



Our hospital board, congressmen and others thoroughly explored every avenue of federal funding. Hospital funding simply does not function as does Urban Renewal projects on housing, etc.

The fact of the matter is that my opponent sent architect to meet with the His hospital board in 1968. architect proposed a \$1 Million hospital plant to be financed under the Hill-Burton prowould have probably risen to \$11/4 Million by the time we began hospital construction in 1971. This is, provided of course, we could have secured Hill-Burton help at all Ranger has not secured Hill-Burton as yet and they started their efforts about the time we did - We have a fine new hospital - They do not! To use \$1 Million figure proposed by my opponent's architect in 1968 - the architect's fee would have been between \$60,000 and \$80,000 (almost one-third of the total actual cost of our new facility). Incidentally, Mr. Holquist and Mr. Blair were able to hold our architect's fee down to a few hundred dollars. On the plan of my opponent's architect, the local folks would have had to raise 50 percent of the funds. On \$1 Million this would have been \$500,000 for the people of Gorman for the building alone - add to this the cost of equipment required by Hill-Burton and we could have been looking at \$600,000 or more as our local share, not including the clinic. As it is, we have a fine, modern facility fully accredited and approved and the total debt amounted to only \$280,000 including building, land, paved parking area, equipment, and
