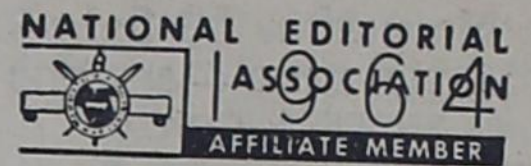

From this point Jay, behind some beautiful blocking by Ronnie Smith, Mack Sutton and Deryck Pockock, picked up 11 yards; Ormsby made 4 and then picked up another 18; Jay hit for 8; and Hirst picked up two yard for a first and goal. Ormsby took the next handoff into the end zone to score the Panther's third and final tally. Overstreet's kick was wide and the Panthers led 19 to 0.

From this point Coach Newby sent in the second unit quarterbacked by Jackie Harrison, joined by Don Wallace, Mike Foster, and James Jay in the backfield, and on the line A. B. The entire squad is to be congratulated in winning this game because it was truly a team effort and even though Gary Overstreet was limited to only defense, he played a fine game in that department.

The Panthers will be going for all the marbles this Friday night when they tangle with the Rising Star Wildcats in Rising Star. Every Panther fan is expected to back up the boys and bring them a victory and a clear-cut championship for the Panthers. Game time is 7:30 p. m.)

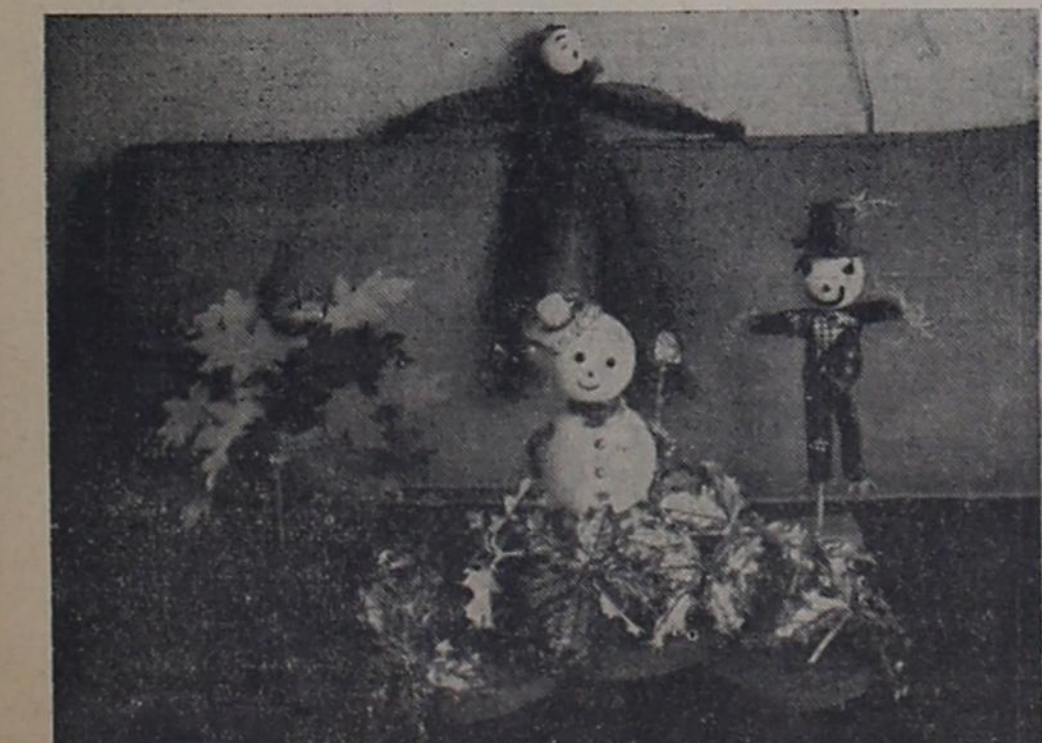

Plans Announced For Taking Census Of Agriculture

Plans for taking the 1964 Census of Agriculture in Eastland County were announced today by Eloise Parker and Floyd Johnson, newly-appointed census crew leaders for the county.

The job will be done in three stages, the crew leaders said. First will come recruitment and training of enumerators to count all farms in the county. About one enumerator for each 150 farms will be needed.

Shortly after Nov. 19th., the Bureau of the Census, an agency of the U. S. Department of Commerce, will start the second stage by mailing agricultural census questionnaires to all rural box-holders in the county. This will give farm and ranch operators, who are required by law to fill out the forms, a period of time to consult their records and fill in answers to the questions.

In the final stage, enumerators will visit each farm in the county to collect the questionnaires. At the time of this visit, the enumerators will help farmers complete answers to any questions the farmers may have had difficulty with. Enumerator visits are scheduled to begin in this county on November 23rd. Enumerators will take about three weeks to complete their work, the crew leaders estimate.

The Census of Agriculture is taken every five years in the years ending in "4" and "9" to gather up-to-date information on the nation's agricultural resources and production. Such information is vital in making decisions affecting many segments of the U. S. economy. Data gathered include the number and size of farms, acreage and harvest of crops, livestock inventory, information of farm equipment and facilities, farm products sold, and use of fertilizers, insecticides, and herbicides.

The Morning Light Is Breaking

A missionary hymn is made popular by a secular tune

Like his English predecessor, William Carey, American pioneer Baptist missionary Adoniram Judson had to light his own lamp and find his own path. A century and a half ago Protestant foreign missions was in its infancy and Judson worked in Burma for 15 years before he saw light on the horizon. But by 1829 Judson had built a school and a church, converts began coming in and the courageous missionary reported "The Light is Breaking."

While Judson was in Burma, Boston's Harvard graduate Samuel Francis Smith was studying for the ministry at Andover Theological Seminary. Smith knew half a dozen languages, could write poetry and was engrossed in the foreign missions movement. While translating a stack of foreign songs for Choir Director Lowell Mason student Smith had come across a German tune he liked and wrote some verses for it and started America to singing "My Country 'Tis of Thee." That was in February, 1832. That same month Linguist Smith read Missionary Judson's report and write a poem about the light breaking in the foreign missions field.

While all that was going on George James Webb, musician son of a wealthy farmer in Salisbury,

England, sailed for America to cast his lot at writing music. To pass time on the old windjammer, Webb wrote a secular number called "Tis Dawn, the Lark is Singing." He had no more intention of composing a hymn tune than he had of swimming the Atlantic.

Samuel Smith's missionary hymn was sung to various tunes for nearly 30 years. Then, in 1861, it was published to the tune George Webb had written on board the boat. It became so popular that three years later soldiers of the Union Army began singing the recently written "Stand Up for Jesus" to the same music and both hymns have been sung to Webb's secular tune ever since.

Samuel Smith was never a missionary, though his son was. He edited the Baptist Missionary Magazine for 15 years and was secretary of the Baptist Missionary Union. At 86 he had learned 15 languages and started studying another. Boarding a train in Boston in 1895, when he was 87, Dr. Smith died before the train left the station. Of his 150 hymns his best was inspired by Missionary Judson's report about the light breaking in Burma, but it is sung to music written for a song about a lark. Here are Smith's words...

The morning light is breaking,
The darkness disappears;
The sons of earth are waking
To penitential tears.
Each breeze that sweeps the ocean
Brings tidings from afar
Of nations in commotion,
Prepared for Zion's war.

See heathen nations bending
Before the God of love,
And thousand hearts ascending
In gratitude above;
While sinners, now confessing,
The gospel call obey,
And seek a Saviour's blessing,
A nation in a day.

Blest river of salvation,
