661 HERD TESTS GIVEN TO DATE IN BANGS DRIVE

A total of 661 different cattle herds have been tested for Brucellosis in Eastland County since the work began on Jan. 7, according to word the Crew Chief, Jim Ellis, furnished the County Agents office on January 25.

Total number of cattle in the 661 different herds totalled 11,927 animals, perhaps more than one-third of the cattle in the county. No one at the present time knows the exact number in the county. The last count was in the agricultural census taken in the fall of 1959.

To date there have only been 20 different herds found to be infested with only 23 positive reactors.

Only 165 calves have been vaccinated by the technicians doing the testing. Owners may get their calves vaccinated for Brucellosis if they are between 4 to 12 months of age if they will request it prior to the testing date so that the technician doing the bleeding can take the vaccine along.

The mobile blood testing laboratory is located at the softball field near the depot on North Seaman Street in Eastland. They have a telephone in the laboratory it was said.

Ray Williams, Gorman, is the line-up man for the Brucellosis testing in an area from Carbon to Gorman to Desdemona; from Desdemona to Alameda, back to the Simpson Cemetery, from there to Pumpkin Center and back into Carbon, and all cattle in between this area.

Mr. Williams stated last Friday that most of the cattle have been tested in the area. Weather permitting, they hope to have this job completed the latter part of this week. If your cattle have not been Brucellosis tested Phone 2281 or see Ray Williams. Word can be left at the Progress office.

There will be a ball game between Gorman and Putnam beginning at 7 p. m.

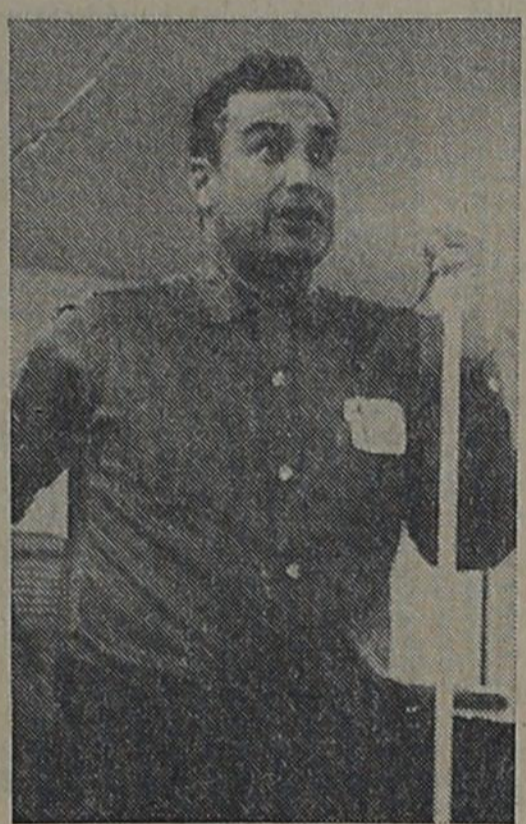

WARREN WOOD

KEEP YOUR EYE ON THE STARS — Literally speaking, this was the key to Warren Wood's talk to a group of peanut producers at the Fire Hall in Gorman Friday night.

Set a high goal for peanuts per acre. Have your soil analyzed and tested. Check the ground temperature before planting. Keep grade and quality in mind at all times. Space your seed in planting. Mr. Wood stated that he has seen as high as 90 bushels per acre produced on dry land farming.

Mr. Wood also recommended a check-off system to help peanut research. Cotton, milo, etc., have many varieties to choose from because of their funds for experimenting. So far only one peanut variety has been released.

Warren Wood was reared on a farm in Nolan County. He served five years as county agent in Frio County before quitting to set up an Agricultural Consultant Service of his own which he has been operating for the past two years. At present, from March through October, he is servicing 24 farmers with a total of 4500 peanut acres and 3000 acres of cotton. Aside from this he and a partner cultivate 250 acres of peanuts and 150 acres of cotton. In 1960 Mr. Wood was nominated for the National Peanut Research Award.

The meeting Friday night was sponsored by Wilco Seed Co. of LaVernia, Texas and arrangements in Gorman were made by their local representative, Arlton Smith.

Auto Plates on Sale Here February 1st.

Automobile license plates will be available in Gorman on Friday, February 1st., according to J. C. Allison, County Tax Assessor Collector. New 1963 plates may be purchased at Todd's Variety Store. Mr. E. E. Todd has been in charge of the sub station in Gorman for many years.

The new prefix for license plates in Eastland County is DT. The Gorman numbers will start with 4950 and go through 5549. Commercial plates will be IU8000 through IU8099. Farm Tags will be 8J5325 and run through 8J5474.

Mr. Todd said that no truck-tractor tags would be available at the sub station. Truck-tractors are registered according to three weight categories and must be secured at the tax office in Eastland.

All trailer licenses may be purchased at the sub station.

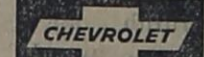

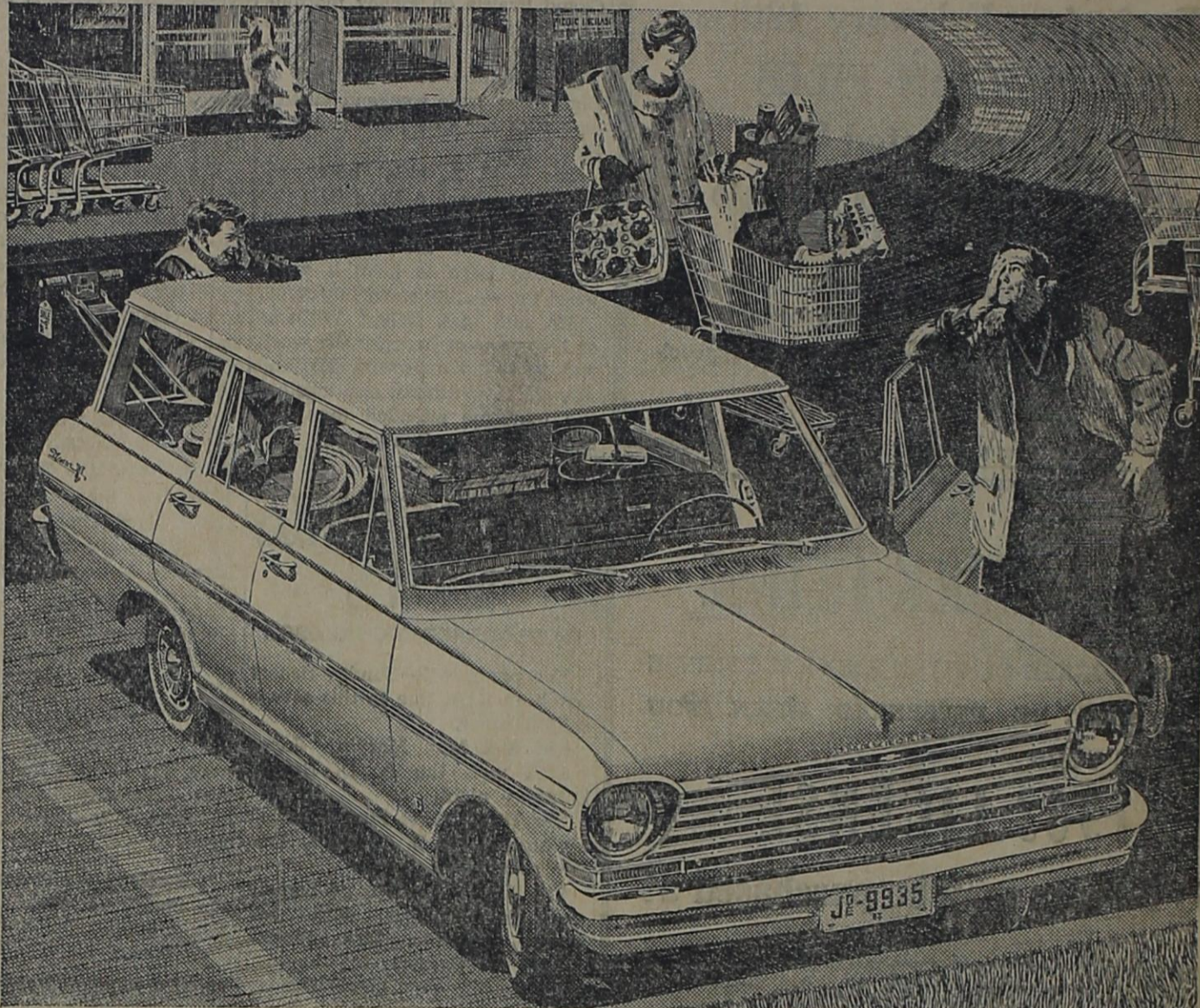
