## Secondary Registration School District Slated For Aug. 10th Recognized for Safety

Registration date for Gorman High and Junior High will be on August 10th. Grades 7-10 will register from 8:00 to 12:00. Juniors and Seniors will register from 1:00 to 3:30. If you want a top locker register early. If you are a new secondary student in Gorman please call the High School (734-2616) to make arrangements to register early. We will have Open House from 5:00 to 6:00 on August the 11th. Please come by and meet the faculty. School starts August 12th. Classes will be from 8:00 a.m. to 3:38 p.m. Lunch for the Secondary School will be from 12:26 to 1:00. Campus will still be closed for all Jr. High students. High School students will be allowed to leave for lunch.

Mr. Gene Shackelford, Superintendent, of Gorman ISD accepted the Resourceful Award from the Texas Educational Insurance Association for an outstanding safety record for the 1997/98 school year. Gorman ISD was recognized for their efforts in preventing work related accidents and injuries. Since becoming a member of the Association in September-92 the district has saved \$92,738. More than 330 Texas schools participate in this program, developed by Hibbs-Halmark & Company in 1991 and administered by Claims Administrative Services, Inc. (CAS). Emphasis is placed on employee safety through prevention. Both companies, located in Tyler, with services offices throughout Texas, provide workers' compensation programs for over 30% of Texas school districts.

Gorman ISD's individual saving for the 1997/98 school year were \$17,994 Barry Jones, President of CAS stated "Our insurance program was developed to create safer working conditions and better savings for school district. Our safety professionals work with individual schools to implement strict safety policies and procedures."

"Member districts' commitment to safety is the primary reason for the Association's success," said Wesley Slade, Senior Vice President of CAS. "Our program has set the example for all other schools for reduction of job related injuries, and for saving tax dollars. Taxpayers can be confident knowing HHC/CAS, the Board of Trustees, and Gorman ISD are working in tandem to provide the safest possible working environment for employees and to reduce the costs of worker's compensation."

## School Lunch Prices

The price of student and adult lunches in the Gorman ISD have decreased for the 1999-2000 school year. Pk-6 lunch price is \$1.20 and breakfast \$1.00. Grades 7-12 lunch price is \$1.40 and breakfast \$1.20. Employee adult lunches are \$1.75, breakfast \$1.50 and the salad bar is \$1.75.

Beginning this year a students' salad bar has been added for students in grades 7-12. Students who participate in the lunch program for free or reduced lunches may receive those same benefits if they choose to eat the salad bar instead of taking a lunch tray. Students who pay regular price for lunch trays would pay \$1.40 for the salad bar.

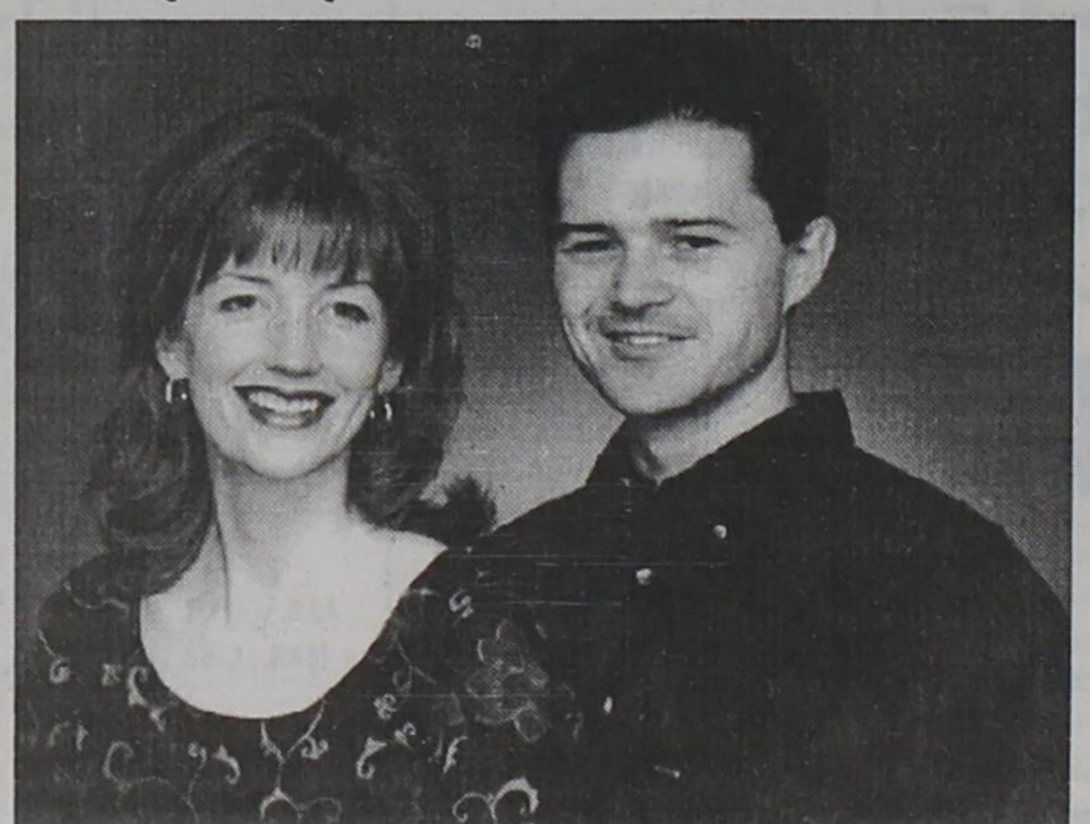

# AN OPEN LETTER FROM THE MAYOR OF BOULDER CITY, NEVADA

To the Good Citizens of Gorman, Texas, Greetings:

This letter is being printed to correct misrepresentations that occurred recently between a "citizen of Gorman and myself. Early last month I received an e-mail request at my residence asking for information on St. Jude's Ranch in Boulder City.

Almost daily I receive requests for information on some aspect of Boulder City, and I pride myself in answering every one of them. Having lived in Boulder City for 29 plus years, I gladly answered the questions from my personal knowledge of the good work being done by St. Jude's in our community.

In response to the first person inquiry, I stated: "St. Jude's ... has been located in Boulder City for approximately 40 years without any major problems during this entire time ... St. Jude's has been accepted by our community where all the children attend our public schools ... someone from your group should visit St. Jude's ... to determine first hand the strength and acceptance of this rehabilitating facility ..." This is all absolutely true.

Unfortunately, when I received and answered this person's second e-mail, the information given me about the meaning of many Level 4 and 5 children was incorrect. I deeply regret learning recently that portions of my last e-mail to this person ... taken out of context by a party or parties unknown to me, and contrary to the spirit in which they were written ... are being circulated in your community. I have recently acquired the following correct information.

State Social Services Departments assign levels of care based on gradations of essential services required by each individual child. For example, a child in a wheelchair because of an accident needs extra care (Level 4). A boy who is depressed, confused and perhaps even suicidal, because he was raped by a stepfather needs extra therapy (Level 5).

A child with bi-lateral brain dysfunction caused by a botched abortion attempt needs constant supervision (Level 4). All of these kids are "level 4 and 5" but none of them is a danger to the community simply because of the need for constant around-the-clock care.

St. Jude's in Boulder City has been successful with both Level 4 and 5 children such as those described above. Boulder City does not have an ordinance prohibiting the care of those levels of children in need of special programs of care. Misunderstandings occur because State Social Services Levels are comprehensive "catch all" definitions, and include the criminal group as well. Those unfortunates belong in correctional facilities, **NOT** the rehabilitative and therapeutic centers such as St. Jude's runs. St. Jude's does **NOT** accept placement of criminal elements which may be given those same levels of classification (4 & 5). I regret I did not have the information above earlier.

I have never met this person and have only responded to their two recent e-mails. However, I can agree with this person's comments, after the person researched St. Jude's via the Internet, that "They seem to be well respected and basically on the up-and-up" and "to be very stable and well lead(sic)." I can personally attest to these sentiments of this person.

St. Jude's is a non-sectarian. The children have participated in Vacation Bible Schools run by our local Baptist Churches and others in Boulder City. The Rev'd Dr. Herbert Ward, The Episcopal clergyman who has led St. Jude's the past 30 years, has substituted as guest pastor/preacher at our local Four-Square-Gospel Church, Community-Methodist Church, Lutheran Churches, etc. when their ministers have been on vacation.

As another point of interest, the Valedictorian of our Boulder City high school just a few years ago was a former resident of St. Jude's, and now attends an Ivy League University with help from St. Jude's "Career Opportunity Fund." Another St. Jude's graduate attends college in Lubbock, Texas, and yet another former resident is going to a New Orleans university with assistance from the same fund. Four St. Jude's boys currently play on our High School football team, and a few years ago a St. Jude's boy brought home the Nevada State Lightweight Wrestling Trophy for our high school.

Since 1970 the Clark County (Nevada) School District has parked its area school buses on St. Jude's campus to protect them from vandalism which had been occurring when they were parked on the various school properties. St. Jude's has also benefited our local economy to the tune of over \$40 million in the past 30 years by hiring locals as staff and builders.

Let me close this open letter to all the Citizens of Gorman in the same words I ended my June 13, 1999 e-mail to this person. "I hope the (information) above has been helpful in presenting the feelings of how we accept St. Jude's Ranch for Children in Boulder City." If any of you ever are out in Southern Nevada, drop by St. Jude's to see for yourself. And come up to City Hall for a visit too.

If you cannot travel this far west, I understand there is also a St. Jude's facility in Bulverde, Texas, north of San Antonio. From the pictures I have seen, it is a beautiful and peaceful site. Citizens of Gorman may find it easier to visit Bulverde since it is closer to you.

I believe your community will be pleased with your St. Jude's campus as we in Boulder City are pleased with ours.

Parent/Guardian: The Gorman I.S.D. school serves meals each school day. Children may buy lunch for \$1.00 and breakfast for \$1.00. Children may also get meals free or at a reduced price. If you now get food stamps or TANF for your children, your children can get free meals. If your total household income is the same or less than the amount on the Income Chart below, your children can get free meals. A foster child may get free or reduced-price meals regardless of your income. The reduced price is \$1.40 for lunch, \$1.30 for breakfast, and \$1.00 for after school snack. TO GET FREE OR REDUCED-PRICE MEALS FOR YOUR CHILDREN, YOU MUST COMPLETE AN APPLICATION AND RETURN IT TO THE SCHOOL. WE CANNOT APPROVE AN APPLICATION THAT IS NOT COMPLETE.

**HOW TO APPLY:** If you now get food stamps or TANF for the children you are applying for, the application must have the children's names, a food stamp or TANF case number for each child, and the signature of an adult household member. If you are applying for a foster child, the application must have the child's name, the child's "personal use" income, and an adult signature. If you do not list a food stamp or TANF case number for all children you are applying for, then the application must have the children's names, the names of all household members, the amount of income each person got last month and where it came from, the signature of an adult household member, and that adult's social security number or the word "none" if the adult does not have a social security number.

**Verification:** Your eligibility may be checked at any time during the school year. School officials may ask you to send papers showing that your children should get free or reduced-price meals.

**Fair Hearing:** You may talk to school officials if you do not agree with the school's decision on your application or the results of verification. You may also ask for a fair hearing. You may do this by calling or writing: Name: Mr. Gene Shackelford Phone: 254-734-3171

**Reporting Changes:** If your children get free or reduced-price meals because of your income, you must tell the school if your household size decreases or your income increases by more than \$50 per month or \$600 per year. If your children get meals because you get food stamps or TANF, you must tell the school when you are not getting TANF or food stamps for them. You may then fill out another application giving income information.

**Confidentiality:** School officials use the information on the application only to decide if your children should get free or reduced-price meals. Free and reduced-price eligibility information may be subject to release to other federal, state and local education, health, or other means-tested programs. Some programs already identified are the National Assessment of Educational Progress and officials collecting data for Title I allocation and evaluation purposes.

**Reapplication:** You may apply for meals anytime during the school year. If you are not eligible now but have a change in status, like a decrease in household income, an increase in household size, become unemployed or get food stamps or TANF for your children, you may then complete an application.

**Handicapped:** Meal substitutions at no additional cost for children who meet the definition of "handicapped" will be served, provided a physician has submitted a statement attesting to this fact and prescribing a substitute.

IN THE OPERATION OF THE CHILD FEEDING PROGRAMS, NO CHILD WILL BE DISCRIMINATED AGAINST BECAUSE OF RACE, SEX, COLOR, NATIONAL ORIGIN, AGE OR HANDICAP. IF YOU BELIEVE YOU HAVE BEEN DISCRIMINATED AGAINST, WRITE IMMEDIATELY TO THE SECRETARY OF AGRICULTURE, WASHINGTON, D. C. 20250.

**MEDICAID EXPANSION FOR TEENS**

As of July 1998, more Texas teenagers can qualify for Medicaid for their health care. Medicaid changed the family income limits for teens. Teenagers who are under 19 years old may now qualify for Medicaid even if they did not qualify before.

In order to cover more children who are uninsured, Texas has expanded Medicaid for older teens 15 through 18 years old whose family income is less than 100% of the federal poverty limits (based on family size; about \$16,700 for a family of four). Teens younger than 15 (and born after September 30, 1983) are currently eligible at this family income level. Families must still meet other Medicaid requirements, such as asset limits.

Please help teenagers take advantage of this opportunity to get health care coverage. With Medicaid, teens can receive medical check-ups, dental check-ups, and any necessary medical and dental treatment. Benefits include office visits, hospital care, medical equipment and supplies, prescription drugs, and many other medically necessary services. Medicaid does not provide any cash benefits.

Families with teenagers who need health care coverage and who may be interested in Medicaid, may call their local Texas Department of Human Services (TDHS) office about the Medicaid expansion for Teenagers. The TDHS office will tell them how to apply for Medicaid and what documents and information they need to bring when they apply. The phone numbers for local TDHS offices are in the government pages of the phone book.

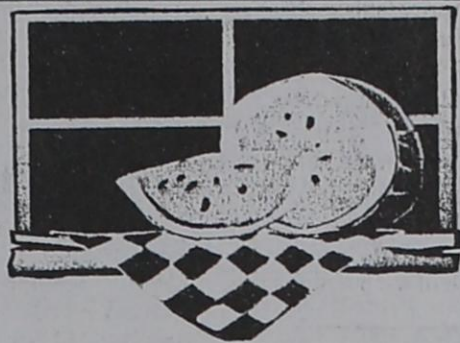


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
