Cong. Jim Wright To Make Brief Stop In Gorman Today

Congressman Jim Wright will make a brief stop in Gorman at approximately 3:30 p. m. Thursday, today, October 22.

Local pilot, Joe Collins, will fly Congressman Wright and party from Meacham Field in Ft Worth to Gorman where he will be met by Mike Collins, County Democratic Chairman, who will accompany him to Eastland where he will make the keynote address at the Democratic Rally and Barbecue at the City Park at 6:30 p. m.

Congressman Wright and party will make a brief stop at the Brown Jug Cafe for coffee and a visit with local friends who are urged to attend the brief get-together.

In addition to Congressman Wright, other dignitaries expected at the Eastland Rally will be Congressman Omar Burleson, who will introduce the speaker; State Senator Tom Creighton of Mineral Wells; and State Representative Wayne Gibbons of Breckenridge. Other party leaders will include Dave Clements of Mineral Wells, Randall Jackson of Abilene, State Committeeman; and Mrs. Macom Boddy, State Committeewoman from Henrietta.

Congressman Wright has been traveling with the President Johnson campaign delegation and will go to Big Spring from Eastland for a Democratic Rally and then to the Gulf Coast.

County P'nut Tour Highly Successful

A most interesting and educational tour of six peanut farms in the Gorman area of Eastland County was conducted Thursday, October 15. The tour was planned and led by County Agricultural Agent, J. M. Cooper, with the assistance of two members of his Crop Improvement Committee, Mr. D. B. Warren of Gorman and Mr. Oscar Schaeffer of Rising Star.

The tour began at 9 a. m. and the Vernon Files farm, some 2 1/2 miles south of Gorman, was the first stop. Here the thirty visitors on the tour, representing all parts of Eastland County, as well as Callahan and Comanche Counties, observed a fine looking crop which was planted the last few days of July. It was determined that this crop was 79 days old and seemed to be in excellent condition from the standpoint of growth of vines and progress of fruiting.

Mr. B. C. Langley, of the West Cross Timbers Experiment Station in Stephenville, predicted that this extremely late crop could, in another five or six weeks, develop an average or better than average yield of peanuts, provided a killing frost is delayed this long. Mr. Files' peanuts are of the Argentine variety.

The next stop on the tour was the farm of Bill Andry, approximately one mile west of Gorman. Mr. Andry's crop was again, predominately of Argentine Spanish variety. This crop was planted on June 10, and partially developed with assistance of an irrigation system installed by Andry in the late summer. The group was particularly interested in the facts pertaining to the installation and operation of the irrigation system.

Many similar systems for use in the production of peanuts and coastal bermuda grass are expected to be installed on area farms next year. The last morning stop was at the farm of Mitchell Campbell, four miles west of Gorman. Mr. Campbell displayed his crop of certified Spanish Starr peanuts being grown under the registered seed program of Texas A&M University.

Mr. Campbell explained the regulations and requirements pertaining to farmers who produce seed under contract with the university. Those on the tour enjoyed a lunch at the Brown Jug Cafe, compliments of the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association.

After lunch, Ross Wilson, Manager of SWPGA, discussed the Quality Control Program being carried on this year by the Association in cooperation with the USDA, the peanut shellers, growers and the Inspection Service.

Following lunch, those on the tour visited the farms of D. B. Warren, Claude Fuller, and Wayne Eaves, north of Gorman. The group observed the test plots for nematode control at the Warren farm and observed peanut production under irrigation sprinkler systems at the farms of Wayne Eaves and Claude Fuller. Although only 21,000 acres or 57% of Eastland County's allotted peanut acreage was planted this year, due to an extremely dry Spring, it is felt that the big rains of August and September may bring the overall county production close to that of recent years.

Temple Firm Gets Bid On Low Rent Housing Project

The BFW Construction Company of Temple, Texas was the low bidder on the construction of ten units of housing for the elderly to be built by the Housing Authority of the City of Gorman on a site adjoining the present low rent housing project on Crescent Street.

W. C. "Check" Smith, chairman for the Gorman Housing Authority, said the bid was in the hands of the Federal Housing Authority in Fort Worth and that he was confident that there would be no delay in the FHA approval.

The housing will be of brick veneer construction and will be built and equipped especially for senior citizens.

The Gorman Housing Authority now operates 12 units of low rent housing on Crescent Street known as "Brandon Place," which was completed in 1963.

Also under construction is an addition of 20 units to the privately owned Lawndale Home For Senior Citizens. The present home was constructed in 1963 and owners are Dr. W. M. Brogdon, Frank Kirk, Jr. and Buddy Blair.
