Oil Pipe Line Break Near Here Flows Oil Twenty Miles

A four foot break in the twelve inch oil line at the City sewage plant one mile south of Gorman last Thursday morning caused quiet some concern to the Magnolia Pipe Line Co., and to farmers and cattle owners in the area.

Mr. H. A. Dawson of the Dallas pipe line office reported to the Progress office Tuesday morning by telephone that after three days of around-the-clock operations by pipe line crewmen that everything was under control.

The repair to the line was completed Thursday and Mr. Homer Cranfill of Sweetwater was in charge of operations.

Mr. Dawson stated the chief concern of the company was to stop the oil flow before it reached the Proctor Dam Reservoir and that the quick action of Mr. Elmer Maupin in reporting the break lessened the amount of damage.

The oil was finally stopped when a dam was built across the Sabanna River at the bridge between De Leon and Comanche after traveling a distance of 20 miles.

The oil was pumped into trucks and transported to pump stations. Two thirds of the oil loss was retained, and the remaining oil was burned.

Mr. Cranfill expressed his appreciation to the fine people of the Gorman area for the wonderful response and aid given him in the repair project.

Mr. Dawson reported by Monday afternoon very few oil spots could be found on the rivers.

The line break was near the sewage drainage ditch which drains into the Sabanna River, and the 2 inch rain that fell Wednesday and Thursday caused the oil to spread more extensively and faster.

The Eastland County Game and Fish Warden was on the scene Monday and reported there were no evidence of dead fish on the streams, and the rainfall of over an inch that fell Monday night should clear all the streams of oil spots.

Horn Won't Run For Re-election

Sheriff Lee Horn told reporters Thursday that he would not be a candidate for re-election for the Eastland County sheriff's office. He was elected in 1960 and will complete a four year term at the end of this year.

A former Cisco police chief, Sheriff Horn is a long-time resident of the county. He did not announce any plans for the future.

Shortcourse For Peanuts Set Feb. 17-20 In Rising Star

The Peanut Short Course to be held in the Agricultural Building at Rising Star for growers in Eastland, Brown and Callahan Counties on February 17, 18 and 20, is only one of a series to be held over the state according to Eastland County Agent J. M. Cooper.

The meetings to begin at 7:30 o'clock on the above dates will be a presentation of various phases of production, harvesting and marketing of peanuts, it was said. A different team of specialists and research personnel will be on the program at each of the three night meetings.

Rising Star, in the Southwestern part of Eastland County, is adjacent to the growers in both Brown and Callahan Counties. Topics such as diseases, fungi, insects, weed control, fertilizers, varieties, irrigation, equipment and sources, farm management and marketing will be discussed in detail.

Those on the program from the A&M University include Wendell Horne, W. H. Newton, Ben Spears, H. P. O'Neal and Dr. T. D. Aaron. Also B. G. Freeman, Area Farm Management Specialist of the Extension Service from Stephenville, as well as B. C. Langley, Agronomist and Superintendent of the Agricultural Research Station, Stephenville.

H. L. Geye, Rising Star, Vocational Agricultural Teacher, as well as John Galloway, Brown County Agent, Pat Garner, Callahan County Agent, and the Agronomy Sub-Committee of the Program Building groups from each of the three different counties are cooperating in the undertaking.

The Vocational Agricultural Building is directly across the street from the high school in the north part of Rising Star, Cooper said.

It will be the first time that a peanut course such as planned has ever been offered to the growers and it is hoped that they will take advantage of the opportunity.

Sufficient time will be allowed at each session for questions and answers.

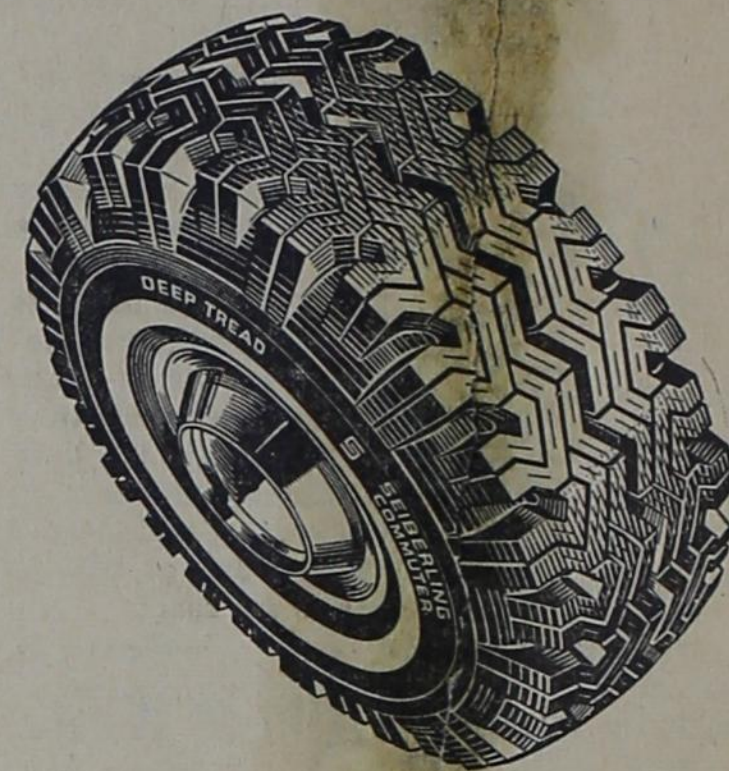

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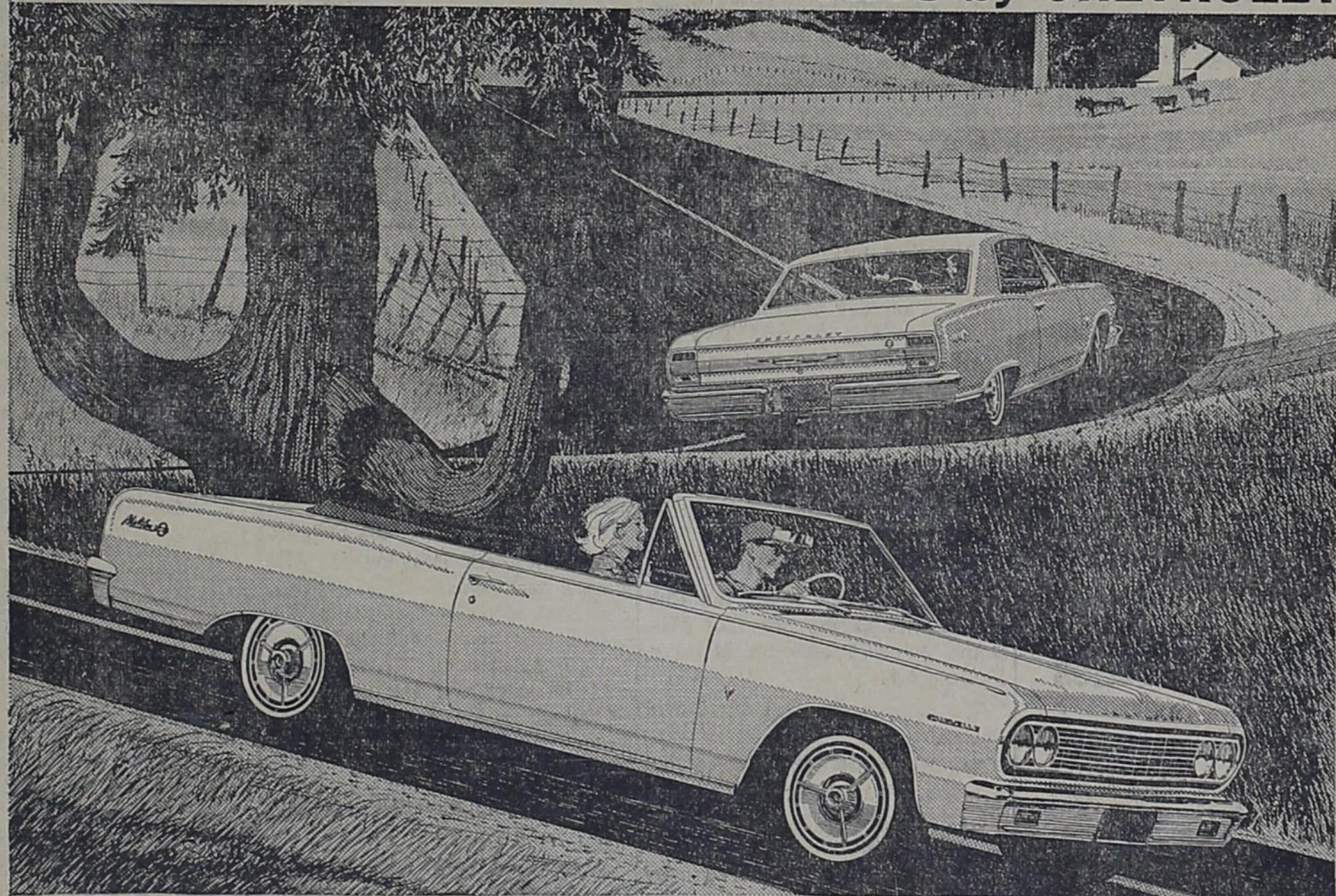

It's Time For... EYE CARE

We usually find that a person who is negligent about the health of the eyes is also careless as far as injuries to vision are concerned. This person may neglect the most fundamental safety measures during work or play to guard against such injuries.


According to the National Safety Council, eye accidents are estimated at a rate of two per minute — every thirty seconds — during the working day. This may be said to cost industry in the United States about \$20 million every year. Most such accidents occur in the metal field, but they can happen in all types of industry and are usually caused by either flying particles, noxious fumes, or harmful light.

Experts say that 98 per cent of all these eye injuries could be avoided by observing elementary safety rules, including wearing safety goggles at all times. Carelessness, indifference, and thoughtlessness are the chief enemies of eye safety.

Serious eye accidents can happen at play, too... especially to children. Parents are urged to keep a constant watch over children at play with special emphasis on their toys. Sharp-cornered playthings should be avoided as well as toys that project pieces of metal or wood. Complete vision of an eye could be lost forever if the eye were penetrated by such articles.

Freak accidents are well known to all of us, but there are some close calls with happy endings. The National Eye Research Foundation reports a case where a child was hit in the eye with a dart. He happened to be wearing contact lenses and the dart pierced the tiny plastic lens, but did not touch the eye.

each individual producer on farms growing one of the three feed grains covered by the program will make his own decision about whether to take part. The program is available for corn, grain sorghum, and barley.

To take part in the feed grain program, the farmer will agree to take out of production and devote to an approved conservation use at least 20 percent of the total feed grain base (for all of the grains grown on the farm). The farmer may divert the acreage of one or more of the feed grains, but his payment will be figured according to the rate applicable to the crop dividend.

Farmers who participate in the program will be eligible for diversion and price support payments, and for price support loans on their 1964 production of the three grains. The price support payments will be made to participants whether the feed grain produced in 1964 is fed on the farm, sold, or placed under a price support loan.

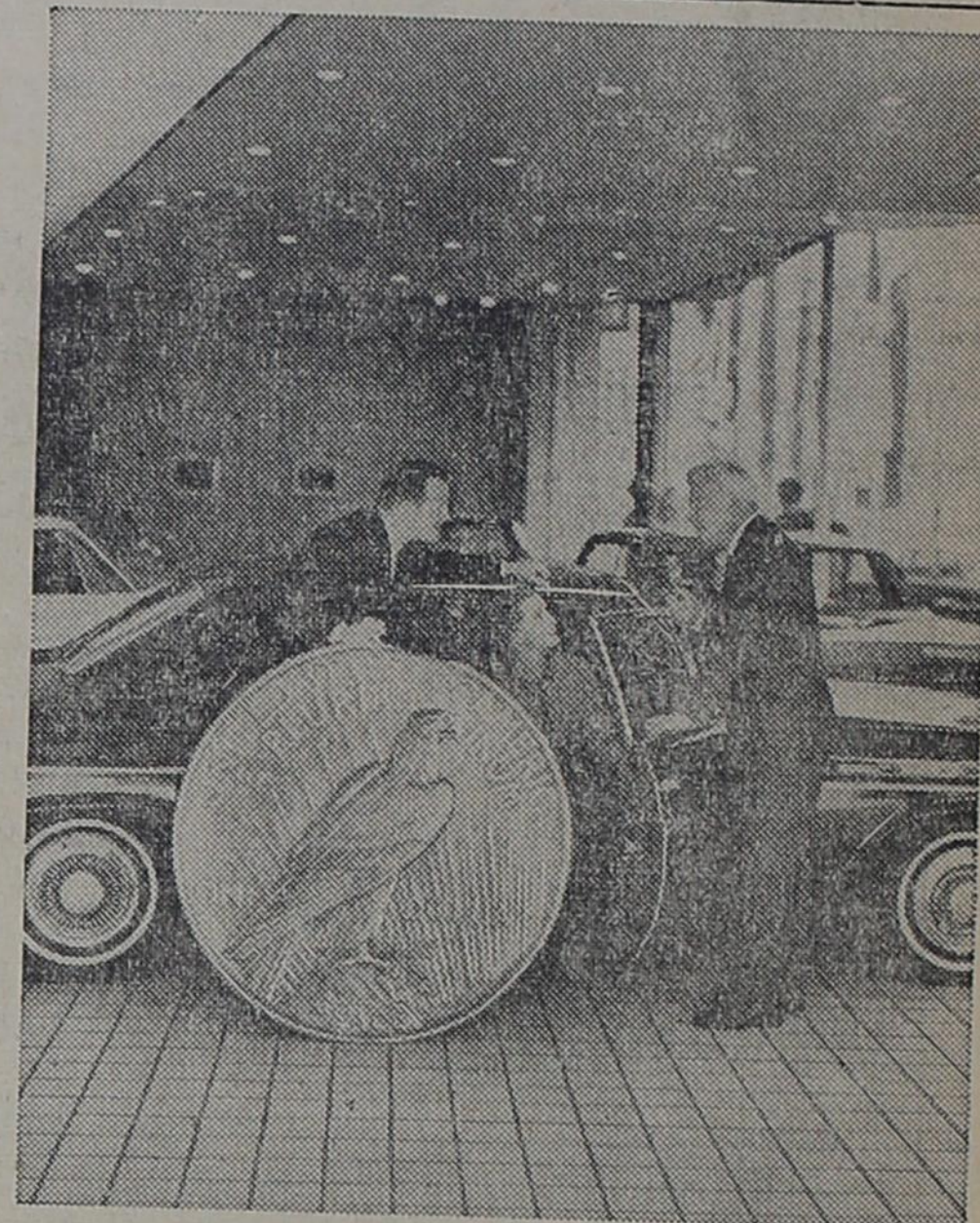
Chairman Bryant points out that two major improvements have been made in the 1964-crop feed grain program as compared with programs of previous years: (a) as much as 50 percent of the total feed grain base may be diverted on any farm (this is up from the 1963 maximum of 40 percent of the feed grain base); and (b) the average payment rate per acre for diverting 40 percent or more of

As 1963 drew to a close textile men estimated that total production of cotton and cotton-blend stretch fabrics would reach the 20-million-yard mark. More consumer products of 10 percent stretch cotton may be seen soon, industry leaders predicted.

More and more manufacturers are entering the stretch fabric field. Mills are able to work out the technical and pictorial details for making the new fabrics as rapidly as chemists can devise new ways of creating finishes for stretch developments.

Prior to the use of chemical finishing techniques, stretch properties were created by knit construction. Later, blends of cotton and synthetics provided stretch. Cost advantages are found in chemical treatment of cotton, and another basic advantage of chemically finished cotton is the ability of stretch fibres to team with wash and wear finishes in cotton. Chemical finishing is the leading method of imparting wash and wear properties, according to research.

The popularity of stretch fabrics is shown by this market research information. Wider use of stretch fabrics is noted principally in sportswear, active work clothes and children's garments.

on recorded votes. He was one of an even smaller group who did not miss a quorum call during the Session.

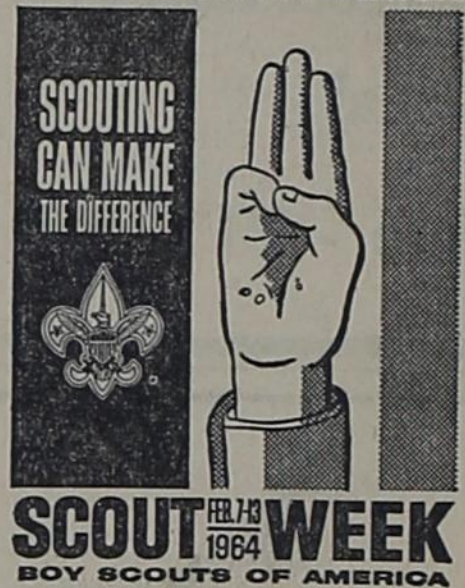
There were 119 recorded votes during the Session and Burleson was present and is on record with a "yea" or "nay" on each. There were 137 quorum calls, and he was present in every instance.
