

ating with the new trash pick

up program. A few still put their trash in barrels and others neglect or forget to carry theirs to the curb. In order to continue this service the Commission agreed they will be forced to place a charge on each residence, to help defray the expense. A charge of \$2.00 will be made. this will be added to each water bill. Patrons are urged to take advantage of having their trash picked up as the charge will be made on all bills. Residents having water and no sewer connections will be charged \$2.00, persons having only sewer connections have been paying \$3.00 or \$3.50, the sewer charge will be lowered to the regular charge of \$2.00 or \$2.50 and the \$2.00 trash charge will be added. The Commission realizes this may work a hardship on some few people, but with the new state laws governing dump grounds we are forced to keep the grounds in better condition, also extensive improvements and repairs are needed at the sewer treat ment plant. It all adds up to the city.

Extensive repairs have been made to the water tower. Mr. Yates, who was in charge, made the statement that our tank was good for another 50 years if checked regularly and coated every 4 years. The work is guaranteed for 16 years. This cost the City \$5,375.00. The tank had not been completely repaired in

several years. The dump ground will be open 8 hours each Saturday from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m., in addition to Monday and Friday. Mr. Lee Barnett will be on hand to direct and oversee Oaklawn Cemeteries again this year.
