

Late surge lifts Tulia over MHS

Muleshoe has been pounding the hardwood in practice this week, trying to regain the run-and-gun mentality that proved so successful earlier this season.

"We're just better going all out," Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason said. "With more experience, you can play a lot of different tempos. But right now, I think it's better for this group to just pin their ears back and go."

Tuesday's 67-50 loss to Tulia was a perfect example.

The Mules frustrated and rattled the state's second-ranked Class 3A team in the second quarter with full-court pressure.

Muleshoe outscored the Hornets 19-3 over the last six minutes of the second quarter, taking a 33-27 lead and the momentum into halftime.

But Tulia turned the District 1-3A contest into a halfcourt game in the second half.

By midway through the third quarter, which ended with Tulia up 45-41, Muleshoe was out of its press and standing around on offense.

A 15-3 run to start the fourth quarter kept the Hornets (20-2)

out of danger of an upset and unbeaten in district at 5-0.

"In the second half, we never got the tempo where it needed to be," Mason said. "I think the tempo really hurt (Tulia) in the first half. They were making bad passes and didn't take very good care of the ball."

Muleshoe (14-9, 3-2) is in third place in the district, two games back of Tulia and Dimmitt. The loss is Muleshoe's second to a top five in its last three games.

Muleshoe hung close for three-quarters in a 77-58 loss to No. 5 Dimmitt 11 days ago.

are three-quarters of the way to where we need to be," Mason said. "I just hope the experience we've gained will pay off later in the season."

"We played well. We just didn't play well enough," Mason added.

Mason had hoped his team could adjust to different tempos and

styles, but has reconsidered.

"I think it's a combination of things," Mason said. "But we seemed to have lost our foothold in what we were doing," said Mason, who shouldered plenty of the blame. "Maybe by changing some I've sent the kids the wrong

City trims police chief list to three

Muleshoe City Manager James Fisher enlisted the help of local teen-agers in the search for a new police chief.

Fisher spoke last week with students in the Muleshoe High School Teen Leadership class about their qualifications police chief.

One of the main reasons Fisher sought the students' advice was because of the impact police can have on teens.

"With teens out on Friday and Saturday nights, they unfortunately are the group that interacts with the police most often" Fisher said. "I wanted to get their (teens) input prospective."

City officials have narrowed the original list of 12 police chief candidates down the following three finalists:

- Sgt. Rick Henegar of the Kermit police department;
- Sgt. Leonard Cox of the Levelland Police Department; and
- Lt. Stephan Starr of the Schertz Police Department.

"I want the police chief to set the tone for the police department," Fisher said when he started the search in December. "We want a chief that is going to have a positive image, someone people in the community will feel they can go to and trust."

Former Police Chief Julian Dominguez resigned in November of 1995 amid allegations of domestic violence. No charges were filed against Dominguez.

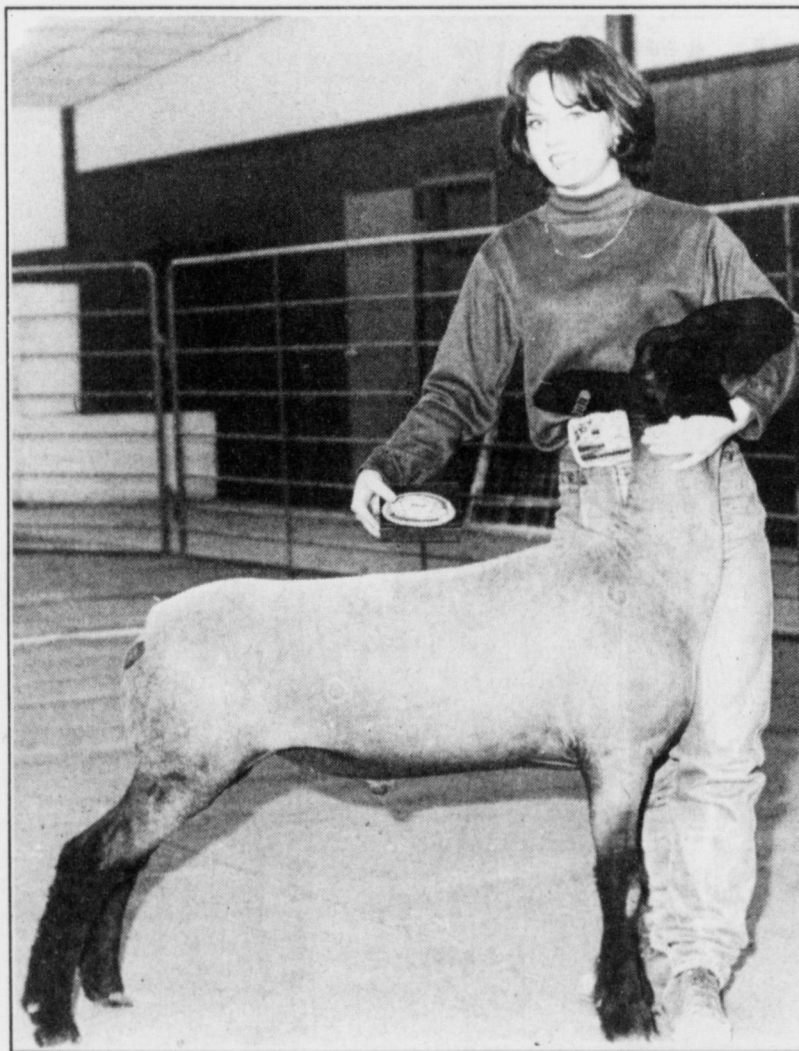

It was the second-straight year the son of Kim and Sheila Black had won the lamb show's top prize. In 1996, Landon swept the show's top two holes.

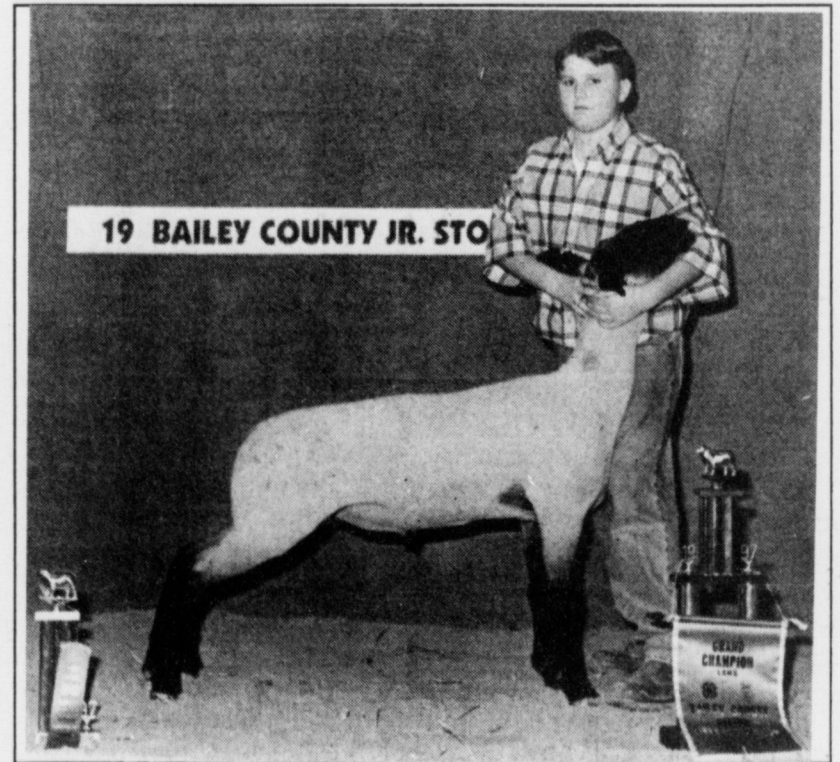

The resignation of former City Manager Dave Marr in June pushed back the hiring process when city council decided to let Fisher conduct his own search.

Fisher will be part of an eight-member hiring committee that will include City Councilmen Juan Chavez and Cliff Black, Bailey County Sheriff Jerry Hicks, a staff member of the City of Muleshoe and three community members.

"I would like (the new police chief) to be experienced, be fair with everybody, and treat everybody the same," Chavez said.

Fisher said finalists would be interviewed Jan. 23-24 and would give his recommendation to City Council within a

week.

Fisher said he would like to have a police chief on board prior to March 1.

Fisher plans on using questions submitted by the students in his interviews with police chief finalist.

"The questions they submitted were so good I replaced some of my standard questions with them," Fisher said.

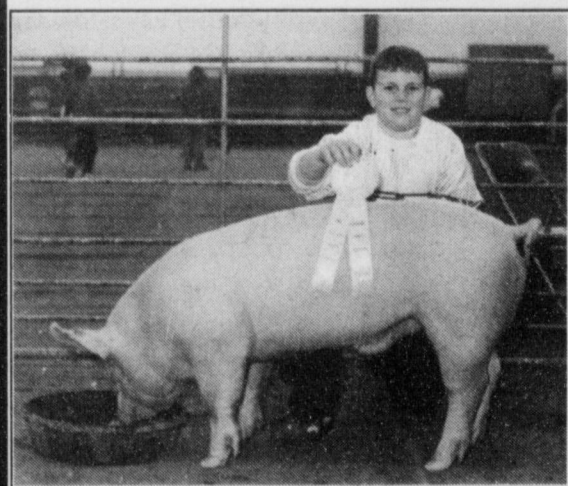
Many students expressed a desire for more interaction between teenagers and police officers.

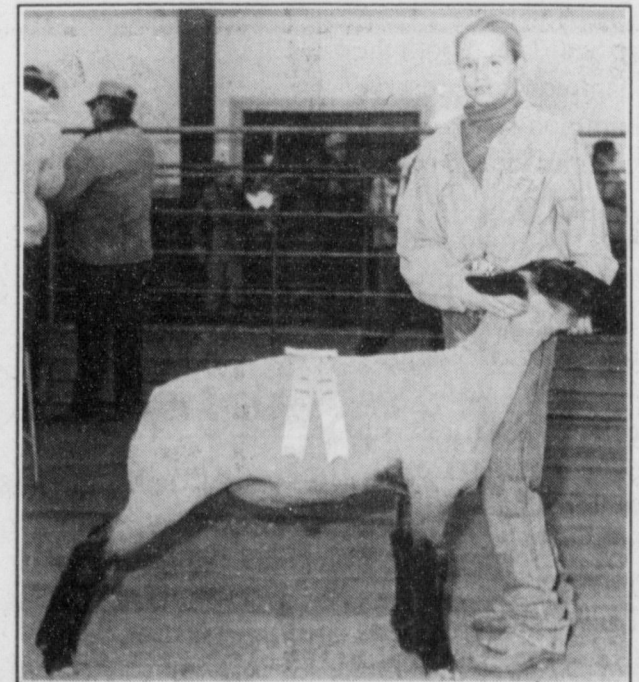

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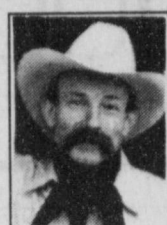
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Dr. Fosse & the Rhinestone Cowboys

complimented the tree with flat paper ornaments.

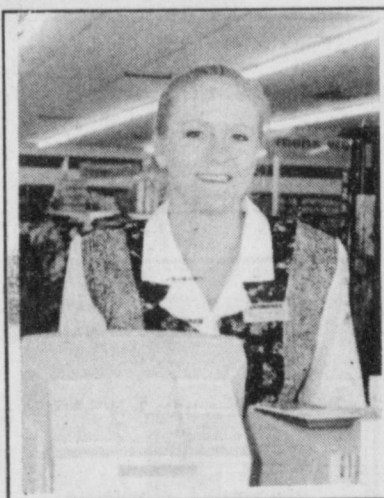
The two girls' willingness to pitch in for the family can probably be viewed as a tribute to their mother's strong work ethic.

It was a painful and costly loss.

After trading baskets with Tulia for most of the second half, Muleshoe had a chance to win the game or at worst send it into overtime.

But Mandi Culwell stunned the Lady Mules by converting a three-point play with 10 seconds left following a Muleshoe turnover, lifting Tulia to a 56-53 District 1-3A win Tuesday at WJHS gym.

"We did a good job of hustling and playing defense," Muleshoe coach Jim Gruhkey said of the game's biggest play. "We just didn't block out and she did a good job of hustling it down."

Muleshoe (7-17, 3-4 in district) has lost four of its last five district games after a 2-0 start and needs help to get back into the playoff race.

The Lady Mules are in a three-way tie for fourth at the district's halfway point, four games behind league-leading

'Horns escape Vega with 37-31 victory

VEGA — Lazbuddie's road to the playoffs runs right through Farwell.

The winner of the home-and-home series that starts Friday at Lazbuddie between the Parmer County and District 3-1A rivals would gain a huge edge for a playoff spot in the five-team district that includes top-ranked Nazareth.

Nazareth handed Farwell (17-4, 1-1) its first loss (66-49) in the five-team district Tuesday.

Lazbuddie (15-4, 2-0) nearly took a wrong turn Tuesday en route to the showdown when the Longhorns were pushed to the limit before subduing Vega 37-31 in a 3-1A game.

"Obviously, we were thinking about Friday and weren't mentally prepared to play," said Lazbuddie coach Gary Grahn, who shouldered much of the blame for his team looking ahead. "But we got the win and now we can focus on Farwell."

Israel Lopez scored a game-high 12 points for Lazbuddie, which trailed 27-25 heading into the fourth quarter. Chris Smith added 9 points for the 'Horns.

Grahn credited Vega (8-14, 0-3) for much of the Longhorns' offensive woes.

Despite enjoying a big size advantage, Lazbuddie wasn't able to get the ball inside as Vega hounded Longhorns ball handlers with tight man-to-man defense.

"They put so much pressure on our guards we never got into our offense," Grahn said. "They did as good a job as anybody has against us this year."

For Christians, Forgiving Is Never Optional

The Apostle Peter once came to Jesus with a question: "Lord, how often do I have to forgive?" (Luke 18:21).
 "Lord," he seems to be saying, "I'm a reasonable man. I want to do the right thing. If my brother keeps sinning against me, how many times do I let it go by? Maybe, say, seven times?"
 It seemed reasonable. It seemed

tells a story. You may remember the tale. It's the story of the unforgiving servant.

It seems that a very wealthy king once showed great mercy by forgiving the debt of a servant who owed him a huge sum amounting to millions of dollars. As this freshly forgiven servant was leaving the king, he met a creditor of his own who owed him twenty dollars or so. He lunged at the man, tore at his throat, and screamed at him to pay his debt immediately. The poor fellow could not pay, so the servant had him thrown into jail.

Remember the king's reaction to this injustice? He is absolutely furious. He immediately reinstates the wicked man's debt and sends him to prison until he can pay the entire amount.

Jesus makes the point clearly: "That is how my Father in heaven will treat every one of you unless you forgive your brother from your heart" (Luke 18:35).

Our Lord's words are as true today as they were when he first spoke them. Forgiveness is not an optional item in Christianity. To say, "Dear Lord, I need your help to even want to try to forgive" may be absolutely honest and realistic. To say, "Lord, I'll forgive when that person acknowledges wrong, asks for it, deserves it," is just another way of saying, "Lord, I refuse to forgive."
 If we would receive forgiveness, we must be forgiving people.

fair to Peter. To be honest, it seems fair to most of us. But you know how Jesus answered: "No, not seven times, but seventy times seven." There is no limit to forgiveness, Christ is saying. You must forgive your brother times without number!

"But, Lord," we're tempted to protest, "aren't you carrying this forgiveness thing too far? You don't know what that person has done to me!" (Or notice what a nice, warm, fuzzy concept forgiveness is—until you actually have something to forgive?)

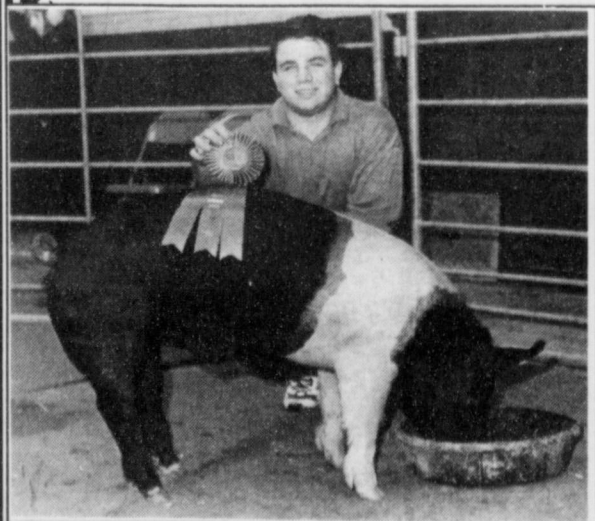
But still Jesus speaks clearly: "Forgive." He never says that it's easy or simple. He just says that it is absolutely necessary.

To help us understand, Jesus does what he does so well. He
