OMAR BURLESON is far from the flamboyant type, but states his views in quietly methodical fashion that has gained him the respect of colleagues in Congress. His 1963 attendance and voting record was 100% and since 1947 his attendance and voting record is 98%.

OMAR BURLESON has always voted for the defense bills of this country; he voted for the income tax reduction bill; he introduced a bill to limit beef imports to this country; he introduced the first bill to limit oil imports; he introduced a bill for a COMPLETE embargo on trade to Cuba.

In his 18 years in Congress OMAR BURLESON has voted to reduce the federal budget from three to 13 BILLIONS each congressional term; as Chairman of the House Administration Committee he has consistently effected economy in committee spending (i. e. reducing Adam Clayton Powell's committee spending 50%); he has always voted against foreign aid since the late 1940s and recent reaction in Congress is proving him correct. To The Citizens Of Eastland County

I am deeply grateful to you for the confidence placed in me in the past. It has always been my aim to carry out the dictates imposed upon the office of County-District Attorney by the laws and constitution of the State of Texas. These specifically provide that no person

shall be harrassed by being tried unless the evidence tends to show his guilt beyond a reasonable doubt. There have been some difficult cases during the past two years, the prosecution of which has caused those prosecuted to become very revengeful in their opposition to me. Statistics show that if convictions are obtained in 50% of ALL cases filed, that is a good record. As your County and Dis-

trict Attorney, convictions have been obtained in 60% of all cases filed in County and District Courts. Of the cases tried, before the Courts and juries, convictions have been obtained in 90% of the cases submitted.

Of the cases remaining on the dockets (with the exceptions of approximately 18 cases filed recently and slated for trial this summer) they are subject to dismissal for lack of sufficient evidence upon which to obtain a conviction.

Last year, the Grand jury, at my request, made an investigation of the court dockets and, regarding the same, made the following report:

"March 28, 1963 TO THE HONORABLE T. M. COLLIE, JUDGE OF THE 91ST. DISTRICT COURT OF EASTLAND COUNTY, TEXAS:

We, the Grand Jurors for the February Term, A. D. 1963, desire to submit our final report and upon acceptance of the same, we respectfully request that we be discharged for this term.

When this Grand Jury was convened in early February, we had reason to feel concerned by reason of an article which appeared in the local newspapers on January 17, 1963. We have had occasion to investigate this matter and find that the newspaper article did not give a true picture of the situation, and we feel that the people of this county are entitled to a fair representation of the facts. Not having been advised of the number of cases filed, but only as to those remaining on the docket, we have checked into the matter very thoroughly and beg to report that from January 1, 1958 until today, the following is the record of the docket referred to in said article:

During the period of time from January 1, 1958 until March 28, 1963, 362 cases were placed upon the County Court docket, and they were disposed of as follows: 224 convictions; 57 cases transferred to District Court; 8 dismissals; 11 cases adopted by the Grand Jury, and 2 cases docketed in error, leaving 70 cases pending. In reviewing the cases still undisposed of, in our opinion, a very few of those cases would result in a conviction, if tried. There are a number of reasons why the great majority of the cases remaining on docket cannot be tried. Many involve invalid complaints, some of which are not even signed; many of the cases involve family fights, which were settled between the parties; many involve searches and seizures without a search warrant; in many of the cases no arrests have ever been made for the reason that the defendants have not been located, and many of the cases cannot be tried because of insufficient evidence.

During the period of time covered by our investigation, there has been turned in to the County Treasurer by the District Attor-

TO THE RESIDENT, QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE CITY OF GORMAN, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID CITY AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in the City of Gorman, Texas, on the 23rd day of May, 1964, on the proposition and at the place more particularly set forth in the resolution adopted by the Board of Commissioners on the 22nd day of April, 1964, calling said election which is substantially as follows:

RESOLUTION

CALLING AN ELECTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF DETERMINING WHETHER THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS SHALL BE AUTHORIZED TO ENTER INTO A CONTRACT WITH UPPER LEON RIVER MUNICIPAL WATER DISTRICT FOR THE PURPOSE OF SUPPLYING WATER TO THE CITY OF GORMAN.

WHEREAS, the City is in urgent need of an additional water supply which may be obtained by contract with Upper Leon River Municipal Water District;

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF GORMAN, TEXAS:

1. That an election be held in said City on the 23rd day of May, 1964, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

PROPOSITION

"Shall the Board of Commissioners of the City of Gorman, Texas, be authorized to enter into a contract with Upper Leon River Municipal Water District for the purpose of supplying water to said City, as authorized by Chapter 342, Acts of the Fifty-First Legislature and other applicable laws?"

2. That said election shall be held at the City Hall in said City. The entire City shall constitute one election precinct for said election, and Odie Brightwell shall be the Presiding Judge and M. F. Allen, the Alternate Presiding Judge for said election. Said Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two nor more than four qualified election clerks to serve at the election, but one of such clerks shall be the Alternate Presiding Judge. If the Presiding Judge is unable to serve at the election, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall serve as the Presiding Judge.

3. That said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 342, Acts of the Fifty-First Legislature, and only qualified electors of the City who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be permitted to vote at said election.

4. The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

PROPOSITION

"FOR THE WATER CONTRACT" "AGAINST THE WATER CONTRACT"

Each voter shall draw a line through one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

5. If this election results favorably to the making of said contract the Board of Commissioners will pass an ordinance prescribing the form and substance of said contract and directing its execution. A proposed draft of such contract is on file in the City Secretary's office for public inspection. Failure of other cities in the District to authorize such contracts with the District shall not impair the authorization conferred by this election upon the governing body of this City.

6. A substantial copy of this resolution signed by the Mayor of said City and attested by the City Secretary shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice shall be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City, the date of the first publication to be not less than fourteen days prior to the date set for said election. Except as otherwise provided in said Chapter 342, Acts of the Fifty-First Legislature, the manner of holding said election shall be governed by the general election laws.

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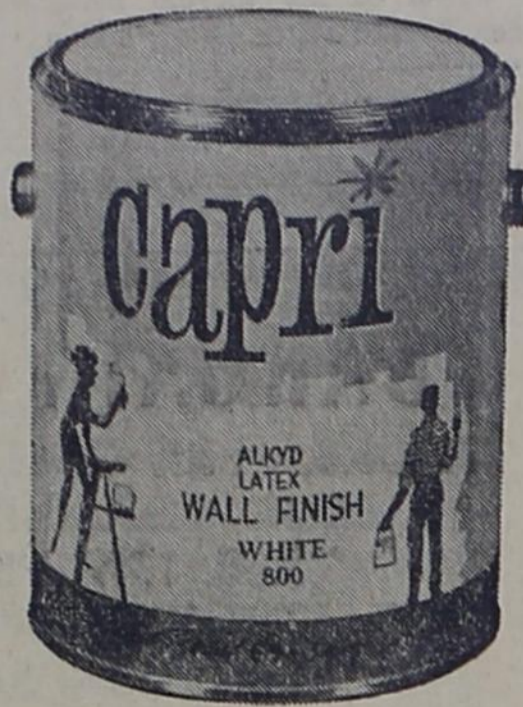

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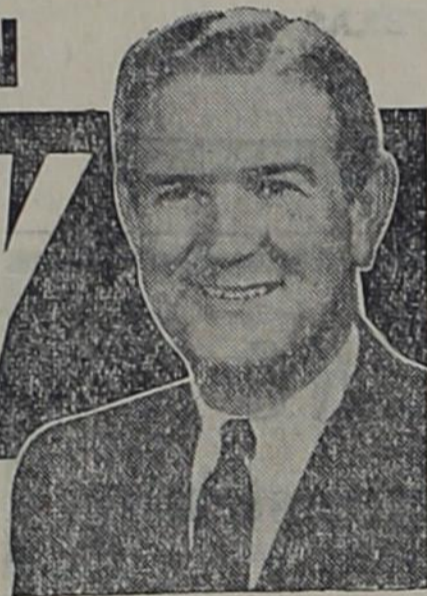
