Don't forget the date — March 2 — 4-H Day in Gorman.

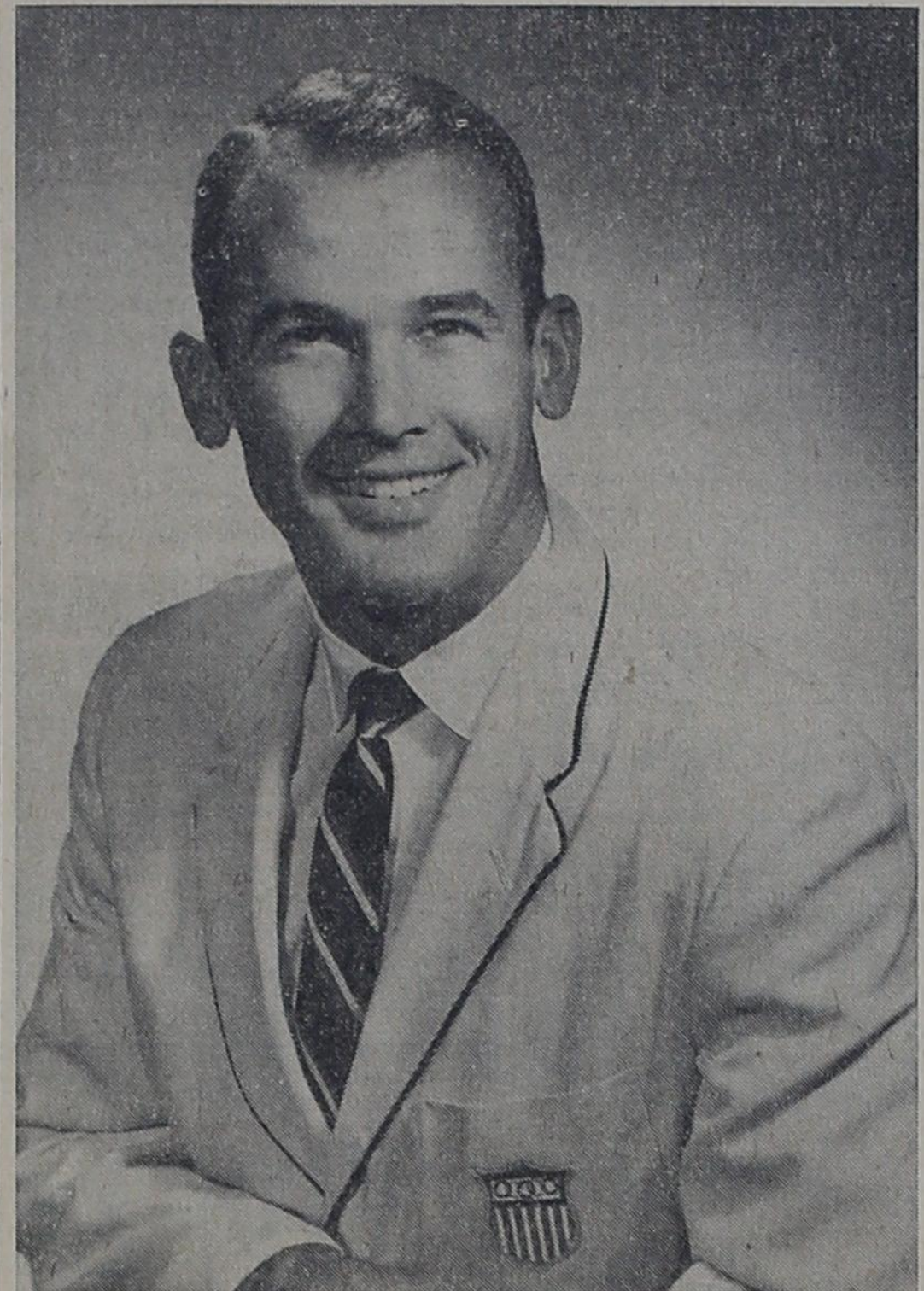

Bobby Morrow To Speaker At Banquet



BOBBY MORROW . . . triple gold medal winner

Bobby Morrow will be the principal speaker at Gorman's All Sports Banquet to be held on Friday evening, March 1, at 7 p. m. in the Higginbotham Building.

Conqueror of virtually every major sprint title in existence, Olympic Track Champion Bobby Morrow ended his collegiate career in 1958 with 80 wins and 8 losses. Winner of three Olympic Gold Medals in the 1956 Olympics in Melbourne, Australia, and winner of 14 national spring championships during his college career at Abilene Christian College in Abilene, he was named the "greatest sprinter of all time" in a special study announced by Maxwell Stiles, veteran track writer for the Los Angeles Mirror News.

In high school Bobby played football four years as a tailback and was elected captain as a senior. In track he ran the 100 and 200 yard dashes. He won the Texas High School 100 yard dash championship in 1953 and 1954 and the 220 yard title in 1954. He was the first man since the legendary Jesse Owens to capture three gold medals at an Olympiad. He tied the 100 meter Olympic record of 10.3, set a new 200 meter record of 20.6 and anchored the 400 meter relay to a world's record of 39.5. He also set a world's record of 20.6 for the 200 meter dash around one curve, giving him a share of five world standards.

Among the long list of honors Mr. Morrow has been awarded are the James E. Sullivan Memorial Trophy for the outstanding amateur athlete of 1957. One of nine Great Living Americans by the U. S. Chamber of Commerce on April 1957. Sportsman of the Year in 1956 by Sports Illustrated magazine. Athlete of the Year in 1956 by Sports Magazine.

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Group Hears Of Local School's Financial Problem

Thirty persons were present on Monday night of this week at a meeting in the local school auditorium. The trustees of the Gorman School District had invited by letter some fifty taxpaying citizens of the school district to the meeting for the purpose of acquainting them with the financial status of the school district and solicit their advice and support in seeking solutions to the problems.

It is planned that other meetings will be held and that all interested citizens of the community will be given the opportunity to have the financial problems of the school explained to them and to ask questions and to voice opinions on any phase of the school's operation.

The meeting Monday night was called to order by Gaylon Wright, President of the School Board. Mr. Wright explained the purpose of the meeting and then asked Supt. W. R. Taylor to present the problems to the assembled group.

Mr. Taylor presented four mimeographed reports giving copies to all present. The reports included An Analysis of The Financial Status of The Gorman Independent School District with Possible Solutions, a copy of the currently approved Budget of School Funds for the 1962-63 School Year, An Analysis of the Financing of The Gorman School Program, and Physical Needs of The Gorman School Plant.

After the presentation of the reports above, all present were given the opportunity to ask questions and to discuss the various aspects of the matters at hand. Advice and suggestions were solicited from the group.

Several of those present entered into the discussions.

No definite decisions were made at this meeting.

Courses of action will be decided upon by the School Board following further study and further discussions with citizens of the school district.

An Analysis of the Financial Status of the Gorman Independent School District Recommendations will be published in next week's edition.

First Methodist To Construct New Brick Parsonage

Members of the First Methodist Church of Gorman voted Sunday to approve plans and financial arrangements for a new parsonage as presented by the Parsonage Building Committee.

Specifically, the Church Conference and Quarterly Conference voted to accept the bid of \$18,620. of R. L. and James Kinser of Gorman for construction of the parsonage; to authorize the Parsonage Building Committee to air-condition the parsonage at time of construction; to sell the old parsonage and garage; and to authorize the Trustees of the church to borrow an amount not to exceed \$13,500.

The proposed new parsonage will have over 2,000 square feet of living area, plus a double garage. The house will have three bedrooms, two baths, living-dining room, family room, breakfast room, and kitchen, plus utility and storage areas.

Jim D. Vowell, A.I.A., of Fort Worth is the architect and Melvin Shell is chairman of the Parsonage Building Committee. Other members of the committee are Dr. W. M. Brogdon, Gene Baker, Mrs. M. F. Allen, and Mrs. Dorothy Hatcher. Robert W. Sanders is pastor of the church.

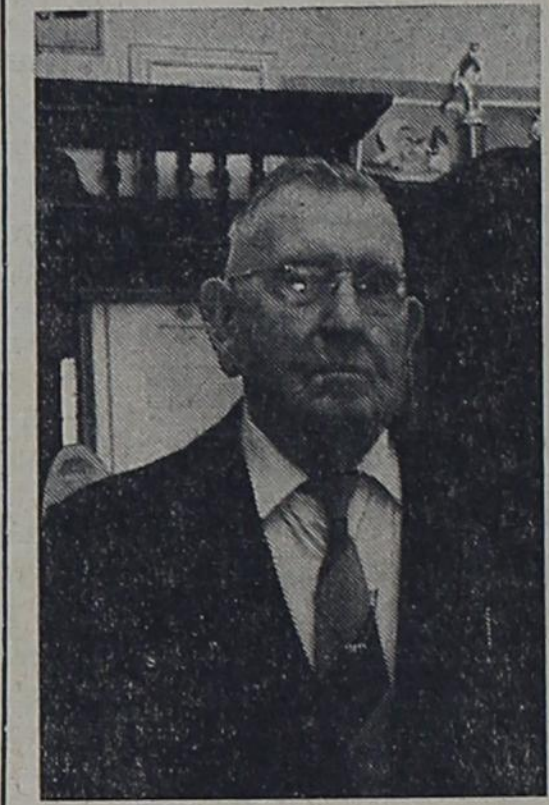
The Pantherettes missed a clear shot at the district title last Friday night when they were edged by the Carbon girls by a score of 31-30.

LAST RITES FOR BEN F. CLEMENT ON WEDNESDAY



Bro. Ben Franklin Clement, 86, minister in the Cisco Baptist Association for 42 years, died at the Gorman Nursing Home at 5:30 p. m. Monday, February 18, following a broken hip suffered three weeks ago.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday, February 20 at the First Baptist Church in Gorman with the pastor, Rev. A. D. Kyle, Jr., officiating, assisted by Rev. Don Turner of Cross Plains. Interment was in Weaver Cemetery.

Born in Bosque County on Oct. 28, 1876, he moved with his parents, the late Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Clement, to Shin Oak Springs at the age of 12, before Gorman became a townsite.

He was married to Lou Coffman in 1894 at Gorman.

His ministerial studies was interrupted at Hardin Simmons University by the death of his wife in 1910.

He later was married to Minta Pirtle, who preceded him in death in 1949.

A resident of Carbon for more than 41 years, serving churches throughout Eastland County, serving the Mangum Church 30 years, New Hope Church for 37 years, the number of marriages performed and people he has baptized run into the hundreds.

He has made his home in Gorman since 1948.

Survivors include four daughters, Mrs. Arthur Mahan of Gorman, Mrs. John Armstrong and Mrs. Sidney Roff of Eastland and Mrs. Merritt Dunn of Carbon; one step son, Elmer Pirtle of Lott, Texas; two sisters, Mrs. Nora Killion of Bellflower, Calif., and Mrs. Lou Capers of Fort Worth; Eight grandchildren, 17 great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

A son, Frank Clement, preceded him in death in 1922.

650 Animals Slated To Show In County Stock Show Event

A total of 650 animals have been entered in the Annual Eastland County Livestock Show slated for March 15 and 16, according to Ben McKinnis, General Superintendent.

This will make it the largest livestock show ever held in the county, McKinnis said.

Visitors to the show will see 245 fat lambs, 162 fat pigs, and 46 fat steers in the Fat Animal Division. In the Breeding Animal Classes a total of 56 sheep, 47 goats, 53 hogs, 20 dairy cattle, and 14 beef cattle have been entered. Additional entries are expected in the Open Beef Cattle Division of the show.

A change in the rules and regulations of the show calls for all animals to be on the show grounds properly entered and in place by 10 p. m. on March 14.

The show is sponsored by the Eastland County Livestock Raisers' Association. Ross Wilson of Gorman is President of the group, Waverly Massengale is Vice President, Glyn Gilliam, Eastland banker is Secretary, and C. M. McCain, Eastland rancher is the Treasurer.

Sifting of animals will begin at 8 a. m. on March 15. Judging of dairy cattle will begin at the same time.

Fat animals, including pigs, lambs and steers, will be sold at the Eastland Auction Barn on Saturday night, March 16.

Stock Show facilities at the show grounds, one mile northwest of Eastland, continue to be improved, officials said. The large judging arena is being covered to allow judging of animals in any weather.

Adult breeders are encouraged to show their animals this year. Arrangements are being made to take care of all animals, it was explained. All adults compete for ribbons only. The 4-H and FFA Club boys and girls receive cash premiums.

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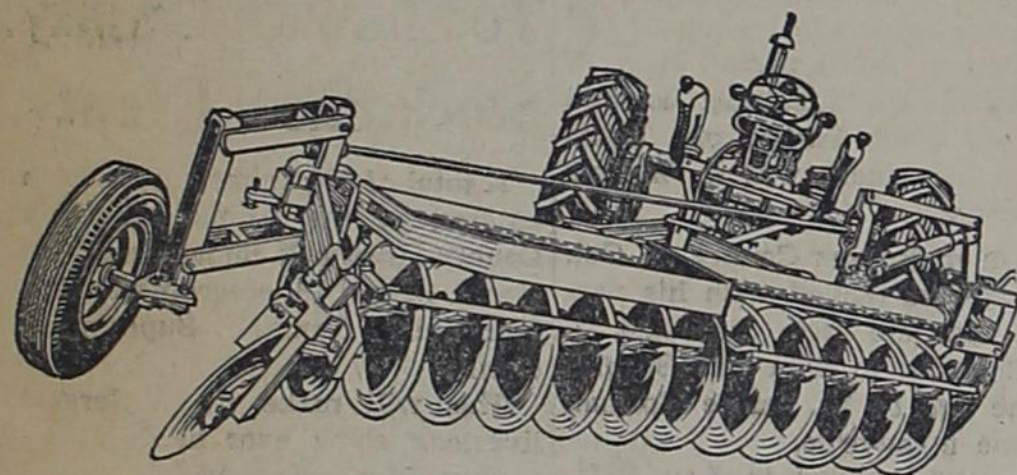

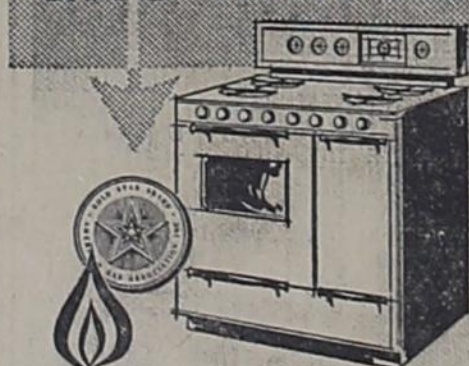

HOW TO PREPARE ROLLS FOR FREEZING

Any successful roll or bread recipe may be used for frozen dough. A dough fairly rich in fat is likely to dry out less than one containing little. A little more sugar than is used in freshly made rolls and bread may be desirable because more of the sugar is likely to be used by the yeast during the longer period the dough remains unbaked. Grease the sur-

face of the shaped rolls well to prevent them from drying out.

1. Permit the dough to be frozen to double in bulk.
2. Shape it into rolls as desired and grease the surface of each roll well to prevent drying.
3. Immediately place the rolls close together in shallow packages.
4. Lay a piece of cellophane or waxed paper on top. If necessary to pack in two layers, place a very thin piece of stiff paper between them. Do not pack so many layers in one package that the bottom ones are mashed. The shaped rolls may also be placed in paper baking cups before packaging.

5. Always keep out pockets of air from the packages, and freeze the rolls immediately. Rolls that have been allowed to rise before freezing are likely to have a smaller volume, a less uniform texture, and a less desirable flavor, than those that have not been allowed to rise appreciably after being shaped. Roll dough may also be frozen before it is shaped.
6. Do not store longer than 3 to 4 weeks.

HOW TO PREPARE AND BAKE FROZEN DOUGH

1. As soon as you remove the rolls from the freezer, place them in warm greased muffin tins over hot water, out of any draft, to rise. You may wish to remove the rolls from the paper cups because paper is a good insulator and tends to slow the warming of the dough; or you may wish to set the cups of dough on racks where the warm, moist air can circulate around them. Rolls spread out on baking sheets where they have no support tend to increase the rolls size by spreading out rather than rising.

2. Let the rolls rise in a warm, moist place until light (from 1 to 2 hours). If the rolls rise slowly, "off" flavors may develop and coarse flattened cells and thick, tough crusts may form.

3. Bake the rolls in the usual way at 400 degrees F. If desired, package the dough for rolls without shaping it into rolls in a flat sheet in the same manner as bread dough then thaw and shape the rolls in a similar manner.
