Mr. Cappleman said today the new service opens up Farmers Home Administration credit aid for the first time to many lowincome rural families who previously were unable to obtain improve their earnings.



- 7. Address (street and house number, box number, or rural route.)







Eastland County ranks ninth in Texas in value and importance of ceramic clay deposits, he said, and stated the deposits have tremendous possibilities for a commercial market.

He commented on the four liquid hydro-carbon plants in the county and said he expected no sharp increase or decrease in oil and gas industries in the foreseeable future.

Eastland County has potential for a lime plant, and also has the need for one, Dr. Fisher said. The nearest lime plant to the Display, per column inch - 56c area is at Cleburne. Lime could be used in roads, agriculture and industry, he said.

Dr. Fisher volunteered his services to furnish data from his office to anyone wishing the information, but stressed that a ceramic clay survey made in the county in 1949 needs up-dating.

The program, sponsored by the Texas Industrial Commission, was held at the White Elephant Cafe along with joint meetings of the Eastland Rotary and Lion clubs.

Oscar Castillon, manager of area development division of the Texas Electric Service Co., spoke at 10 a. m. on "Specific Advantages for Plant Location in Eastland County," and reviewed the great volume of research done by his company. Some of the research programs he deemed failures and others successful.

He stressed the specific advantages of plant location in Eastland County, saying the transportation facilities were first rate with international highway and main railroad connections. An adequate labor force was also available for industrial purposes, Castillon said.

> 2. Obstructions to delivery of mail on rural routes should be removed or minimized to the fullest extent possible.

Where rural boxes pose a problem, the carrier may leave form 4056, "Your Mailbox Needs Attention," a notice to keep box approaches clear by promptly removing all obstructions, including snow, which may make mail delivery difficult or impossible. Classified Advertising - 3c word Unless approaches are cleared, it may be necessary to temporarily withhold delivery of mail, the Postmaster pointed out.

> Rural carriers are not required to perform service on foot when roads cannot be traveled with the vehicles normally used, but they are expeted to make every reasonable effort to serve as many of their patrons as possible without physical exertion or added financial cost, he explained.

If excessive detours are necessary to effect delivery of mail, customers should temporarily relocate their boxes on the new line of travel, arrange to receive their mail through oher patron's boxes, or make other arrangements for their mail until travel on the roads affected can be resumed.



There're always interruptions such as mother's having to get dinner ready, or her sisters' boy friends phoning incessantly, or daddy having to


go off to work. But these frustrations will soon be a thing of the past. For Susie, who by now you will suspect doesn't see, is learning to read for herself.


