



There has been a great deal of discussion on the problems of the peanut industry. As producers, you are concerned with peanut diseases, peanut pests and peanut economics, but certainly all the problems do not stop when the time of harvest arrives. A frail young woman visits an art gallery

Nearly a hundred years ago ... 1858 ... a frail young woman of 22 sat in an art gallery in Germany. Too delicate to attend school regularly in her native England, Frances Ridley Havergal's father had sent her to visit friends in Dusseldorf. Exhausted from sightseeing, Miss Havergal sat,

by chance, to rest in front of a painting of Christ on the cross. Over the wreath of thorns she noticed the wording: "This have I done for thee; What hast thou done for me?"

Inspired by the painting, she wrote a few lines of poetry. That night at the home of her friends she threw the scrap of paper into the fire. Then there took place one of those strange incidents that shape the destinies of men. A gust of air blew the paper out onto the hearth.

> I gave my life for thee, My precious blood I shed, That thou might'st ransomed be, And quickened from the dead; I gave my life for thee, What bast thou given for Me?

> My Father's house of light My glory circled throne I left, for earthly night, For wanderings sad and lone; I left it all for thee, Has thou left aught for Me?

In England she showed the lines to her father, the Rev. W. H. Havergal, a hymn writer and composer in his own right. He encouraged her to add more verses. Thus began one of the most brilliant careers in the writing of Christian songs since the days of Isaac Watts.

Always frail in health, Frances Havergal died at the age of 43. When the physician told her the end was near she said, "Splendid! To be so near the gates of Heaven!'

Her hymns are still in use around the world and foremost among them is the one that would have been destroyed in the fireplace but for a chance gust of air.

I suffered much for thee, More than thy tongue can tell, Of bitterest agony, To rescue thee from bell; I've borne it all for thee, What has thou borne for Me?

And I have brought to thee, Down from My bome above, Salvation full and free, My pardon and My love; I bring rich gifts to thee, What bast thou brought to Me?
