## Omar Burlison Makes Statement For Re-Election

Omar Burlison, veteran Congressman from the 17th District, is conducting a vigorous, active campaign for the Democratic Primary nomination for reelection.

In seeking reelection, Burlison states he is basing his campaign on his record of nearly 18 years service in Congress.

"In that time, I have never been a rubber-stamp, but have fulfilled my responsibility to vote on each issue for the best interest of my Country, my State, and my District," Burlison said.

"I do not think the people of the 17th District want or deserve anything less."

Burlison, at 58, is already one of the senior members of the U. S. House of Representatives in point of service.

His seniority has carried him to Chairmanship of the potent House Administration Committee, and to the third ranking position on the powerful House Foreign Affairs Committee. In addition, Burlison serves on two important Joint Committees formed from senior members of the House and Senate, as Chairman of one and Vice Chairman of the other.

"In all my years in Congress," Burlison said, "I have followed two guiding principles: First to know the views of my constituents and reflect their sentiments to the greatest degree possible in my actions as their Representative. Second, to inform and advise as closely as I can on those issues which affect my District, my State and the Nation."

Burlison termed his approach to government as one of "common sense," gained through his years of public service.

A few days ago I was asked if I was a 4-H member. My proud answer was "yes". The next question was, "Catherine, how does a child that lives in town take part in 4-H work?" It took me a little time to think of an answer to this - then I replied - if you have about six hours I'll tell you.

Thinking about these questions when I went home made me wonder just how much grown folks knew about 4-H, so I decided I would try and tell them what 4-H has meant to me.

Living in town and having no

place to raise animals I looked around for something that I could do. I have always wanted to cook and my mother always seems too busy to help so that seemed the place to start. Mrs. L. L. Burns and Mrs. R. C. Ashworth said they would take a few girls. We met once a month. I learned the proper way to set a table and how to serve. We also learned to cook candy, cookies, cake and make salads.

We enjoyed our lessons very much but when our lessons turned out well - we enjoyed eating the results even better.

We didn't get to enter any of the County Contests in cooking as our Unit started too late, but sev-

eral of us entered the Candy Contest at our local 4-H Fair. Our group made all the cookies and candy for our 4-H Christmas Party and also served. Was looking forward to my second year of cooking but we were unable to find any leaders so had to give this up.

Mrs. Travis Smith offered to take a group of girls for sewing and I was accepted in her Unit. This was a good year for us. We were able to enter the County Dress Revue which required a finished garment and a Record Book. This year we made a sewing box, learned to use the sewing machine, hemmed a dish towel, and made a skirt. I received a White Ribbon for my skirt. Altho this is not a first place winner I feel that I learned a great deal. Enjoyed this Unit very much and was sorry to hear that Mrs. Smith would not be able to continue this year. I am now looking for another sewing leader.

Several girls from this area have helped at the concession stand during the Eastland Fat Stock Show. We took orders and served people. This was hard but enjoyable work. We came home at night with our heels dragging but feeling that we had helped and accomplished a great deal.

Our local 4-H Fair was a success, with all the boys and girls taking part. Again we were called on to do our best and to show the town just what 4-H was all about.

When we had our Diamond Jubilee I rode on the 4-H Float as a space man. This float took second place in Gorman and first in Eastland. I was proud to be a part of it.

One year I was Recreational Leader for our club. This took a lot of time and effort. You realize that the other members had a good time during the recreational part of the program if you, as the leader, could plan interesting games.

Most of all I think 4-H has given me a sense of responsibility for my own achievements and has taught me to get along with boys and girls of different ages. It has also taught me a great deal other than cooking and sewing. Our Community Programs have taught us about Water Safety, Traffic Rules, Fire Prevention, Uses of Electricity, Good Grooming, and most of all the feeling of cooperation between boys, girls and their adult leaders.

What this town needs is more willing workers and I am sure the boys and girls would eagerly welcome them.

Once a year 4-H has a camp for boys and girls. You are only there for two days, but a great many lessons are given during this time. Once a year we celebrate with an Achievement Banquet. This past year I was lucky enough to receive a Clothing Award. Am looking forward to more interesting years of 4-H work and play.

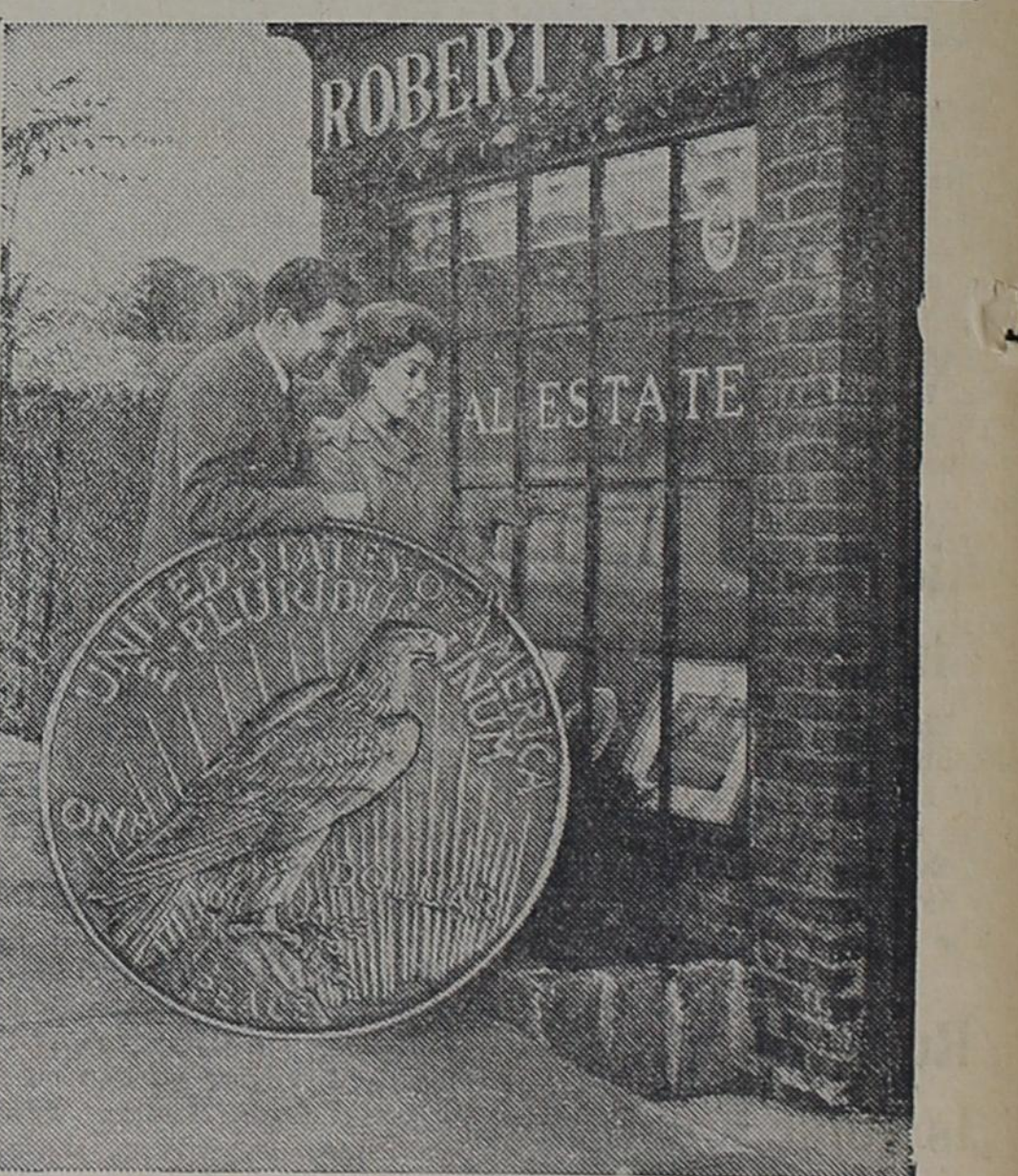

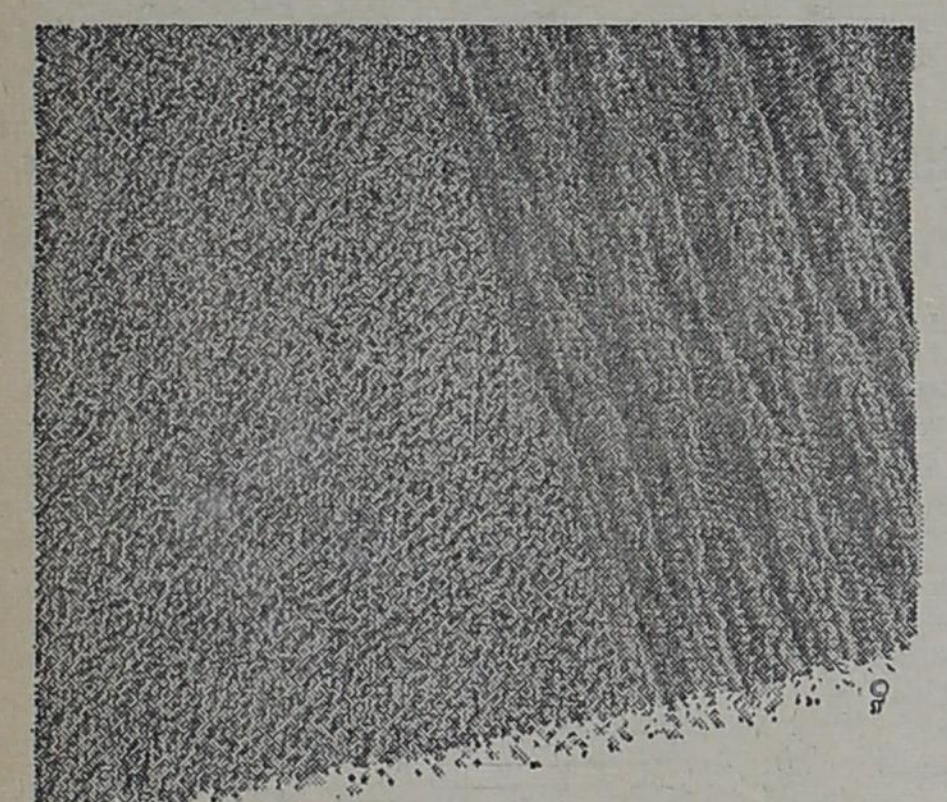

## Texas Crude Oil Prices Show Gain

AUSTIN, Tex. — Texas crude oil currently is selling for more dollars than any year since the Suez crisis in 1957, Railroad Commissioner Jim Langdon reports.

Langdon said this should be welcome news to the people of Texas because the Texas oil and gas dollar pays for 42 per cent of the state's cost of public education, and almost 60 per cent of the state's cost of teacher retirement, old-age assistance, blind assistance and aid to dependent children.

He stated that oil production is up three per cent over the previous year, and "an even more encouraging" jump is expected for 1964.

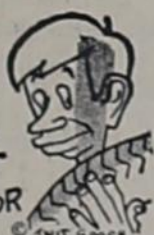
Langdon said the fact that the Texas petroleum industry was in such a healthy state after more than a half century of intensive development could be laid to two factors: (1) There was a lot of oil to begin with; and (2) it has not been wasted promiscuously.

Critics of the way the Railroad Commission has regulated the oil and gas industries disregarded the Commissioners' duty to guard the public interest. When they talked about allowables and production, they ignored the fact that natural gas has in recent years become an important energy source replacing to some extent oil; and that Texas was more dominant in gas production than in crude oil production.

Langdon is the newest member of the Railroad Commission, having been appointed last spring. Now he is seeking the voters' approval to serve the remaining four years of a six-year term. He resigned as chief justice of the El Paso Court of Civil Appeals to accept the Railroad Commission post.

Before moving to El Paso, Langdon was district judge for five West Texas counties. While on the bench and as a practicing attorney in a large oil producing area, he gained vast knowledge of the oil and gas industries, as well as transportation matters, which the Commission regulates.

## Pecan Budding & Grafting School Set In Cisco On April 15

April 15th. has been designated as the date for the annual Eastland County Pecan Budding and Grafting School to be held at Cisco according to Tom Stevenson, Chamber of Commerce Manager and County Agricultural Agent J. M. Cooper, co-sponsors of the all day affair.

Cooper will teach the school which has been an annual event in the county for many years. The morning session, beginning at 9 a. m., will be held in the cafeteria at the Cisco Junior College. It will be devoted to lectures and demonstrations on when and how to bud, types of budwood, storage and seasoning of budwood, wrapping, when and how to force the bud into growth, difference between budding and grafting.

After lunch in the cafeteria the group will re-assemble in the Kent Word orchard, 3 miles south of Cisco, in the Leon River bottom, for a practice session and a grafting demonstration.

A supply of the double bladed pecan budding knives and the new plastic budding taps will be available. Cold storage pecan budwood of some of the new popular hybrid varieties such as the Choctaw, Comanche, Wichita, and Apache, as well as some of the older varieties, will also be available for those desiring it.

Stevenson said that out of county folks who want to learn to bud and graft pecans are welcome to attend. Women as well as men may attend. A large number of people from 16 different west central Texas counties attended the school last spring.

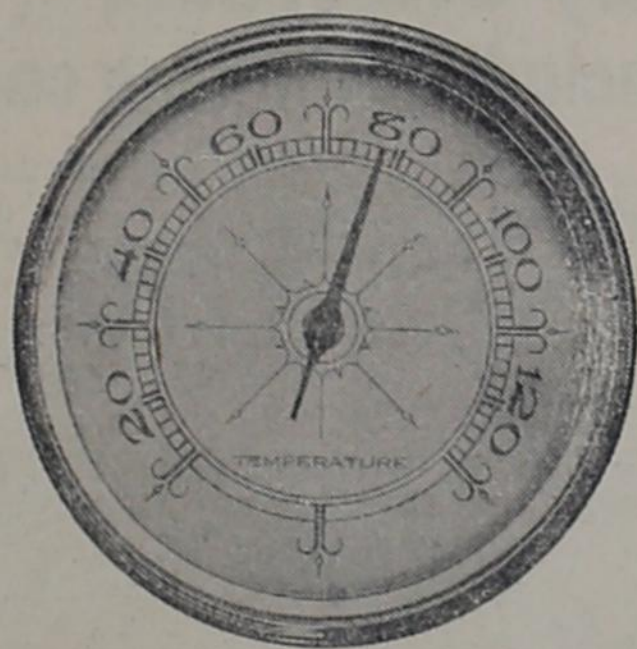

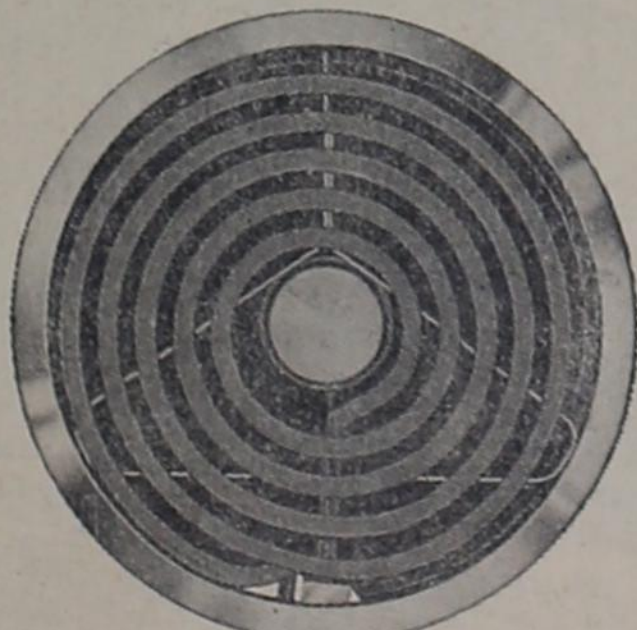


1. The generic or family name of the fiber.
2. The registered identification number, or name under which business is conducted.
3. The percent of each fiber in the fabric, listed in the order of its predominance by weight. If the fiber content is 5 percent or less it is listed as "other fibers."

4. The fiber trade name may appear with the generic name, but the lettering must appear in equal size at least once on the label.
5. The country of origin, if other than the United States.

Consumers can promote the use of labels by asking for and using informative tags; patronizing firms which label merchandise well; demanding wider use of informative labels; letting people know when a label is helpful; understanding the label terminology, and filing the label for future use as one would a recipe.

Tens of thousands of high school athletes will turn part-time dentist this season and fashion their own custom-fitted, dentist-approved mouthpieces in a mass program for mouth safety on the football field.

As a result of a mandatory ruling that all players wear protective mouthpieces, adopted in 1962 by the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations, superior mouthpieces have been developed. These offer far greater protection against tooth and jaw damage, lacerations, and brain injury than old style "boxer-type" mouthpieces.

Surprisingly, these new protectors can be fitted precisely to the mouth by the athlete himself in less than 15 minutes. They are permanent and inexpensive.

Twelve years ago, studies revealed that 50 percent of injuries to high school football players were of the head and oral cavity.

According to a survey conducted last year by the Bike Division of the Kendall Company, a leading manufacturer of athletic trainer's supplies, only 63 per cent of the nation's schools made even partial use of mouthpieces during 1961.

In 1962, after the mandatory ruling, 75 per cent of non-Federation schools and 95 per cent of Federation schools planned to equip their teams 100 per cent with mouthpieces," said Raymond A. Van Dyke, Bike Company official, "thanks to the promptness with which coaches have responded to the new ruling.

"The new Bike 'Perfect Fit' mouthpiece may be custom-formed to the mouth and teeth by the athlete himself. It offers greater protection, can't be bitten through, allows normal closure of the mouth, plus free speech and breathing," Van Dyke said.

The athlete simply mixes a filler material, fills a vinyl shell, allows it to set partially for two minutes, and then makes an impression of his own teeth which becomes permanent when the filler cures.

## Gordon McLendon Calls Attention To Civil Rights Bill

Gordon McLendon gave special attention to civil rights and other domestic issues this week in his fast-moving campaign for the Democratic U. S. Senatorial nomination in the May 2 Primary.

The Dallas radio executive emphasized his support of equal voting and educational rights for all, but elaborated on his opposition to provisions of the pending civil rights bill which he contends would deprive members of all

ethnic groups of the rights of trial by jury, private property and civil liberties.

"In its present form the so-called civil rights bill poses the greatest threat to our constitutional liberties since the Supreme Court overthrew an almost identical act in 1883," McLendon declared.

He asserted that increased job opportunities, a problem which figures in both the civil rights debate and the administration's "war on poverty," can be assured only by freeing business from bureaucratic restraints to promote business expansion.

McLendon said Texas has found a satisfactory solution to the problem of medical care for the aged by implementing the Kerr-Mills law and the Texas-65 program, both based on the principle of voluntary health insurance.

## Denman Stanfield Gets Promotion In US Foreign Service

Mr. Denman F. Stanfield of Gorman, Texas, has been nominated by President Johnson and confirmed by the Senate for promotion to Class 4 in the Foreign Service of the United States.

Mr. Stanfield was born in Gorman in 1919, attended Sipe Springs High School, Sipe Springs, Texas and graduated from the Brantley Draughon Business College, Fort Worth. Prior to joining the Department of State in 1950, he attended the American Institute for Foreign Trade, Phoenix, Arizona.

During World War II, Mr. Stanfield served in the U. S. Navy aboard a destroyer on convoy duty during the African campaign.

Mr. Stanfield has served abroad with the Foreign Service in Mazatlan, Mexico; Asuncion, Paraguay and Lisbon, Portugal. He is presently taking intensive Spanish language training at the Foreign Service Institute of the Department of State, Washington, D. C.

His wife is the former Helen B. Woodard, daughter of Mrs. Leslie Woodard of Alhambra, Calif. Mr. and Mrs. Stanfield and their son, James Randall, age 6, expect to leave Washington soon for San Jose, Costa Rica, where Mr. Stanfield has been designated Chief of the Consular Section of the American Embassy.

## \$2,775,744 In Social Security Benefits Issued In County

About one out of every 5 residents of Eastland County is now receiving a monthly social security check according to figures released by R. R. Tuley, Jr., Abilene, social security district manager.

Tuley's report listed the number of Eastland County beneficiaries as 4056 at the end of 1963, an increase of 221 over the corresponding figure at the beginning of 1963. The dollar benefit amounts total more than \$2,775,744 yearly.

Retired workers are the largest single group of social security beneficiaries in the county. There are 2229 in this group and their old-age insurance benefits total \$146,860 monthly. The following table shows the number and amount of the other monthly benefits paid in Eastland County as of December 31, 1963.

In releasing the figures, Tuley pointed out that the social security benefits are important to the community as well as to the people who receive them. "It is a fact," he said, "that almost every dollar of social security benefits coming into the county is spent each month in local businesses for food, clothing, shelter, and other essentials. In this way, the benefits have a stabilizing effect on the local economy."

Tuley forecast that the number of social security beneficiaries will continue to increase in the future.
