Dr. Pino explained and answered questions from the the arrival of Dr. Canut that they could offer a complete medical staff and that the local hospital provided a physical therapy, and inhalation therapy that could not be provided between Abilene and Fort Worth. He also explained that the prices for clinical work was the same as neighboring towns and in some in-

stances lower. Ray Hughes reported from the Lawndale Nursing Home as to the medical records, and with the arrival of Dr. Canut and with the nursing home being close to the clinic and hospital that patients in the nursing home were receiving the best service that they had ever had.

Mr. Jim Holquist, administrator of the local hospital, gave a breakdown of the average number of patients in 1971 and the average was 15.1 with one Dr. serving the hospital so far in 1972 the average has been 14.3 and needed to meet our expenses and pay off payments on the new building without having to tax would need an average of 18.6. It is easy to see that if we do not maintain the 18.6 average, then a tax would be necessary.
