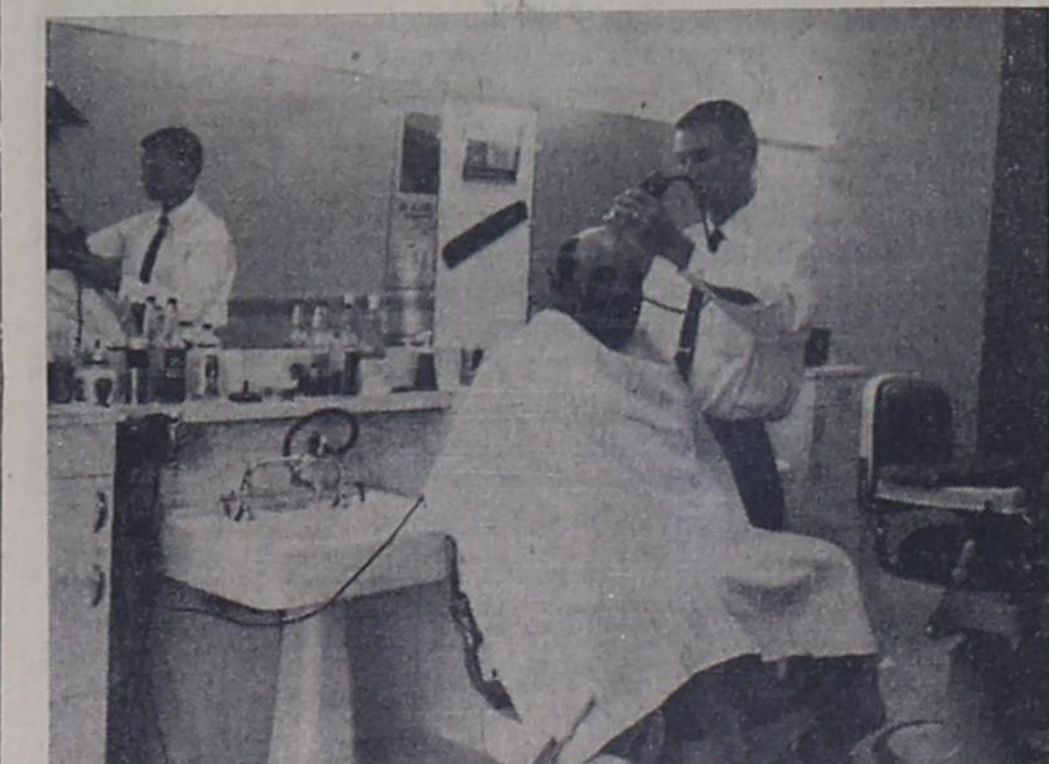
Lunch was served at noon, followed with a brief visiting session with old friends.

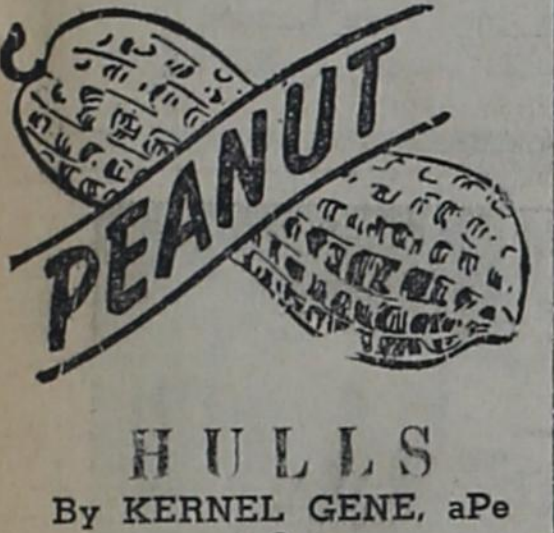

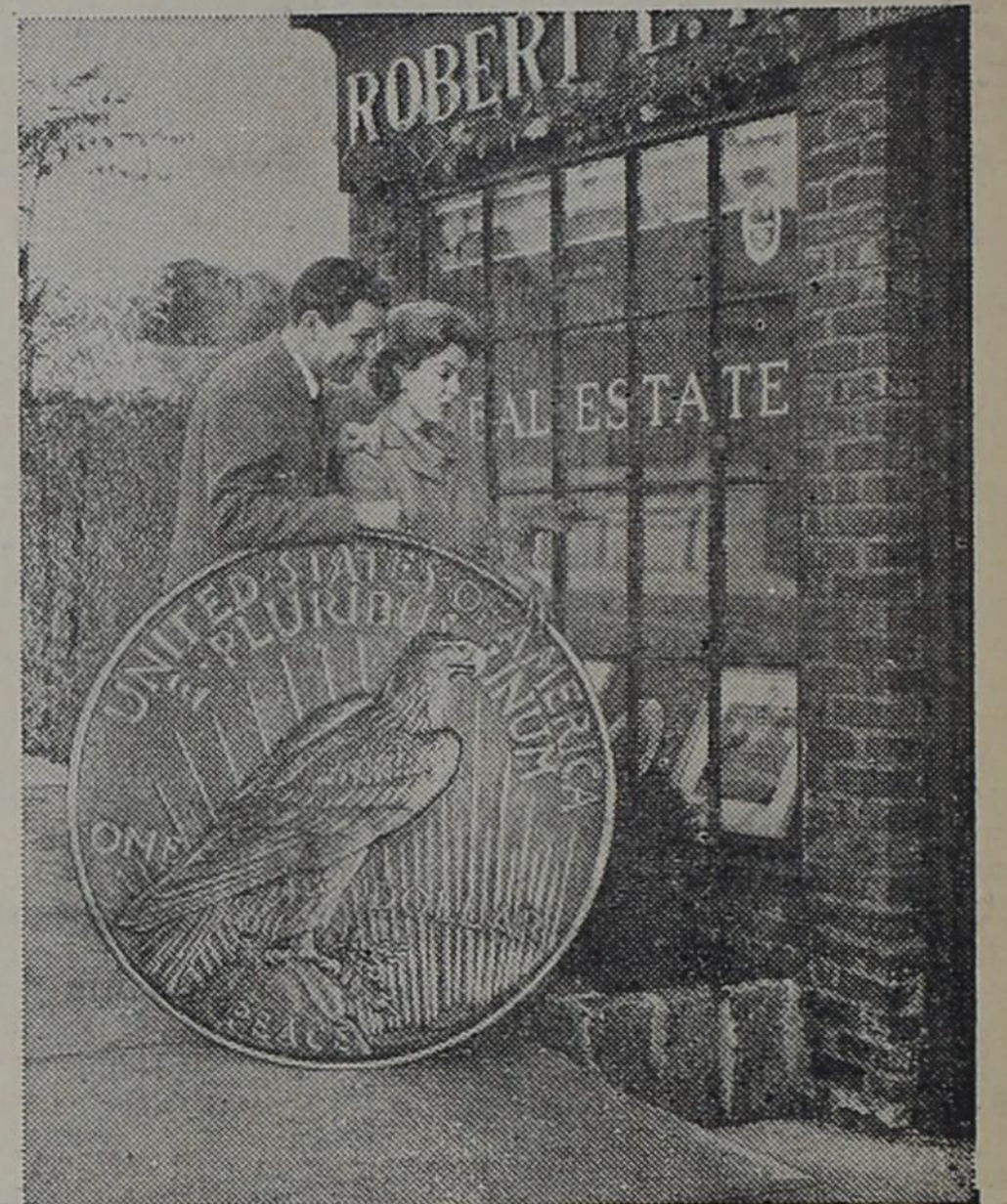

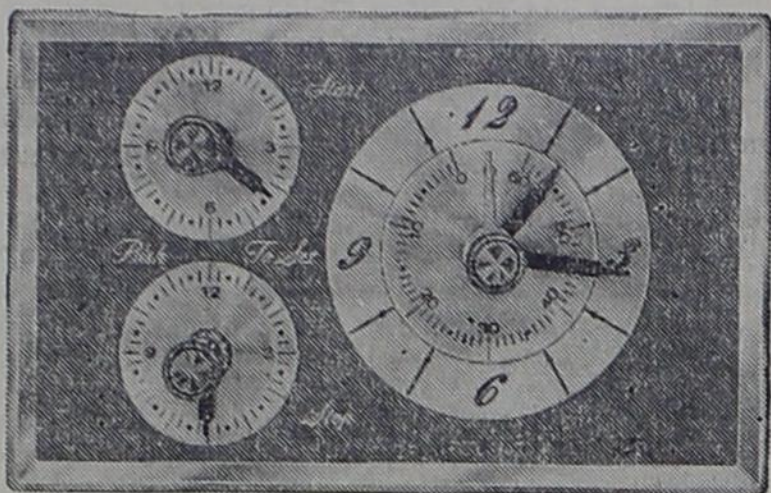
