

The Gorman Volunteer Fire Department is sponsoring a city-wide Spring Clean-Up Week campaign for the week of April 19th through the 25th. Each property owner is asked to thoroughly check and clean-up around his property in an effort to prevent fires.

Now is the time to clean that garage of unusable materials that have accumulated during the winter months. Old paint cans, oily rags and papers and boxes are definitely fire hazards, especially when the weather gets warmer.

Take a good look around the yard and clean all areas of dead leaves, limbs and metal objects. This will also prevent accidents when the grass needs mowing.
