## Girl Scout Cookie Sale Feb. 12 - 21st.

Dates for the 17th Annual Cookie Sale of the Heart of Texas Council have been set for February 12 through the 21st. Scout leaders have completed special training for the project and are now in the process of training girls in their troops the procedures to be followed during the sale.

Mrs. Joe Neill is serving as Community Cookie Chairman for Gorman and will check cookies out to leaders of troops on Wednesday, February 11th. Leaders, in turn, will check cookies out to the girls and supervise their sales during the sale. The goal for Gorman has been set at 84 cases of cookies. The total council goal is 6800 cases.

Profits of the annual cookie sale go, primarily, to develop and maintain the Council-owned established camp at Lake Brownwood. Troops, however, retain 5c for each package sold by troop members. In addition, all girls throughout the 19-county council who sell 48 or more packages of cookies are awarded partial campships to apply on their camp fee at Camp Wood Lake.

Last year, a total of \$3,596.40 was retained in troops throughout the Council and 742 campships were awarded girls. This year, a new incentive has been added. Each girl who sells 3 or more packages will receive an individual "patch" to wear on her camp uniform or her Girl Scout "patch jacket."


