At the end of this 10-year period the district will have another option extending possibly over a period of 30 to 40 years. He explained that there would be pelnty of water available. He stated that the reservoir will yield 11 million gallons of water daily, even during periods since the new system would utilize of drouth. By the year 2010 way in the city office, of income the engineer estimates that the combined needs of the towns will be 8 million gallons per day. There will be a central treating plant near the reservoir where water will be treated prior to entering the pipelins on its way to the several towns involved. If the situation materializes, the water for Gorman would be piped to De Leon along with De Leon's water supply. From De Leon a smaller pipeline would be used to transport Gorman's water.

> The monthly rates quoted by Mr. Hunter as necessary to maintain the proposed new system would be the same as now for up to 2,000 gallons. This is currently \$3.50 per month and would remain unchanged. However, for amounts above 2,000 gallons per month, the rates would increase under the proposed new system. For example, 4,000 gallons monthly (which is our present average per meter per month) now costs \$4.30. Under the new system the rate would be \$5.10. For a monthly usage of 8,000 gallons we now pay \$5.78. The new rate for 8,000 gallons would be \$7.85. For 20,000 gallons monthly we now pay \$9.98 per month. The new rate would be \$14.45.

What A Friend We Have In Jesus

A Carpenter and The Lord Write a Hymn Together

Grief fell over the town of Lake Rice, Canada. One of the community's most beloved citizens was dead. Some believed his death was accidental. But the poor people—those who knew him best—wondered if their friend had taken

Joseph Scriven was born in Dublin in 1820. He was educated on the Emerald Isle and graduated from Trinity College. He was a youth of high ideals and a beautiful lass has set the day when she would share his high hopes. Then tragedy struck. The day before the wedding the body of the young Irishman's bride-to-be was pulled from a pool of water where she had accidentally drowned.

Scriven never overcame the shock. At twenty five he migrated to Canada in the hope of forgetting. But he never forgot. For forty years

O what peace we often forfeit, O what needless pain we bear, All because we do not carry Everything to God in prayer.

Have we trials and temptations. is there trouble anywhere? We should never be discouraged, Take it to the Lord in prayer.

the melancholy man associated himself only with the poor. He worked at simple labor but refused employment from those who were able to pay. Most of his time was spent sawing wood and doing patch carpentry for widows and the sick.

One day when he was ill an attending neigh-bor found a poem in his room. Questioned as to the authorship, Scriven replied, "The Lord and I wrote it between us."

It was October 10, 1886, and Joseph Scriven was dead. Like his sweetheart of years ago, his body was pulled from a pool of water. Whether he died of his own design didn't really matter. His neighbors built a monument to his memory. Not because he had written a famous hymn but because he had devoted his life to the poor. The Hymn Scriven said he and the Lord wrote

Rides Research Is Big Challenge For **Growing Six Flags**

In a theme Park such as SIX FLAGS, the rides are woven in with periods of Texas history. A team of artists, headed by SIX FLAGS art director Randall Duell, assumes the responsibility of creating and designing the rides. Many years as a set designer for MGM Studios have sharpened Randall Duell's imagination and architectural skills.

Before a ride becomes operational, six months to a year is the average time spent on feasibility studies, historical research, artists sketches, engineering blueprints and building and testing.

As SIX FLAGS grows in size and scope, the creation of new rides and attractions must be given year-round attention. These new rides and attractions serve a two-fold purpose. One is to keep the atmosphere of the Park always fresh and exciting. The other, simply stated, means every new ride or attraction offers an increased handling capacity, enhancing the Park's ability to comfortably host large numbers of guests.

SIX FLAGS' season attendance, which has soared from 563,000 in 1961 to 1,436,000 in 1963, has commensurately increased its rides and attractions from 40 to over 70.


In-Park capacity has climbed from 12,000 visitors per day in 1961 to over 23,000 per day in 1963. To the \$10,000,000 initial cost of building SIX FLAGS, more than \$2,600,000 was spent during 1962 and 1963 for additions, rides and attractions. A major addition to SIX FLAGS costs anywhere from \$250,000 on up. According to Randall Duell, "the money has been well spent. I'm sure the 3.2 million visitors we've had so far will agree with me."

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
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
